Mt 21:33-43

October 4, 2020

Dear St. Pius X and St. Anthony Church,

Some famous last words: "If only I had known what I had, I never would have gotten rid of it." I bet we all know the regret behind those words. Don't we feel that way when we have sold something, or thrown something out to make room for something new? THEN, we discover the beloved, unappreciated aspects of the old arrangement! With today's parable, I bet the tenants in the vineyard are saying that! I hear them from the grave, "Why couldn't we just be content with our annual crop-share, instead of trying to take over the whole vineyard!" But instead, now what have they got? They are dead and gone, and new tenants have taken their place, controlling the vineyard! With this parable, Jesus is trying to wake up the religious establishment of His time. They were abusing God's vineyard, and not appreciating their place in it. In fact they thought they could greedily squeeze a little more out of it for themselves. But they learned shortly afterward, that, it is all going away soon. (To the historical generation of Jesus' time, not long after his coming, the city of Jerusalem and the Temple are destroyed, and run over by the Romans.) At the end of the parable today, Jesus prophesies that "the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that will produce its fruit" (Matthew 21:43). And it happens in 70 AD! Why? The people of Jesus' time felt entitled, ignoring their blessing and denying God's place in their lives.

An old 80's rock group Cinderella, had a hit titled "Don't know what you got 'til it's gone" It lamented the loss of people and things that go unappreciated, until it's too late. The proverb, "Absence makes the heart grow fonder" says the same thing. Jesus' parable is a tale of caution about not overreaching and not always grasping for more and more. We don't want to presumptively take for granted what we already have. In Matthew 21:42, Jesus quotes the Old Testament Psalm 118:22, "The stone the builders rejected has become the cornerstone." As a little piece of interesting Jesus trivia, we may ask "What Old testament books did Jesus quote most?" His top four were the 1) Psalms, 2) Deuteronomy, 3) Isaiah and 4) Exodus. His use of the Old Testament shows that He didn't presume, and take for granted all that went before Him. No, he referenced the older scriptures, even though all the while he was composing the newer covenant. But Jesus quotes Psalm 118 to say that whatever we humans ignore and reject may be exactly what God uses to bring us grace. We throw it away at our own loss! What we think nothing of, often God will use that very thing or person to accomplish His will for us. We discount or discard it, but again, often by our own hand the grace is lost! St Paul says in 1 Corinthians 1:27 "God chose the foolish of the world to shame the wise, and God chose the weak of the world to shame the strong,..." I think of those simple apostles that Jesus called as his first workers. They had not walked around the powerful halls of Hebrew University or the Capitol Hill in Jerusalem. No, when Jesus recruited them to lead in the Kingdom of God, they were hanging out by the seashore taking care of business and their fishing equipment. Acts 4:13 says that Peter and John were 'perceived to be uneducated, ordinary men" (check it out that in Acts 4:11 has Peter quoting that same Psalm 118-of the rejected stone'!). Here, the town's people thought nothing of these twelve lowly workers that Jesus called. But these apostles are the ones that Jesus makes heavenly leaders in Matthew 19:28, saying that "when the Son of Man is seated on his throne of glory, you will yourselves sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel" (also Revelation 4:4). And notice how Jesus Himself was often put down, but he simply continued on about his business not making a spectacle or showboating his gifts. He simply did the Father's work. He did not go to Herod's palace to conduct 'healing shows' or stand in front of the Temple like a carnival display. No, Jesus, without fanfare, simply healed and comforted the sick wherever he went, (along the streets Mk 10:46, in the little synagogues Luke 13:10-11 & in family homes Matt 8:14). So, Jesus' low-key ministry, like the humble service of the apostles may be easily overlooked or discredited. And when that happens, look at what is missed: Grace-Everything! Again, God uses exactly what we may overlook or reject, to deliver His gifts. The 'rejected stone' becomes the foundational cornerstone. We don't want to miss it. We must be careful and aware of God working among us, especially in what we might easily toss away or ignore. St. Paul calls such grace that is humbly hid right in front of us, as "this treasure in earthen vessels" (2 Corinthians 4:7). What earthen vessels of grace are we tempted to throw away?

Another Saint in a Time of Plague: St. Pio of Pietrelcina (born 5-25-1887 died 9-23-1968)

St. Pio of Pietrelcina, (Padre Pio) was born to Giuseppa and Grazio Forgione, in Pietrelcina Italy (farming community) on May 25, 1887. The family was known as a hardworking farm family, but poor. He had an older brother, Michele, and three younger sisters, Felicita, Pellegrina, and Grazia (who later became a nun). He had two other siblings who died at childbirth or shortly thereafter. His baptismal name was Francesco, and at age five he claimed to be committed to serve God all his life. Up to the age of ten he worked the fields serving as shepherd boy to a flock of sheep for the family. As a youth he was afflicted often with poor health, such as stomach problems and severe vomiting. He caught typhoid fever when he was ten, becoming gravely sick. He did manage to do several years of schooling and in his youth he prayed often and described having heavenly visions and spiritual experiences. After hearing a visiting Capuchin priest preach in his home parish, he wanted to join their religious order. While interested, the order asked that he complete more education before joining them. His father worked extra to provide the young Francesco some private tutoring and he was finally accepted in 1903, at the age of 15, with the Capuchin friars at Morcone. On 22 January, he took the name of Fra (Friar) Pio, in honor of Pope Pius I, whose relic is preserved in the Santa Anna Chapel in Pietrelcina. He began studies (7 years) for the priesthood at the friary of Saint Francis of Assisi in Umbria. Through his priesthood studies, he was frequently sick, unable to eat but only milk & cheese, and suffering fainting spells insomnia and migraines. Fellow friars point to this period of his life when he began having spiritual encounters, ecstatic visions and was said to fall into stupors in prayer times (even levitating according to a fellow student). Even as early as six-seven years old, he would recount stories of seeing guardian angels in mass or while praying. His many sensitive prayer experiences and spiritual gifts (discernment of hearts, healing and wise counsel) would continue all through his life. In 1907, he made his solemn profession, and in 1910 was ordained a priest. For six years due to worsening health, he recuperated in residence with his family back home. By 1916, however, Pio was ordered to return to community life, and was moved to an agricultural community, Our Lady of Grace Capuchin Friary, in San Giovanni Rotondo among the Gargano Mountains. Except for a time in military service he would remain at San Giovanni until his death in September 23, 1968.

He was drawn to the sick with special compassion. Partly by his own sufferings, yet also through his continual ministry to and care for the sick, he always felt for and reached out to comfort the suffering. During World War I, he was drafted with some other friars and he served in the 10th Medical Corps, until he himself grew so infirm that he was discharged (within two years). Although the cause of his prolonged and debilitating illnesses throughout life remained a mystery to his doctors, Padre Pio never became discouraged. He offered all of his bodily sufferings to God as a sacrifice. for the conversion of souls. He experienced many spiritual sufferings as well, and always accepted them as God's will for the sanctification of souls (& his own). He said of his illnesses, "I am fully convinced that my illness is due to a special permission of God." He always sought to offer his life as a victim for sinners' salvation and to be near the Lord in Gethsemane and on the Cross. One day his identification with the suffering Christ became so intense that he received the charism of the stigmata. On Friday, September 20, 1918, while he was praying before a crucifix and making his thanksgiving after Mass, the marks of the wounds of Christ, appeared on Padre Pio's body and remained with him till death. He died at the friary on September 23, 1968.

Padre Pio saw the image of Christ in the poor, the suffering, and the sick and gave himself particularly to them. He once said, "Bring God to all those who are sick. This will help them more than any other remedy." His love and care for the sick extended to him opening a grand hospital for their care in 1956 (construction began in 1947 with simple fundraising that grew and grew even involving the Vatican and the UN over time as the project expanded). The hospital La Casa Sollievo della Sofferenza was primarily a medical clinic for the impoverished sick and for those with no one to care for them. Padre Pio's support and connection made possible the mission. St. John Paul II declared Padre Pio a saint on 16 June 2002. Interestingly, back in the 1940s, the future Pope John Paul II had gone to visit Padre Pio on retreat and for confession. It is reported that Padre Pio let St. John Paul II know of a vision that he saw him ascend to great spiritual heights of leadership in the Church. Especially in this COVID time, St. Pio is a great comfort and source of hope and healing. St. Pio of Pietrelcina, pray for us!
