
La Loma Luz Takes First 3 Dialysis Patients

La Loma Luz Adventist Hospital in San Ignacio, Cayo, has received its first three hemodialysis patients to coincide with the official launch of the Jose Cruz Memorial Dialysis Unit, one of two public sector units in the country and the first public units to be opened in the nation's history.

The San Ignacio unit is named after Jose Cruz, the advocate and dialysis patient who passed away last December and whose idea it was to bring the program, co-funded by World Organization for Renal Therapies (WORTH), to Belize. Hospital management and staff

agreed to the dedication in his honor.



At last year's signing of the memorandum of understanding for the dialysis program, Grant McPherson, administrator of LLLAH, called Cruz a hero for his activism. He expressed regret today that Cruz passed before the opening of the unit.

McPherson said that he wants success for both the program and the patients. He explained that whereas the current budget only allows for 16 patients to be treated at each of the two units on a single shift basis, the number of patients could increase if the units are run for another shift or

The launch of the Loma Luz center was held on Friday, February 4, 2011, the same day that the center at the Karl Heusner Memorial Hospital (KHMH) in Belize City, which has been caring for 11 patients, was

also declared officially opened.

Mileni Cruz, the widow of Jose Cruz, told Amandala that she did not receive an invitation to the launch of the program on Friday morning. We understand from our sources that a late call was made to Mrs. Cruz to attend the Loma Luz opening, which would serve patients from the south and west of Belize.

The transfer of government-funded patients from the Belize Healthcare Partners Limited, a private facility which introduced dialysis treatment in Belize, began in 2010; however, Director of Health Service Dr. Michael Pitts, told Amandala that it has to be a gradual process. According to McPherson, two patients at the KHMH are pending transfer to

Asked if the new program would mean greater life expectancy for dialysis patients, Pitts said he would not want to declare a position. He said only that since the patients have been transferred over to the KHMH unit, their "metrics," such as their potassium levels, have improved.

Expectancy depends on the condition that the patients are in when

they enter the program, said Pitts.

Cruz had told Amandala last year that he was the longest surviving patient on dialysis under the government-subsidized program, having exceeded four years. According to Pitts, most patients were dying sooner, after about two to two and a half years.

There are a dozen patients to transfer to the public facilities, accord-

ing to Pitts.

Patients are asked to make a co-payment of \$15 to \$80 per session, based on what they can afford.

Huichol Project: Solar-powered talking units spread the gospel

It looks like a small transistor radio, but the Megavoice Ambassador is a powerful tool that will soon be used to share the Good News in remote towns, villages and ranches in the Sierra Huichol of Mex-

ico. Built in Israel, these units nicknamed "GodPods" are used around the world by people who are unable to read, yet are hungry for God's Word.

Each unit has the capacity for 160 hours of audio material. They will come pre-loaded with the Old Testament in Spanish, New Testament in Huichol, a series of Faith of Jesus Bible studies recorded into the Huichol dialect by MPI-sponsored Pastor Lucas Ortiz, and hundreds of hymns. The Megavoice is configured so that end users cannot change

the recorded content.

GodPods are very easy to use, containing built-in batteries which are recharged by a solar panel on the back. Designed to operate in harsh environments, these sturdy digital units come with a speaker for groups as well as an earbud jack for private



listening.



With continued hostility towards Christianity in the Huichol mountains, these GodPods can be discretely taken to unreached areas. Huichol Christians are already saving up funds to pay a small portion of the cost, which will give them a sense of responsibility and ownership.

During my visit to the Sierra Huichol last Fall, I saw many faces light up when Pilot/Pastor Cirilo described the GodPods, how they work, and how the believers can use them for evangelism. The Huichol believers are eager to get their own unit so they can learn the Bible teachings better for themselves, and easily share the joy of living for Jesus with others.

In cooperation with our sister organization Amistad International, the plan is to acquire 120 units to use initially in 60 of the 400 existing Huichol communities.

MPI has committed to sponsoring the purchase of 50 GodPods, which cost about \$40 apiece. If additional contributions come in, more units will be purchased, enabling even more people to be reached for Christ!

We are committed to doing all that we can to advance the Lord's work, in these troublesome times. After all, "If God is for us who can be against us?" We want to thank each of you for doing your part.

Our next Board Meeting will follow the Montana Camp Meeting in June of 2012.

Sympathy & Kindness Wins Six!

This is the Cabildo family who were newly baptized last month on January 29, 2011. Mrs. Cabildo was an Adventist during her single years, then she got married to an Iglesia ni Cristo member. (These are very large beautiful Churches in the Philippines.) Later she was converted to her husband's faith. They have five children and their source of



livelihood is making upholstery.

On November 14, 2010, Mr. Cabildo was shot in his head, by a hired killer for an unknown reason, and died on the spot. It so happened that Jesreel (an MPI/Adopt a Minister sponsored Bible worker) and his wife Marian were passing by and saw the incident as

they were on their way to Atis Church (Jesreel is the youth pastor of this large SDA Church).

Jesreel recounts this story: "After three days, the eldest Cabildo son, Tata, visited the Atis SDA Church at a midweek meeting. He told me about what happened in their family and requested me to conduct a funeral service for his late Dad. I wondered why he requested an Adventist rather than the Iglesia pastor. He said, the Iglesia's don't give funeral services at the home, in the church or even at the grave side. That's what their religion practices. For four consecutive nights we (Pastor Mandreza, the Elders, and I) were there to comfort the family. We had talked about hope beyond the grave and a bit of our doctrines. They looked interested to hear about it.

After two months, a member of the Atis church approached Pastor Mandreza and asked if anyone was available to conduct a Bible study for a family. Pastor Mandreza appointed me to conduct the study for them. When I arrived was I was surprised to see that the family who wanted to

take the Bible studies was the family that grieved two months ago.

We started the study with the family and soon they decided to be baptized. They just needed to know more and to have a deeper understanding of the Bible's teachings. They were all happy as they accepted Christ as their Savior anew. They are now proud to be Seventh-day Adventists."

Peru Invasion Update and the 50-year-old Tractor

I wanted to send out another update. Thankfully we still have not had an invasion! God is taking care of things, we're certain that your prayers are being answered in this respect.

About the invasion; there is a law in Peru that a poor person that does not have property of their own may move onto neglected land and stake their claim on a homestead. What is happening is that land-grabbers and opportunists take this and run with it ignoring what the law actually states and the conditions thereof. The majority of those that actually invade do it to resell and make money. They are land pirates. they invade, build a shack, and sell the parcel as soon as they can. It has nothing to do with housing for the poor and needy.

The first threat of invasion was for a week ago Saturday night. God took care of that and nothing happened. Then we heard it would be last Monday night, then Tuesday; nothing. The word at first was that they were gathering 200 people to invade, now I've heard as much as 500.

I don't believe these to be strictly rumors, because we've been invaded before, two and a half years ago, and lost the land on the north side of the runway. Last year there was a threat and a large group of people were on the road outside the property, waiting to invade, when they got word that the police were coming to take back other land they'd invaded and they all went to protect what they'd already stolen. Also an answer to much prayer!

Seeing that two other large sections of land have been invaded in the last month, and the rumors have been flying about here, we truly appreciate the effectual prayer of God's children reaching up in our behalf that the work here can continue unhindered by this. It seems that things have calmed down a little in the last few days at least and we're hoping that focuses have shifted for now, but we never know.



We are cleaning up the area back there as quickly as we can to show positive use or maintenance of the property. Unfortunately, it is only being cut with two weed whackers right now. Our 50 year old tractor's (1961 IH B-414) transmission gave out this morning. I've worked on it for over six hours so far today and to no avail as yet. I'm struggling to see what is wrong, not seeing anything blatantly broken. Still we firmly believe that God has all things in His control and we're grateful that He's in charge and not us. God bless you and thanks again for your continued prayer!
