A Musical by Lin-Manuel Miranda BEFORE Hamilton


★ Westcoast Black Theatre

A decade before Hamilton took Broadway, Miranda had already achieved success with *In the Heights*, the show that won the Best Musical Tony Award in 2008, along with three other Tonys and the Grammy for Best Musical Show Album. *In the Heights* takes place in the mostly Latino Washington Heights neighborhood of Upper Manhattan, where Miranda (who is largely of Puerto Rican descent) himself grew up.



A Big Play on an International Scale at FST

★ Florida Studio Theatre's Mainstage season culminates with the world premiere of Sarah Bierstock's Honor Killing, which opens in the Gompertz Theatre on April 6. Allisyn Davis, an

American reporter for The New York Times, heads to Pakistan to cover the honor killing of a young woman. Through a series of cultural collisions, candid interviews, and dangerous encounters, she learns the details of this event, and faces her own demons and judgments. One culture mirrors the other, asking questions about forgiveness, self-worth, and justice.

Honor Killing first appeared on the FST stage during the Richard and Betty Burdick Reading Series as part of the 2017 Sarasota Festival of New Plays. Richard Hopkins expands on the choice to bring this show to the Mainstage stating, "It's been in the development process for a couple of years now, and we feel it's ready for prime time. It's a big play that is on an international scale, starting in America, but then quickly going to Dubai, to Afghanistan, to different parts of the Mideast. It's also a high tech show. There's a lot of video and it's fun to get to watch this reporter who's a high-end educated investigative reporter dealing with an issue that's close to her heart. Working to Close the Gender Gap in Technology

★ Ringling College's Town Hall Lecture Series has Reshma Saujani on April 9 at the Van Wezel. Saujani

is the founder and CEO of Girls Who Code, a national non-profit organization working to close the gender gap in technology. Through its summer immersion programs and clubs, Girls Who Code is leading the movement to inspire, educate, and equip young women with the computing skills to pursue 21st Century opportunities.

Saujani began her career as an attorney and activist. In 2010, she surged onto the political scene as the first Indian American woman to run for U.S. Congress. During the race, Saujani visited local schools and saw the gender gap in computing classes firsthand, which led her to start Girls Who Code.



Started in 2012, the organization has grown to reach 40,000 girls in every state by the end of 2016. This year, Girls Who Code will run 78 Summer Immersion Programs and 1500 Clubs.

The results speak for themselves: 90 percent of alumnae have declared or intend to declare a major or minor in computer science. Saujani's TED talk, "Teach Girls Bravery, Not Perfection," has more than three million views and has sparked a national conversation about how we're raising our girls. She is also the author of the groundbreaking new book, Women Who Don't Wait In Line. Saujani is a graduate of the University of Illinois, Harvard's Kennedy School of Government, and Yale Law School. She's been named one of Fortune's "World's Greatest Leaders," Fortune's 40 under 40, a Wall Street Journal Magazine "Innovator of the Year," one of the 50 Most Powerful Women in New York by the New York Daily News, and CNBC's Next List, Forbes's Most Powerful Women Changing the World among many other recognitions. When a seemingly normal day at the office turns out to be anything but, these aspiring journalists are given inspiration in a way they never expected. A Pulitzer Prizefinalist and one of The New York Times Best Theater Picks of 2015, Gloria runs through April 29, 2018.

One of the Luminaries of American Photojournalism

Alfred Eisenstaedt was one of the luminaries of American photojournalism. The German-born Eisenstaedt learned his craft in Europe in the 1920s and 30s, pioneering the use of the small Leica 35mm camera to get closer to his subjects and create more candid pictures.

Fleeing the rise of fascism in the 1930s, Eisenstaedt came to the US where he became one of the first photo-journalists of LIFE Magazine, the weekly newsmagazine that chronicled the twentieth century in pictures. His career at LIFE photographing the notable and newsworthy, spanned nearly 40 years and resulted in some of the most iconic images of the era.

First-ever: Elsa Schiaparelli and Salvador Dalí at the Dalí Museum

Diaghilev And The Ballets Russes is on March 12, 2018. Conceived by impresario Sergei Diaghilev, the Ballets Russes is regarded as the most influential ballet company of the 20th century, in part because it promoted ground-breaking artistic collaborations among young choreographers, composers, designers, and dancers, all at the forefront of their fields.

Afternoon of a Faun, Tanaquil Le Clercq, is on April 2, 2018. Of all the great ballerinas, Tanaquil Le Clercq may have been the most transcendent. She mesmerized viewers and choreographers alike, becoming a muse to two of the greatest choreographers in dance, George Balanchine and Jerome Robbins. At the age of 27, she was struck down by polio and paralyzed. She never danced again.




to stand firm against compromising his work, but quickly abandons that stance when his producer finds a backer to mount his show on Broadway.
