Success - Funding Approved!

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Funding for the Water Tower has been secured! The City of Gaylord has started the New Year with great news; the loan application for the Water Tower Project has been approved! After many months of research and applying to numerous sources for funding, a resource has finally been secured. The City of Gaylord has been approved for two loans, to establish a \$150,000 line of credit to make improvements to our Water System. Our number one priority is to use this money for the water tower project. Recoating of the interior and exterior we have been seeking funding for will total around \$89,090.00. Last October, a leak developed in the bottom portion of the bowl of our water tower and until the process of recoating is underway we do not know the full extent of the condition of the bowl and what necessary repairs will all need to be done. Last October the leak was welded to fix the leak but until the interior of the bowl is fully sand-blasted as part of the recoating process we do not know the full extent of the condition of the bottom portion of the water tower. A new bottom portion of the bowl may be needed and this cost could be an additional \$20,000 or more.

After the water tower project is completed later this year, council will see how much remains on the line of credit and determine if the remaining funds can be applied to another project to complete within our water system. Even if the entire amount of \$150,000 is used by the City of Gaylord, the required payments on these loans will be manageable within our current water and sewer rates. The increase in rates council passed by Ordinance 358 in October 2014 was in preparation for future payments for improvements to our water and sewer systems. Either way the City is only obligated to make payments on the total amounts used, not the total amount available.

Other projects the City may consider once the Water Tower is complete are: water hydrants, meter maid, and water meters. The city does have work which needs to be competed to numerous water hydrants in town. Due to the age of the current hydrants some are now leaking and need to be either removed or replaced in the near future. Current fire protection requirements of the state insurance office (ISO) allow for fire hydrants to be removed as long as another hydrant is located within 300 feet of the hydrant to be removed. Gaylord is very fortunate as we have many hydrants located well within this 300 foot limit as many hydrants are located within each city block. The meter maid located on well #6 which allows for distribution of raw water used mainly by livestock producers hauling water to animals or by farmers. Currently we only are able to determine the total amount of gallons pulled from well #6 but are not able to distinguish how many exactly are just from the meter maid alone. Also the current coin collection system for the meter maid is non-functional and the city would like to look into options for tracking the water used and all users of this water better. Another option the city is looking into is replacing the older water meters for our customer accounts. It's been a number of years since many of our current water meters have been replaced.

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Minutes from the January City Council Meeting

City of Gaylord - Minutes of January 11th, 2017 Regular Meeting

The Gaylord City Council met in regular session in the Community Center at 7:00 p.m., January 11th, 2017.

Present Members: Barb Lehmann, Jim Muck, Gene Casteel, and Wendell Felsburg

Absent Members: Wil Neussendorfer Presiding: Mayor David Tucker

Present also: City Clerk Aubrey Neussendorfer, Treasurer Crystal Ifland, City Man Ed Burt and Donna Muck.

Mayor Tucker called the Regular Council Meeting to order at 7:03 p.m.

Citizen's Report: Donna Muck presented council with a report for the Library for 2016. A handout was prepared by Donna and given to council for review. The recent damage to the window on the front door was discussed.

The minutes of the December 14th Regular meeting were read. Gene made the motion to approve the minutes as read. Barb seconded, motion carried.

Mayor Tucker called for the reading of the bills. After discussion, Wendell made a motion, seconded by Gene, to approve payment of bills, including any routine bills outstanding. Motion carried. Bills paid out \$10,873.09.

Mayor Tucker asked for a report of utility arrears: Richard Bose, Darin Godsey with three accounts, Rory Landry, Dyania Palm, and Greg Jones. All were paid by the disconnect date.

OLD BUSINESS:

- Aubrey reported the application for the loan has been approved. They decided to award us two loans, a \$100,000 and a \$50,000 to be used for projects within the water system. After review to the terms of the loans council had a few questions before the paperwork was signed. How long after loans are signed do we need to request the funds before they are no longer available? Do we only pay back the amount we use or do we have to use the full amount? How long after a written request for funds is made do we receive the funds?
- After discussing the tree trimming project, council agreed a written permission must be on file in the office before any work will be done on the city right-a-ways.
- Council discussed the Christmas Party planned for January 14th. Kurt Ifland will prepare a smoked brisket and pork loin. All members bring sides of their choice and plan on dinner at 6:00 p.m.
- Aubrey reported the deed for the Farmers Bank is ready. After discussion council agreed to pay any fees and to file the deed once the property has been paid for.
- The Nativity Scene ended up not being sold and council agreed to list the items for sale later in 2017.
- After discussion concerning rental fees for the Solomon Valley Beavers 4-H Club council agreed to instead of charging rent for each usage, to instead have club members have a drive night at a meeting for commonly used supplies in the building. Members also provide many hours of volunteer work on various city projects each year and will apply towards rent as well
- City-wide clean-up options were discussed by council. Letters need to be sent to get a better feel of what items residents have to get a better idea of what all needs to be planned and lined up.
- Council discussed the hydrants in town and the flushing schedule. All hydrants need to be flushed again during the next warm weather spell.
- The damage to the library window was discussed. Gene reported the replacement window was \$48.00.
- Council reported numerous complaints of roaming dogs in all areas of town.

NEW BUSINESS:

- Aubrey reported a new credit card was needed as the last statement showed fraudulent charges for airline tickets and two occasions totaling close to \$2100.00. The city will not have to pay these charges and paperwork has been filled out to begin their investigation into this matter.
- Aubrey reported four of the Cities CD's will mature 1-16-2017 and will automatically renew unless we take action before ten days after the due date.
- The garage disposal located in the sink in the Community Center was discussed. Council all agreed to remove the disposal and to replace the drain line under the sink. Also replacing the faucet in this sink was discussed and all members agreed to replace the faucet with on that allows for larger pans to fit underneath and a sprayer.
- The storage room in the community center was also discussed. This room needs a good sorting and cleaning this winter. Members of the community will be contacted as needed to review items stored before anything is discarded or given away.

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- The delay in arrival of the January Water Bills was discussed. Council agreed to extend the due date to the 20th of January. At this time, a late fee would be applied and a disconnect notice would be sent. Regular disconnection procedures would still take place on the 25th like normal. Letters would be sent to all with remaining unpaid balances stating this extension for January.

Mayor Tucker called the meeting to recess at 8:26 p.m. The meeting was called back to regular session at 8:30 p.m.

- The returned check policy was discussed as to if an account is closed for the reason being the reason a check is returned instead of insufficient funds. Council agreed this was not a reason to forbid future checks on an account.

REPORTS:

STREETS: No complaints at this time had been received.

SEWER/TRASH: Gene reported bracing legs were needed for the electrical box on the lift station. After discussion council agreed to have Ed's bottle of CO2 filled and have him fix this himself; as opposed to hiring someone to come down and fix it. WATER: Ed reported Doug with KS Rural Water would like to write an article on our Arsenic System we recently had installed. A water usage/water loss report was prepared from 2016 and after discussion council agreed to begin looking into options for a meter maid system that would allow for tracking all users of water.

FIRE: Ed reported one fire run at a residence on 1st street occurred during the past month. Work has begun on the Fire Station again as they are working in the interior walls of the meeting room/kitchen and bathroom. Heating units for the shop area have been installed. All rural fire trucks have been moved into the new building and after interior construction is complete the City Fire Truck will be moved to the new station.

HOUSING/COMMUNITY CENTER: 4 units are rented. Barb reported no issues have been brought to her attention with the Community Center and all appears to be clean. An open house is planned for early April at the Housing to showcase was they have to offer and seek new renters. They did have some water lines issues during a recent cold spell but have fixed all problems.

PARKS: none.

CITY MAN: Ed asked council if he could use his vacation time here and there on Friday afternoons if nothing else was going on. Ed reported a spare regulator for chlorine is needed to have on hand. Council agreed to have an entire spare kit on hand at all times so repairs can be made or temporarily fixed until parts can arrive. Complete inventory lists will need to be completed by March 1st. Gene and Ed reported new shelves were built in the pole shed and cost the city \$32.00.

TREASRUER: no report.

CITY CLERK: no report

Gene asked council if they wanted the bench located in front of the Farmers Bank. Council agreed to place the bench on the south side of the community center.

Council would like agenda emailed or prepared for pick-up prior to the meeting each month to better prepare for discussion at regular council meetings.

Mayor Tucker stated the next council meeting will be February 8th, 2017 at 7 p.m.

With no further business before the council, a motion was made by Gene and seconded by Barb to adjourn. Motion carried and meeting so adjourned.

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Fun Facts of past Presidents for Presidents Day

 George Washington was the only president unanimously elected. Meaning all of the state representatives voted for him.
