



ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE NEWS UPDATE By: Mark Richwine, CHAIRMAN OF ACC

Greetings:

As we end 2020 and start the New Year, there are a few issues that need to be brought up as a reminder to owners. During the last year, we have had a number of unauthorized construction projects that have been found. This includes outbuildings (sheds), utility drops, excavations, and driveways. Most of these were done without proper surveys and some have trespassed on other owner's properties. In many cases the work was being done by unlicensed individuals without a Teller County Permit.

As a covenant controlled community, all construction must be submitted to the association and approved. No construction projects can occur within the Association that has not been submitted to the Association Architectural Control Committee (ACC)) for review and approval. Approvals are based on Covenants and Architectural Guidelines of the association. These guidelines can be found on the Website or are available in the office. This includes residences, outbuildings, driveways, utilities drop (Power, water, septic), retaining walls, tree removal, or any external modifications to existing structures.

Any authorized construction project will have a colored sign (Green or Yellow depending on the type of construction) indicating an approved project or a Red Cease and Desist sign. If a Red Sign is placed, the Association contacts the owner of record and if possible, the individuals' performing the work to let them know the project is not authorized, and may issue fines to owners as appropriate.

All Owners and Residents are encouraged to contact the office if they notice construction occurring without a sign indicating an approved project.

Hello all and Happy Holidays!

I sincerely hope this finds you all well and in good spirits with the anticipation of being able to normalize our community in the upcoming year.

First of all, I want to thank all property owners for their patience and understanding around the refurbishing of our swimming pool. It has become much more complicated and expensive than we ever anticipated. However, even when it is all finished, we are still restricted in opening the pool due to the regulations being too difficult for small pool owners such as ours to follow. Currently, the exterior of the roof is finished, and we are awaiting a final inspection from Teller County for that. The electrical design by Scott Harvey has been approved by Teller County and electrician Pete St. John is scheduled to start the electrical work the first week of January. He anticipates this will take him approximately 10 days to complete. I have requested Ben Reynolds, the roofing contractor, to schedule ceiling installation once the electrical work is completed. I do not have an estimate of his time frame. Once everything is completed we will need to remove the temporary decking over the pool, power wash and repaint the deck, clean and fill the pool.

Jim Butler has researched setting up an archery range and acquired some equipment. As soon as spring gets here, we will install the range. The existing horseshoe pit will be refurbished, The parking lot lights are again up and running. It took John Gallimore and Pete St. John some time to find the problems with them and have now upgraded the circuit breakers - finally some light in our driveway!

If any of you have (or know someone who has) need of assistance (ie. food, clothing, etc.) please give the clubhouse a call and we will try to assist you in any way we can. The Board is looking forward to hosting some get-togethers as soon as we can rid ourselves of the restrictions we are now having to endure.
