

Eligibility & Requirements

Greg's Place Sober Living is based on the philosophy that 12 step recovery is the best path to restoration and recovery from Drug and Alcohol Addiction. For that reason it is required of the men who apply to agree that they desire to become fully engaged in 12 step recovery.

Applicants must meet the following:

- Have a minimum of 7 days clean and be able to drop a clean urinalysis
- Be stabilized enough to be able to follow simple guidelines and normal daily hygiene & self care.

Financial

- An entrance fee of 325.00 is payable at the time of acceptance. This covers the first 3 weeks which is a Probationary Period. If the applicant is accepted for residence, after this period, the cost is 100.00 per week.
- Residents must provide for their own food / groceries. If accepted they will need to arrange to bring in enough food with them for their initial stay. There are options with local grocers if a family member wants to help with this. They may order groceries on line and have them delivered.

Mental Health

Greg's Place Sober Living is a level 2 Sober Living home as defined by Ohio Recovery Housing guidelines. This means there is no Staff on location that lives with the residents. We have no means to dispense medications and cannot manage any residents with special needs other than addiction related symptoms. Therefore we do not accept anyone with a Major Mental Health diagnosis.

Medical

- Applicants must be mobile and able to walk up to a half a mile daily. There are steps to navigate in the house so any physical limitations that prohibit this activity will be problematic.
- Any medications that have a "street value" are not permissible. Sleeping aids such as Ambien or Serquel are not allowed. No Benzodiazepines , Barbiturates, Opiates, or Narcotics.
- Residents may not participate in Medicated Assisted methods of recovery such as Suboxone (buprenorphine) or methadone... however
- Vivitrol and Naltrexone is allowable.

Criminal Record

- All applicants are reviewed on a case by case basis, however Registered Sex Offenders cannot be considered and histories of violence or violent crimes are likely to result in a denial.
