OUR CORE BELIEFS

The human person is so complex - a great tribute to our maker. There is a huge difference between animals and us. Animals do not really think.



They act instinctively. But humans naturally reason. We try to find meaning in what we do. So, if you ask your child to do something, he/she will ask: BUT WHY? In essence, they are saying, "give me one reason to do what you're telling me to do." They are looking for meaning in what they're told to do. Animals do not seek meaning in what they do, they just

act or react.

So, from when we are young, we seek meaning in almost everything we do. Over time, these meanings pile up and become beliefs. It is these beliefs that propel us to action or inaction. Some of them are great and positive, some are probably neutral, while some are bad and guite destructive.

In our first reading this weekend (from 2 Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14) we encounter a mother and her seven sons and a king, each with their own strong beliefs. The pagan king had come to believe that his gods were definitely greater than the God of Israel. To help them, he and his people tried to convert them. When they failed, they decided to force them to conversion. First, they decided to force them to join in their pagan parades and to eat food dedicated to the gods and to bow before these gods. On the other hand, you had the Israelites who knew that their own God was not only more powerful but was the only God. The strength of this belief differed in different people. So, while some gave in to the king and chose to become pagans rather than die for their beliefs, some chose to die for the beliefs rather than become pagans. Not only did they believe in God, they also believed that He'd judge each person after death and then reward each accordingly. Simply, they had come to believe in life after death. So, the stage was set. The seven sons and their mother died rather then give in to the king's demand.

Once again, we look for meaning in what we do. These meanings over time become beliefs and form our belief system, which in turn drive the majority of our actions in life.

I think of my own experience. By age of 9, like everyone else, I had piled up enough meanings in what I did to form some core beliefs. I had already decided that faith in God was of great importance to me. I had decided that life after death must play a key role in whatever I do in this world. Thus, the decision to become a priest, a missionary priest. These core beliefs are the same that propel me in what I do. Of course, there are other subsidiary beliefs.

What about you? What meanings have you compiled in your life? How have they become the basis for your beliefs? What are those beliefs? Where does God and eternal life fit in? Are both non negotiable for you? How do they affect your everyday life and decisions?

As we begin to refocus and rejuvenate our parish, I could not help but think about why we do what we do here at St. Bart's. This is central to our existence. Our individual commitment to the parish will be dictated by our core beliefs as Catholics and as members of St. Bart's. The success of what we do will depend on these beliefs.

This weekend and the next, we will be focusing on our St. Bart's Year of Evangelization and also on our financial support to the parish. I have been praying and will invite everyone to pray for the success of both programs. But each of us must begin with ourselves.

Thanks for all you do for St. Bart's. Let's keep the light of faith shinning in this corner of Yonkers.
