

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month.

WHO CAN HELP ME RECOGNIZE THE LORD'S VOICE?

Hearing the story of Samuel's call, perhaps you're marveling that he could keep getting back to sleep after being awakened multi-



ple times during the night. That's' the true miracle! But it may be good to think of "sleep" as a metaphor for days lived routinely, without thinking. Every day we wake up, brush our teeth and comb our hair, go to work or school, come home, watch TV, go to bed. Day after day after day. Perhaps once in a while during our drowsiness we receive a gentle nudge: Is there more to my life? Shouldn't I be doing something more? The Lord's call may not

occur during the night, but we may still be sleeping when it happens. Will it wake us up?

We each received a call in baptism to serve one another. We also

received the Holy Spirit to assist us in this mission. Paul told the Corinthians that "your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you" (1 Corinthians 6:19). We have within ourselves the necessary means to live out Christ's mission. Our hands and arms and voices are empowered with the Holy Spirit to serve one



another, building up the Kingdom and glorifying God.

Each person who receives a call in today's reading needs an intermediary. Without Eli, Samuel would not have realized who was calling. Andrew only followed Jesus because John the Baptist identified Him as the Lamb of God. Then Simon was brought to Jesus by Andrew. After their encounters, each one's life is transformed, for each stays with the Lord and the Lord stays with each

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS Christ Is Anything but Ordinary

We're about to dive headlong into week two of Ordinary Time, and we need to admit, after the hustle and bustle of the holidays, things are indeed looking more ... ordinary, at least in our spiritual lives.

The transcendent highs of the Christmas season are flatlining a bit and the vivid imagery of the Nativity scene has faded. The solemn anticipation of the Advent season is by now a distant memory.

Are you bored yet?

Here's a secret: I think that Ordinary Time can actually be quite extraordinary, if we're really living out our baptismal call.

In today's Gospel, Jesus point-blank asks Andrew, who is following him after hearing John the Baptist's testimony: "What are you looking for?" He's asking us the same question.

What are you looking for? Why are you following me? Is it for the Christmas cookies and the Advent carols? Is it for the King's Cake on the Epiphany? Is it for the feeling we get on Christmas when we just know God has done a wondrous thing?

None of those things are bad, but they are not what Andrew was looking for, and they were not what Christ promised him when he said, "Come, and you will see." Andrew was looking for the Messiah — the One who makes even Ordinary Time extraordinary. The One who can sanctify the longest and dullest of to-do lists, on the longest and dullest of days. The One whose peace can reign in our homes on January 25, not just December 25.
