5TH GRADE SUMMER READING ASSIGNMENT

First, read two books; one from the list, and one book of your choice. Then, choose and complete $\underline{3}$ activities from the following list: (1 activity from 1 book, and 2 activities from the other book).

- 1. Draw an advertisement to sell your book. Include a one paragraph (AT LEAST) commercial to catch the reader's interest. Make certain your ad shows that you have read the book.
- 2. You are a tour guide for the location in your book. Design a poster or brochure inviting tourists to visit the setting in your book.
- 3. Make up a small review puzzle and a short quiz (at least 10 questions) to go with your book. Include answer keys. Try to cover the plot, character, setting, and theme.
- 4. Make a book jacket for your book. Include a paragraph inside the flap to tell others about your book.
- 5. Did your book deal with a "real life" problem? (crime, poverty, drug use, or something else) Make a poster collage to illustrate (show) this theme. You can use headlines, articles, pictures, and information from magazines and newspapers, or you can make the pieces yourself.
- 6. Make a diorama of one of the main events from the book. Include a written description of the scene.
- 7. Make a game using facts from the story.
- 8. Make a word search, crossword, or other puzzle using at least 10 vocabulary words from the story. Make an answer key to go with it.
- 9. Write the plot for a sequel to this book (at least 2 paragraphs).
- 10. Pretend you are a newspaper reporter whose job is to interview one of the characters. Write your interview.
- 11. Write a poem about your book. Touch on the characters, plot, setting, and theme. Illustrate your poem.
- 12. Make a timeline of the events of the story. Explain it.
- 13. Make a series of 5 drawings depicting the major parts of your book. Describe them.
- 14. Make a map of the area where the story took place. Indicate where each event occurred and be sure to include a key.
- 15. Sketch a portrait of a character and write everything about him or her.
