Mark 1:29-39



On leaving the synagogue, Jesus entered the house of Simon and Andrew with James and John. Simon's mother-inlaw lay sick with a fever. They immediately told him about her. He approached, grasped her hand, and helped her up. Then the fever left her and she waited on them. When it was evening, after sunset they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by demons. The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases and he drove out many demons not permitting them to speak because they knew him. Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

The Fantastic Four of James, John, Andrew and Simon Peter become five today as they intervene to have Simon's mother in law healed by Jesus. She joins them too, after Jesus heals her, she shows her gratitude by serving Jesus! She does what she can, to show how thankful she is to Jesus. What an example of discipleship! Maybe due to her older age or slower mobility, she may not be able to hit the roads with the apostles on missionary pursuits. But like the domestic Martha (Luke 10:40-41), she does what she can to serve Jesus. Simon's mother-in-law may make the best 'fish pancakes' in the world, so, she whips up some to feed Jesus after a long day of teaching & healing the crowds. She is such an awesome example of how we all should respond to receiving Jesus' grace. Jesus blesses us with healing, so we should bless others (pass it forward) by using whatever gift we have been given. She does what she can to reciprocate the goodness of Jesus. Romans 12:6 says that "we have different gifts according to the grace given to us, let us exercise them." After considering all that God has done for us, may we imitate Simon's mother-in-law's gratitude and generosity by caring more for others.

Yet, the giving didn't begin with Simon's mother-in-law. Notice that the reading says in Mark 1:30 that as the apostles learned of Simon's mother in law being sick, "They immediately told Jesus about her". I call that intercessory prayer! The apostles gave her their concern and time to offer help and involve/introduce Jesus to her. When we bring other people to Jesus or bring Jesus to other people, that is intercessory love and concern. We may underestimate how important even simple concern for others is, when we pray for them. It is tempting to downplay the value of praying for others, but such concern for others as naming them in our prayer is so important: for them and for us. To help another person, our first step has to be 'praying for them' by carrying our concern for them to Jesus, placing it before Him. What this does is deepen our love toward them but also deepen our trusting relationship to God and ensure that whatever our response is, it will more likely accord with God's will for them, too. We don't want to rashly react and end up opposing God's providence already responding to their need. Notice that with the apostles, before they offered Simon's mother-in-law a cold pack for her fever, or wet towel for her head, or a cool breeze fan, they first told Jesus about it (talked with Jesus-prayer). I like how we see this great example of intercessory prayer in this first chapter of Mark's gospel. First things first! I got the message. We have to start with Jesus, Before solving a problem, talk to Jesus, Before jumping into action, talk to Jesus. The last thing I want to do is initiate a plan and then discover it is opposed to God's response! I serve better when I have already prayed over with Jesus what I should do for Him (again, it is for Him right? So I better start with Him!). Especially when it involves others, we should intercede for them, yes, by naming them and bringing them to God in our heart. God will direct us to His action for them! Another great bible passage that shows such intercessory prayer for another person, is the story of the four friends (Mark 2:2-4) that carry their paralyzed buddy to Jesus. If we can't physically carry a person to Jesus, then we can still bring them to him/her spiritually in our prayer. Many scripture passages support our work of 'interceding' in prayer for each other. 1 Peter 5:7 says, "Cast all your worries upon him because he cares for you." Philippians 4:6 "Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God." (Also Ephesians 6:18 "be watchful with all perseverance and supplication for all the holy ones" & 1 Timothy 2:1 "I ask that supplications, prayers, petitions, and thanksgivings be offered for everyone.") My favorite call to intercessory prayer comes from Jesus Himself when he basically says, 'Bring me your prayer worries', in Matthew 11:28 "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest." So, our very prayer & concern for others IS our response of gratitude to Jesus for all that He has done for us. Check into prayer with Jesus first!

Oh, and don't forget the follow-up to intercession. Sometimes when we consider the abundant needs and many concerns our world puts in front of us each day, we may feel overwhelmed. So after some time 'interceding and lifting our hearts' concerns to God in prayer, we should also spend equal or more amount of time simply sitting in silence with God. We see the rest of this story in today's gospel when in Mark 1:35 Jesus "Rising very early before dawn, left and went off to a deserted place, where he prayed." Jesus was embodying for His disciples this pattern of prayer (intercession-silence with God-then back to action). Jesus was gaining the Father's View of all these daily issues. When we are in the middle of it, we only see the things closing in around us. But when we step back alone with God we can see the fuller horizon (& longer view) of God's perspective!

Another Saint in Time of Plague:

St Theobald of Provins (born 1033 - died 6-30-1066)

St Theobald is both a hermit-saint and a saint who suffered from a disease that caused a chronic hacking cough. Many miracle cures are related to him, which makes him a great patron saint for COVID patients due to his lung problems and his familiarity with holy solitude. May he strengthen COVID sufferers and by the grace of God be a vessel of healing recovery to many.

St Theobald was born into French nobility. His father was Arnoul, the Count of Champagne. His father groomed him to be a soldier/knight in his armed corps. However, Theobald was named after his uncle who was a revered saint, Theobald of Vienne. From a very young age, Theobald desired to be a recluse and devote himself to prayer and penance. His father opposed his religious service and pressured him to undertake diplomatic studies (rhetoric & logic) and military training. But, Theobald read everything he could find about the lives of hermits in Catholic history. He studied the lives and teaching of John the Baptist, Anthony the Abbot, Paul the Hermit, Arsenius and Macarius. He visited and sought counsel from a French hermit named Burchard who lived on an island in the River Seine.

In his late teens, war broke between his cousin Odo II, Count of Blois, and Conrad the Salic over a land and title of the crown in Burgundy. Theobald refused to be drawn into the armed conflict and shed blood and left Provins. He traveled around France seeking a suitable place to establish a prayer hermitage. He found an area around Pettingen in the Diocese of Trier that appealed to him. He lived a solitary existence for a while devoted to a daily routine of prayer and work. But rather than settle into a permanent hermitage for life in Trier, he began a series of religious pilgrimages to holv sites. He found a kindred soul in a friend named Walter. Together they made a pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela, in Northwestern Spain along the Camino de Santiago finding pilgrim company along the way that fed their religious fervor. Afterward, they returned into the territory of Trier and set up an area of interlinked hermitages. Later they both undertook another pilgrimage to Rome. Traveling back toward Trier they felt called to visit Palestine. However as they traveled through Venice on their way, Walter's health began to fail suddenly. It prevented them from traveling so they both settled in a solitary place in Salanigo, near Vicenza. Within two years, Walter died.

Theobald retreated further and further within his own eremitic enclosure and prayer/work schedule, to seek God. However, the more he withdrew, the more disciples approached him for wise counsel and other hermits sought to live/settle in nearby hermitages. Witnessing Theobald's pastoral care of the other hermits, the Bishop of Vicenza ordained him to the priesthood that he could administer the sacraments to the others. His mother, Gisela, had always sought him out, asking all pilgrims and missionaries if they had ran across his path anywhere. She eventually found him and moved nearby Vicenza and began a religious life/habit of her own.

Around 1065, he developed an illness that caused a frequent dry cough, and his body became covered with blotches and ulcers. He never recovered from this disease. He had frequent coughing fits that kept him from walking or speaking. Shortly before his death he joined up with a group of hermits who had gathered in the area under the guidance of the founder of the Camaldolese. St. Romuald (founder of Order in 1012 who wanted to introduce in the Western Church the eremitical life led Eastern monks and the Desert Fathers-Communities of Hermits). Theobald made solemn profession as a Camaldolese Hermit-Monk just before he died in Sossano on June 30 (his feast day) 1066 AD. Theobald was canonized in 1073 by Pope Alexander II. His popularity spread rapidly due to many healing miracles among pilgrims who traveled to the site of his relics at the Cluniac Priory at Auxerre. St Theobald is known as a patron saint of those suffering from fevers and chronic coughing, or epidemics. Interestingly, he is also the patron saint within Italy of charcoal burners and belt/shoemakers (leather-tanners occupational hazard). Since COVID ravages the lungs of many of its sufferers, St Theobald is a wonderful resource of intercessory prayer during this pandemic.

St Theobald, pray for us.

P.S. There are two Camaldolese monasteries in California at Big Sur (Immaculate Heart Hermitage) and Berkley (Incarnation Monastery). Also, one can be found (Holy Family Hermitage) in Bloomniesale OH (near Stubenville). They are basically communities of hermits.

Would the Real St Valentine please stand up?

Three different St. Valentines are mentioned in early church records, all sharing Feb. 14 for a feast day. Unfortunately, the historical record is sparse. The first St. Valentine was a priest and physician in Rome. He along with St. Marius and his family comforted the martyrs during the persecution of Emperor Claudius II, the Goth. Eventually, St. Valentine was also arrested, condemned to death for his faith, beaten with clubs, and finally beheaded on Feb. 14, AD 270. He was buried on the Flaminian Way. Later, Pope Julius I (333-356) built a basilica at the site which preserved St. Valentine's tomb. Archeological digs in the 1500s and 1800s have found evidence of the tomb of St. Valentine.

A second St. Valentine was the Bishop of Interamna (now Terni, 60 miles from Rome). Under the orders of Prefect Placidus, he too was arrested, scourged, and decapitated, again suffering persecution during the time of Emperor Claudius II.

And a third St. Valentine suffered martyrdom in Africa with several companions. However, nothing further is known about this saint. In all, these men, each named St. Valentine, showed heroic love for the Lord and His Church. Yet, they all gave their lives for others! TrueLove!
