NSNA Mid-Year Recap


See what some of our members have to say about their experience at the NSNA Mid-Year Conference in San Diego!



The opening session was titled "The Future of Nursing: Tag, You're It" and presented by Mary Foley, PhD, RN, FAAN, she discussed that student nurses are the future of nursing sand our passion will drive the profession forward. Her speech was inspiring because she believes in student nurses and understands that we have the ability to affect change. Another session I attended was in regards to Holistic Nursing: "Bringing Health and Care Back to HealthCare" as presented by Lucia Thornton, RN, MSN, ThD, AHN-BC. This thought provoking presentation discussed how a holism approach can and should be implemented in all facets of nursing. Patients and families respond better and have longer lasting results when the mind, body and spirit are treated. Finally, the American Red Cross provided information on the Measles and Rubella Initiative, which

is an effort to vaccinate children in poverty-stricken countries. Measles is one of the most contagious diseases and can be physically devastating. The most fascinating aspect of this effort was that it only costs \$2 to vaccinate a child and potentially save their life.

Overall, the experience at the NSNA Midyear Career Conference was remarkable. I am thankful for the opportunity to continue to increase my leadership skills and to learn from students across the country. Additionally, attending the conference allowed for our executive board to grow closer and to create new opportunities for the student nurses of Arizona. 

Student Spotlight Inspiring Others

I am pleased to introduce Andie Morales, a current nursing student and SNA member at Mesa Community College. Andie is a student with a giving spirit who took the initiative to present a project of her own to the MCC SNA. It was embraced and MCC SNA members and faculty were happy to lend support. Andie has a heart for the homeless, stating you never know someone's real story or what caused their circumstances. She has a 1.5-hour commute to school and notices many homeless people on her route. Some are panhandlers and others are not. She wanted to help them as the weather is cold and she knew there were many items that some of us take for granted that they might really need. Andie researched online to fine ways to provide packages to the



homeless in a dignified and respectful way. The idea was to create manageable sized packages to keep readily available in a box in her car that would be easy to just stop and drop off to someone in need. She organized the collection of donated items such as shampoos, lotions, toothpaste and toothbrushes, food items, warm socks, feminine hygiene and various other items. She had the SNA members help to assemble packages which included a handwritten card with inspirational messages for

the recipients. She was very excited, grateful, and humbled at the spirit that the MCC SNA showed in helping her to make the project a success. She was able to assemble over 50 packages which she has been delighted to distribute in the valley. She simply sees a person in need and offers the package. The best thing about the project is that the people really appreciate the packages. She hopes others might find inspiration and do something similar as small projects can have a big impact.
