WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FOR?

ohn points towards Jesus and the two men turn to follow him. Jesus sees them following and rather than ask them who they are and what they want, he instead asks them "What are you looking for?" There's depth to this question; it goes beyond the surface and draws us to reflect inward. It's a searching question, and one that you and I also need to answer. What are we looking for in following Jesus? Having been pointed in Jesus' direction by our family, or by other means, what is it we are looking for that keeps us here?

COME AND SEE

hen the disciples ask Jesus where he is staying, he simply responds: "Come and See." It's another way of saying "come and take a look for yourself" – don't just listen to what other people say about me, or what others believe about me, come and experience who I am and what I am like for yourself.

This is so freeing! It gives us permission to ask questions, to take our time exploring the gospels, considering Jesus' words, observing his actions, weighing up the kind of person he was and the way in which he lived his life. Do I spend enough time doing this? Do I read the Bible? Do I talk to others and dialogue with them about my questions and ponderings? Do I pray and ask Jesus to reveal himself to me? Do I reflect on the qualities Jesus exhibited? Do I mirror these in my own comings and goings?

SHARING WITH OTHERS

ndrew runs to tell his brother Simon (Peter). He is eager to share what he has found. How eager am I to talk about my faith and to share it

with others? Why do so many of us find it difficult to talk about? I know for myself it took many years before I felt comfortable talking openly about my faith and beliefs with anyone outside my circle of family and friends. It was partly because I didn't want to come across as a 'holy joe', or as pious or self-righteous; it was also because I didn't feel I had the right words to express what was inside me.

It can also be difficult within our society to find spaces for 'God-talk'. Politics and religion are topics that are discouraged in our workplaces and social settings. It's common to hear people claim they are "spiritual but not religious"; and many people view faith as something too deep and private to discuss with others.

These three words, however, demonstrate that sharing our faith is not about telling others what to believe and how to live; it's not about forcing Jesus and faith on anyone. No – it's about finding our own faith and then witnessing to it in how we live our life; living our faith in such a way that it captures the interest and imagination of others... loving, forgiving, showing kindness and compassion, acting justly... living in a way that invites those around us to "come and see" the faith/person that enlivens us, gives us hope, and keeps us going.

COME AND SEE ME

esus' three words are an invitation to all of us. It seems to me that you and I have the opportunity to offer a counter-invitation. We can invite Jesus to "come and see" where we live. To come and see our life, our work, our home, our loved ones, and ultimately, to come and see our hearts.

Don't be afraid of the invitation. Open your life and follow.



GOD'S WORD TODAY

Ex 20:1-17 1 Cor 1:22-25 Jn 2:13-25 The Jerusalem Temple was at the heart of Jewish faith. Especially at the three great annual pilgrimage feasts, it was crowded with visitors. Some wanted to buy an animal such as an ox for sacrifice: turtle doves were the cheapest for poor people. At Passover, every family needed a lamb. The annual tax could only be paid in one special coin and changing others for it was an expensive business. The area around the Temple at a time like Passover was crowded. It is this busy

atmosphere that is the setting for today's gospel. Jesus is enraged because the business of the Temple has little room for the worship of God. His bold action of turning over the tables and driving out the enimals recalls the great prophets like Jeremiah who made similar protests. It will involve him in conflict with the Temple leaders that will lead inevitably to his death. But he will be raised to life on the third day.

ost of the Sunday gospel readings this year [Year B in the liturgical cycle] are taken from the Gospel of John. It is also in the Gospel of John (1:39) that we find Jesus speaking the three words: "Come and see". They are part of a dialogue that takes place between Jesus and two disciples of John the Baptist, after John has pointed Jesus out to them and declared him to be "the lamb of God". Let's take a close look at what unfolds, and how Jesus' three little words "come and see" are in fact an invitation to all of us...
