equipment to decrease the wait time for available tanks. Thank you again, Ann for your thoughtfulness.



SEPTEMBER LUNCHEON

With all the enthusiasm going on about the birthday party in October, let us not forget that we have a luncheon coming up this month: on the third **Thursday, September 20th**, from 1130 until 2 PM at the Sizzler.

In addition to the usual raffles, etc., we will also enjoy a speaker: Neil Richardson of Better Breathers. Born in 1915, lone Ransom grew up in a small farming community in Iowa. The name of her quaint town was Carnarvon.

lone's parents sold animal feed, produce, and dairy products to the local farmers in the community. lone and her two younger brothers helped in the family business. Being the eldest, lone helped her father manage the business. One of her many tasks was testing the cream the farmers brought into the store to gage the butter fat and determine the



amount of money to pay the farmers. She then sold the cream to the creamery to be made into other dairy products such butter. as A year after she graduated from Wall Lake High School in 1932, lone helped a friend drive to Colorado. They arrived in Golden, Colorado where she and her friend opened a cafeteria in the Mt, Vernon Country Club. They managed the cafeteria for about a year and then closed shop and moved to Denver. lone studied cosmetology and worked in a beauty salon. The salon owner wanted to move to Florida and asked lone if she would like to buy the store. lone replied that she didn't have the money, but she had a nice car. The owner, wanting to move, traded the salon for the car! This remarkable trade was the start of lone's investing. She trained other girls in the beauty

salon and eventually opened another

salon.

Along came Frank Bettinger, lone took the plunge into marriage. The two were wed in 1942. In 1944, Frank was drafted into the military. lone sold her beauty salons in 1945 and followed Frank to Camp Roberts, California.

The family had purchased a home in Gardena and their daughter was born in 1947. Frank, in 1949, passed away due to heart problems. lone became a single mother with a two year old daughter to support. She started to work as a bookkeeper in a local night club and card clubs.

After her husband's death, with a child to support, lone's survival instinct kicked in. With a salary coming in as a bookkeeper, she partnered up with a realtor. Using the house she and her husband purchased in Gardena as her share of the investment, she offered to tear down her house- and team up with the realtor who was experience in developing real estate. With her property as collateral and the realtor's development background, they built an office building that is still standing in Gardena. lone started purchasing more apartment buildings and invested in other valuable assets.

In 1959, lone married Karl Ransom and moved to the Palos Verdes Peninsula. Karl was a successful attorney and this allowed lone to pursue other interests and activities. These activities ranged from building a business in interior design with a friend to golfing, playing bridge, painting, traveling, and engaging in philanthropy.

After 10 years of marriage to Karl, the two divorced in 1968. lone has developed a life of independence for herself. She gives back to the community for her good fortune by pursuing activities she enjoys. She is involved with Volunteer Services at Providence Little Company of Mary Hospital Auxiliary (PLCM) and at Toberman Settlement House Auxiliary Board (TSHA). She is a Charter member of PLCM and served as President on both Boards - PLCM & TSHA. She is also a member of the Palos Verdes Art Association (PVAA) and the Circle. These are fundraising organizations. lone was also the founding member of the LCMH Gift Shop. To this day, she

volunteers in the gift shop. Stop by and say "Hello" to lone at the gift shop on Wednesday evenings between 5 pm & 8 pm.
