

"When the days were completed for their purification according to the law of Moses, They took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. just as it is written in the law of the Lord, Every male that opens the womb shall be consecrated to the Lord, and to offer the sacrifice of a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons, in accordance with the dictate in the law of the Lord. Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon. This man was righteous and devout, awaiting the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he should not see death before he had seen the Christ of the Lord. He came in the Spirit into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform the custom of the law in regard to him, He took him into his arms and blessed God, saying: "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted —and you yourself a sword will pierce— so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years having lived seven years with her husband after her marriage, and then as a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple, but worshiped night and day with fasting and prayer. And coming forward at that very time, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had fulfilled all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong. filled with wisdom: and the favor of God was upon him.

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Holy Family Sunday Year B

"All that's left to do is the cleanup!" I bet we've all heard that at some time as we were finishing up a job. Maybe after a long work shift leading up to closing time, we felt a huge sense of relief and accomplishment. Only a few more details to complete and the job is wrapped up! I wonder if some of that 'Job Well Done Relief' can be heard in Simeon's Swan Song today. We call his song, 'Simeon's Canticle' or the "Nunc Dimittis", which are the first two Latin words in the verse translated as, 'Now you may dismiss your servant......" Like the prophetess Anna alongside him, Simeon and her had Temple duty, keeping vigil and offering prayer continually in the Temple until the Day of the Lord's Coming. I bet every day they imagined, *"Could this be the day?"* Then after

sunset comes and still no Messiah shows, they thought, "Maybe tomorrow?" So, how long, were they so faithful? They are both advanced in years, so they must have been very dutiful about keeping a constant presence in the Temple. And then it finally happened! Now - Christ Appears! Simeon's song thanks God for allowing him to see the day come. Simeon begins to bow out and only needs to rehang his vestments and clean out his locker, and God can bring him on home (*all that's left is the cleanup!*) Mission almost completed – the last finishing touches to do and Simeon heads to his final home in the sky!

What a satisfying feeling! I imagine people have Simeon's similar feeling, when they wash out their brushes after just painting a room (an even better feeling comes when they wake the next morning to smell the room and soak in the new color scene). Or, maybe someone after a delicious meal is served & eaten, after the last dish is dried and put away, then to sit and have a cup of coffee and slip off into a doze! Well-done! Simeon's last duty is to bless Mary and Joseph (& child Jesus) and share the prophecy with them of this *child's destiny* ('But, yes, Say <u>His</u> Name!') Of course, Simeon & Anna continue to spread word about their experience with the Messiah in the Temple to anyone they encounter, but inside they can feel such blessed peace in knowing they fulfilled their task pointing out their Messiah in the Temple. While Simeon may have had the more public job of announcing Jesus' arrival in the Temple (Luke 2:34-35), Anna is said also to have been busy sharing the news to everyone (her exact words are not recorded so she must have been responsible to get knowledge of 'The Word's arrival' through the grapevine). In Luke 2:38 we hear that she circulated the word about Jesus just as well ("speaking about the child *to all* who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem"), maybe through all the back channels of the Temple!

A few more words about Simeon's prophecy: We have all seen the images of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and the detail of a piercing sword that penetrates Mary's heart visualized. Simeon suggests that Mary will feel and experience Her Son's pain along with Him (graphically seen at the crucifixion as Jesus' own heart is physically pierced by a lance-John 19:34). It confirms the bond of union they share. Yet I also think Simeon's prophecy says a lot about the compassion of Mary for all of us (humanity). Luke 2:34 predicts that many will either 'rise or fall', due to 'contradiction' of the sign that Jesus embodies for the world. What is revealed through any encounter with Jesus? Our own heart. Luke 2:35 says, "so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." We accept and feel compassion for the human lot (loving neighbor Mt22:39, & even loving one's enemy Mt 5:44) or we don't. Our feeling for others (compassionate like Christ) is the sign of our acceptance of Him as the Messiah or not. It is either Compassion or Contradiction! We feel with (identify with others) or against (only think of ourselves) others. With them (the prefix-'com') or against (the prefix 'contra') them. Compassion rises, while contradiction falls. It may seem severe but Jesus teaches later that "the things that come out of the mouth come from the heart" (Matthew 15:18). Our heart speaks for us when it comes to recognizing Jesus. It is our heart and its feeling for others that testifies to our true acceptance of Jesus! Jesus brings us to feel it, if we are open to Him (something to pray over is the insight of Mary that the opening of our heart sometimes comes through a painful piercing-when our hearts are broken, the stab we feel creates an opening for us to feel more deeply for other people and their hurts-compassion).
