The Eternal Eye! In some of our old Catholic Church buildings that were classically built, they have vaulted 'dome style' ceilings over the sanctuary. And many of them had painted in the center of the dome, *an eyeball looking down* as a sign of God's provident vigilance over us. Yes, God is watching over us! We certainly see this in our gospel reading today as Jesus takes up an observation point in the temple, watching peoples' actions as they approach the collection box. Of course, as a Good Shepherd, we know that Jesus is observant and mindful of His sheep's every step (Jn 10:27 "I know my sheep" & Jn 10:14 "I know mine"). As a Good Shepherd, Jesus has His eyes peeled, ever watchful over us, as His own sheep and he watches to better tend to our needs (Proverbs 15:3 "The eyes of the LORD are in every place..") Of course, our Loving Lord knows us through and through (Psalm 139:1 "LORD, you have probed me, you know me"). I think it is a comfort to know that Jesus even observes our inner souls. He reads our hearts. We hear about Him doing that in the gospels many times, as in Mark 2:8 "Jesus immediately *knew in his mind* what they were *thinking to themselves..*" or Luke 9:47 "Jesus *realized the intention of their hearts*" or in Matthew 12:25 "Jesus *knew what they were thinking* .." Is this why Jesus is so compassionate and understanding-He knows my heart, but indeed everyone else's too?

So our gospel shows Jesus taking up a perch in the Temple and observing the contributions being offered. Jesus had already taught that gifts should be humbly offered, and that we shouldn't blow horns and seek publicity for our good giving (Matt 6:2-3). And He uses this occasion to celebrate a 'little one': a simple widow woman who is moved to give what little she has to God, trusting that God will take care of her. I wonder if she says to herself, "I may not have a lot, but there are a lot of people worse off than me!" She makes no show of it, but simply walks in and slips in her small contribution (*Keep Mother Teresa's words in mind, "It is not the size of the gift that makes it great, but the amount of love given with it that makes it so"*). I imagine she may even have slipped in her little gift, discretely wrapped up in a handkerchief to make no noise. I bet Jesus had witnessed some ostentatious offerings given by flashy Pharisees, maybe them even tossing down their weighty contributions making noise, and making sure everyone heard it! Such a scene makes me think back to the good old days of parkway toll booths that loudly counted away your coin tolls before giving you the green-go sign and ding of a bell! Someone ahead of me in the toll booth line once must have thrown sixty pennies into the receptacle flap because even from behind them I could hear the many repeated 'click, click, clicks' of the machine counter before their car was signaled on through! (*Are there still any coin parkway tolls in Kentucky? I liked that it was a good way to periodically empty the accumulated change /cents from the old ashtrays in cars!*)

Yet, I think Jesus is commending the 'humble trust' of the widow as an example of good discipleship. She knows that God gave her all that she has, and she has been brought along this far with God's providence. So, she gives even from her livelihood, with a joyful heart because she trusts God will continue providing for her. She is following the discipleship instructions that Jesus advised to His apostles, "take nothing for the journey but a walking stick-no food, no sack, no money in their belts" (Mark 6:8). She lives by faith in God knowing that Jesus word is to "Give and it will be given to you" (Luke 6:38). She follows Christ! It would be a good bible study to read the gospel and take notes on how Jesus interacts with the impoverished and how he gives, empowers and provides for the destitute. He provides for the needy in different ways, from His own means, from nature and through other people, but in all these situations of poverty, He still provides! Back at the beginning of His public ministry Jesus had proclaimed in his mission statement (from Isaiah 61:1-2) that He was 'anointed to bring glad tidings to the poor' among other things. So, Jesus does provide, fulfilling His promise that 'Blessed are the poor, the kingdom of God is theirs'' (Luke 6:20). And what is our response to God's provident generosity? To continue sharing gifts as Jesus taught, giving ourselves always motivated by the lovecharity in our hearts (1 Cor 13:33), conducting ourselves 'cheerfully' in the interaction of giving to another (2 Cor 9:7), and giving from our own means and not obligating/coercing it from others (2 Cor 8:12). Through such generous living, we have the 'love of God' in our lives! Peace, Fr Brian
