In the many events that we share with the Houghs Neck community, from selling baked goods at the Chowda Fest, inviting the community to the Lobster Fest, the Chili Cook Off, the Strawberry Festival, to offering the By the Sea Holiday Fair and all the events sponsored by our womens group called the Seaside Social Club, we believe Jesus is there. In all these things, and more, when we serve the community and gather in Jesus name, we see him among us and experience the presence of God. The rest of the community, those of you who don't believe any of this, you may not connect Jesus to these events or recognize Jesus in them as we do, but it is our hope and belief that, unbeknownst to you, you experience his presence through us. When Jesus walked among the people of his day, some recognized him as the Christ of God, others did not. Yet all were blessed by his presence among them.

There are so many in our communities of faith whether in HNCC or Holy Name parish that make Houghs Neck a community that cares and great place to live. To them and all who exhibit the love of God we see in Jesus but may not be affiliated with a faith community, we owe a great debt, and give thanks. Enjoy the summer!

I have been appointed to chair my first conference committee. The House and Senate both passed legislation relative to increasing consumers' ability to protect themselves should their personal information held by a third party be stolen. The most recent example is the Equifax breach, but it can apply to employee records, financial institutions, department stores, social media and any entity that holds sufficient information to open lines of credit or assume your identity. The other House conference members are Representative Daniel Hunt (D-Boston) and Representative Randy Hunt (R-Sandwich). Senate conference members are my co-chair Senator Barbara L'Italien (D-Andover), Senator John Keenan (D-Quincy) and Senator Ryan Fattman (R-Webster). The conference members will be negotiating to resolve the differences between the two versions throughout the month of June. Most recently, Congress and the President passed into law their own consumer data breach legislation. We are now working to understand the breadth of federal jurisdiction, to see what consumer protection measures Massachusetts can enhance on top of the federal mandates.

Health Care is the largest economic driver in the Commonwealth, with life sciences making up an increasingly large part of this. On May 16th, the House passed House Bill 4501, An Act providing continued investment in the life sciences industry in the Commonwealth, which authorizes an additional \$462.97 million in bonds to continue investment in the biotechnology industry. Over ten years ago, the State committed \$1 billion in bond funds over 10 years to initially develop this industry. Funding in the new bond bill is directed to a number of areas, including: \$149.75 million for developing innovative capital projects within the University of Massachusetts system; \$10 million in a data processing center on Cape Cod; and \$3.22 million for the Massachusetts Maritime Academy. The annual amount of tax credits would be increased from \$25 million to \$30 million, and the tax incentive program would be extended to 2028.

Other states and countries are making serious investments in developing this industry and this legislation will allow Massachusetts to continue to be a leader in the field. The House voted in favor of this legislation, House Bill 4501, with a 149 to 3 vote. The Senate passed its own version and the legislation is now before a conference committee to negotiate the differences.

This month the House also passed legislation, House Bill 4540, to expand veterans' benefits. It would establish a \$1,000 active-duty death benefit, in addition to any annuity the person would have received. Financial assistance for deceased veterans' funeral and burial costs would be increased from \$2,000 to \$4,000. It would initiate changes in our Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) laws to allow military with specialized medical training to become a licensed EMT. Every municipality in the Commonwealth would be required to designate one parking space at its town or city hall as "veterans-only parking." House voted 150 to 0 in favor of H4540. The House and Senate have different versions of this legislation that will need to be reconciled before being sent to the Governor.

The House and Senate have each passed their own versions of the FY2019 State Budget and it is now before a conference committee. The Quincy delegation is advocating to the conference committee members to preserve funding that impacts our community. We expect that the State Budget will be approved by the Legislature by the end of the fiscal year on June 30th.

The City of Quincy is one of 82 communities receiving grant funding from the \$2.1 million made available through the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs' Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness Program. The grant provides communities with technical support, climate change data and planning tools to identify hazards and develop strategies to improve resilience. Quincy will receive \$45,500.


On April 28, I held a trash clean-up with Troop 6 and pulled out over a thousand pounds of trash.
