## Centro Medico la Amistad 2018 Annual Report

The clinic opened in February 2015 in the community of Monte de los Olivos, a small impoverished village in El Progreso, Honduras.

The clinic is staffed by Hondurans, with oversight and funding from Christ the King Parish and Little Friends International. The clinic is open 2 days per week, 52 weeks per year.

Our mission is to provide each person and their family with comprehensive and quality health care. With a caring team of professionals and inspired by Christian principles, we respect the dignity and needs of each individual.



Our very first patient from 2015 is doing great.

Centro Medico la Amistad is thriving! In 2018, 3736 people were seen: 1189 males, 2547 females, and over 1500 children. Total expenses for 2018 were: \$31,028, which includes \$19,680 for salaries, \$9,374 for medications, \$1,810 for supplies, and \$164 for transportation for hard to treat patients.

IV fluids, nebulizer treatments and wound care continue to be provided on a regular basis.



-A 19 year old young man paralyzed from the waist down, from a gun shot wound, continues to be seen on a consistent basis for wound care. We pay for his transportation to and from the clinic through generous donations.



We are very fortunate to now have a lab tech, who draws blood, as ordered by the providers, for all patients.

### Key points for 2018:

-There was a 40% increase in the number of patients seen in 2018 because we have 2 providers, an APRN and a doctor to examine and treat.

-The number of different villages that people come from to be seen in 2018, was 32.

-New programs were added: Healthy Start and Diabetic Management.



In October, we did medical brigades with our team to two different villages. We saw lots of school children.



We set up clinic in the village school and saw over 350 people in 2 days.



Many people stood in line for hours in the heat to be seen by our team.

We are very grateful that Dr. Kenan Turcio joined our team in 2018.



A new space was created in the existing clinic for Dorina, our APRN.
