ACCORDION CARE -- DID YOU KNOW? --

....accordions should be stored vertically, resting on the bass end. That is why there are feet to rest on.

....accordions should never be left in the heat.

.....accordions left in a basement will rust and mold from the humidity. Keep it in your closet.

.....accordion case left open with a cat around will surely get peed in.

....accordions stored in hard cases should be placed putting the keyboard in first.

....accordion straps should not rub the bellows when playing. Cross the loops of the straps in the bottom bracket to prevent this.

.....accordions should not be played near the ocean. The salt mist will cause accordion damage beyond repair.

....accordion cases should be carried with the lid next to the body.

.....accordion reeds, if inspected, should never be blowed on. Also touching the steel rods with fingers will rust at the fingerprint

....accordions should warm up slowly when coming in from the cold before playing.

....and finally, accordions should not be picked up by the straps.

Gypsy Swing

One of the more popular forms of music you can hear around the Portland-Metro area that sometimes includes an accordion is Gypsy Swing. Some of my more recent gigs in this style have been at the Raven & Rose, Secret Society, Laurelthirst Pub, and weekly jam sessions at Velo Cult. It's not only popular with musicians, but attracts a large following of swing dancers.

Gypsy Swing, also known as Gypsy Jazz, originated with Django Reinhardt, Stephane Grappelli and the Hot Club of France in the early 1930s. While the accordion wasn't part of the instrumentation in this band, it was a popular instrument at the time in France and seemed to be a natural fit for the sound and style of the music.

Some of the songs that eventually made up the standard gypsy jazz repertoire originated in French musette music. Musette music was initially played on a type of bagpipe known as a cornemuse. It was played in bars and dance halls in Paris. When the Italians brought the accordion to France, there was a gradual transition as bands replaced the cornemuse with the accordion. Other instrumentation included the banjo, which was later replaced by the guitar. Certain reeds in accordions became known as musette reeds. The term "wet" tuning is generally used when referring to the musette sound. For French music, it means some reeds are tuned slightly sharp and some slightly flat.

Back in the 1930s in Paris, the Hot Club of France was taking American standards (songs by Gershwin, Porter, Berlin, etc.), French musette songs, and other pieces, changing the tempo, and improvising over the changes to create a new style of jazz. Some of the accordion players who grew up playing in that decade and in later years not only adopted the style, but also wrote many of the songs that have now become standards. Those accordionists included <u>Tony Murena</u> (here playing "Indifference") and <u>Gus Viseur</u> (here playing "Swing Valse").

There are a number of accordion players playing gypsy jazz today. Most of them play a chromatic accordion (more often seen in Europe) rather than a piano accordion. Three of the best are <u>Ludovic Beier</u> (playing "Bossa Dorado"), <u>Richard Galiano</u> (playing "Autumn Leaves"), and <u>Marcel Loeffler</u> (playing "How High the Moon").

If this sounds like something you might want to try, a good place to start is to just drop in and listen at a Velo Cult jam session (Saturday afternoons from 3:00 – 5:00 at 1969 NE 62nd, Portland). From there it's just a matter of working on chords, scales, arpeggios, transcribing solos, learning standards, developing your ear and your ear/hand coordination, and a host of other things. That may sound intimidating, but the results will open a whole new world to your accordion experience.
