

THE JOY OF BEING A DCCW SPIRITUAL ADVISOR

"The world is our parish. Be a Divine Word Missionary and see the world!" This is the catchy slogan of the Society of the Divine Word (SVD) to draw the attention of young men to the priesthood and religious life. The Society of the Divine Word is the congregation of religious priests and brothers serving in about fifty countries around the globe, which I am a former member. Like a Society of the Divine Word Missionary, who has the opportunity to see the world by being assigned in different parts of the world, a DCCW Spiritual Advisor is given the privilege to go to different parts of the United States, since the NCCW national convention is held annually in a different city around the country.

As DCCW Spiritual Advisor for two years now, I have had the opportunity to attend NCCW conventions. The first one was in Dallas in 2017. This past August 27 – September 1, 2018 was the second convention which I attended. It was an honor and privilege to be with hundreds of Catholic women from all over the United States gathered in one place at one time. We heard a series of inspirational talks, had meetings, prayed together, met new friends and reconnected with old ones we met at previous national conventions.

Among the several talks that were presented at the convention, The Most Reverend Frank Caggiano, Bishop of Bridgeport, gave a talk titled "Disciples Called to be Joyful Signs of Contradiction in the World" which was phenomenal and the most inspiring for me. After his talk, people I met in the elevator or in the hotel lobby and the session halls were all talking about it. Some were asking if there was somebody who recorded his talk or if there were CD's for sale about his talk. But there were none. Bishop Caggiano was saying that Joy comes from righteous anger, courage to tell the truth, and hope. I believe that people listened to him not only because of his natural sense of humor, but due to the simplicity and clarity of his presentation. Added ingredients to make people want to listen to him were his use of personal stories and experiences.

Of all the homilies I heard during the convention Masses, I loved Bishop David Zubrik's homily best. He shared a story about his two grandnieces: Alexandra, who is six years old, and Abby, who is two years old, his nephew's daughters. He said that his nephew and his wife are devout Catholics, and they taught their daughters to pray at a young age. He said that when Abby, the youngest one, started to pray the Lord's Prayer by herself, instead of saying, "Our Father, who art in heaven. Hallowed be Thy name", she would say, "Our Father, who art in heaven. How do you know my name?" This made me reflect that God knows my name. He knows everybody's name, and God knows not only our names, but the innermost core of our being. In the Book of the prophet Isaiah, God says, "I have called you by name and you are mine." (Is. 43:1)

I am already looking forward to next year's National Council of Catholic Women's Convention to be held in Atlanta, Georgia. How I wish more Catholic women not only from our diocese, but dioceses around the country, could have the opportunity to attend this national Catholic women's convention to deepen their faith and manifest

that faith in good works, especially the younger Catholic women. Just as when I attend our Salt Lake City Diocesan Council of Catholic Women conventions, my faith as a Spiritual Advisor was strengthened because of the power of the faith of these women.

I want to share with you the information passed on by Rose Martinet, NCCW Treasurer. From generous member's donations, the following amounts were sent to Catholic Relief Services (\$17,913 - broken down as General Funds of \$1,542; Help a Child of \$620; Madonna Plan of \$3,456; Refugee Women Emergency Fund of \$934; and Water for Life \$1,361). Also, during the last year, \$32,000 was collected for the Vocations Purse Club.

On our DCCW level, from this year's Mass collection, we gave \$1,029 each to the following recipients – NCCW's Vocation Purse Club; the Carmelite Monastery; & Give Me a Chance, Daughters of Charity.

As I'm sure many of our Affiliates and Deaneries donations are included in the above numbers, your generosity is greatly appreciated.

Reminder, please note that Affiliate and Deanery annual dues to NCCW are due <u>December 31, 2018</u>. In order to be eligible to vote in the April 1st President-Elect elections, all dues MUST be received by NCCW before February 1, 2019. Please plan accordingly.


Donna Murphy, Chair St. Thomas More, Sandy, Parishioner



Robert's Rules of Order

- Why do we use Robert's Rules of Order?
 - Due process
 - o Enable everyone present to participate
 - o Make decisions with clarity
 - Ensure that the majority decides but the minority is heard
 - Facilitate meetings effectively





Here's what happens when you want a motion considered:



O YOU OSTAIN THE FLOOR

- Wait until the previous speaker is finished.
- Rise and address the chair. Say, "Mr. (or Madam) Chairperson" or "Mr. (or Madam) President."
- Give your name. The chair will recognize you by repeating it.



9 YOU MAKE YOUR MOTION

- Speak clearly and concisely.
- State your motion affirmatively. Say, "I move that we do..." instead of "I move that we do not..."
- Stay on the subject and avoid personal attacks.



O YOU WAIT FOR A SECOND

- Another member will say, "I second the motion."
- Or, the chair will call for a second.
- If there is no second, your motion will not be considered.

Motions made at the direction of a board or committee (of more than one person) do not require a second.



O YOU EXPAND ON YOUR MOTION

- As the person who made the motion, you are allowed to speak first.
- Direct all comments to the chair.
- Keep to the time limit for speaking.
- You may speak again after all other speakers are finished.
- You may speak a third time by a motion to suspend the rules with a % vote.



O THE CHAIR STATES YOUR MOTION

- The chair must say, "It is moved and seconded that we...."
- After this happens, debate or voting can occur.
- Your motion is now "assembly property," and you can't change it without consent of the members.



THE CHAIR PUTS THE QUESTION

- The chair asks, "Are you ready for the question?"
- If there is no more debate, or if a motion to stop debate is adopted, a vote is taken.
- The chair announces the results.





I am pleased to report the activities of the Northern Deanery Council of Catholic Women (NDCCW). Although we "take a break" during the Summer, we always find ourselves willingly hosting or participating in parish activities because that is where our hearts take us.

The new NDCCW officers were installed in June. President Barbara Larsen, Vice President Wanda Spell, Secretary Karen Fawbush, and Treasurer Donna Kushlan. We thank our previous officers Sylvia Orosco, Teresa Carmelo and Jane Mathis for their hard work and dedication to the Council of Catholic Women. The NDCCW donated an auction item in support of the Annual Give Me a Chance Charity Benefit in August. Each parish within the NDCCW was asked to do the same.

The following are Northern Deanery parishes and a summary of their activities:

Holy Family Parish CCW hosted the Annual Parish Picnic in June, which over 100 parishioners attended. They enjoyed grilled hamburgers and hot dogs--Father Wheaton actually purchased his favorite hot dogs for the picnic. Attendees brought a pot luck dish. The parish ministries, and others, donated 14 creative raffle baskets. The secret to a great event is the volunteers and many parishioners stepped up. A great time was had by all. The CCW donated a "Fall Season" themed auction basket to the Give Me a Chance Charity Benefit.

Annually, the CCW donates hygiene items to the Catholic Community Services pantry in Ogden--this year 325 items were collected. A Retreat of *Spiritual Revival* is scheduled on September 22nd. All women from the parish are invited. A full program of interesting speakers will present information on women's health, spiritually, and humanitarianism. Over the Labor Day Weekend, I was blessed to represent the Wasatch Deanery by attending the 98th Annual NCCW Convention, "Reflecting God's Joy: Missionary Disciples-Mission Possible!" in Pittsburgh. Admittedly, the days preceding the convention were filled with both trepidation and curiosity, as Pennsylvania and the Diocese of Pittsburgh have been at the epicenter of the most recent abuse scandals rocking the Catholic Church. Prior to our arrival, our NCCW President issued a statement saying that while we would be praying for healing, we were not going to be debating this topic at the convention out of respect for our Pennsylvania hosts and participants. Within the first hour of the Opening Session on Thursday morning, we were quickly reminded of the many good works performed by our Church, especially through the NCCW's partnership with organizations such as Catholic Relief Services and Cross Catholic Outreach, as well as our efforts to combat human trafficking in cooperation with the U.S. Catholic Sisters Against Human Trafficking and our new pen pal program to connect school children in the Holy Land with their counterparts in the U.S. Throughout the weekend, as we listened to the featured speakers, we received messages of hope and joy, and we were called upon to pray and to act.

Our keynote speaker, Bishop Caggiano of the Bridgeport Diocese, conveyed a most inspiring message of Christian Hope for a time in the Church that he referred to as a "spiritual twilight." He said it is our baptismal gift of Hope that allows us to trust in God, provides the opportunity for a spiritual renewal, and makes our mission of sharing the joy of the gospel possible. Perhaps the most powerful image he delivered, for me, was in his invitation for us to "sit before the Cross," the place "where Hope is born." He called the Cross "a mirror of our souls," for when we look upon the Cross, we see ourselves as "beloved sinners." That "mirror of the Cross" and the Hope we receive at the foot of the Cross demands not only that we forgive others but also asks us to forgive ourselves if we are to move forward in our roles as missionary disciples. I encourage everyone to visit the NCCW website for a link to the audio version of Bishop Caggiano's talk.

Last year was my first time attending the NCCW convention. I am so grateful to have had the opportunity to again share in the prayers, laughter, and education of other Catholic women from all over the country. I look forward to bringing this "Mission of Sharing God's Joy" back to the Deanery. Mission Possible.
