#### The Reverend's Ruminations - May 2023

It seems hard to believe that the long, reflective, often cold and snowy journey of Lent is now in our past. Even the excitement and joy of Easter morning—pleasantly mild compared to the days and weeks leading up to it—may seem to have come and gone. But they are not. Easter may be a day on a calendar to some, who see only an opportunity to hide little plastic eggs, gorge on chocolate, or enjoy a fancy dinner with family. But we didn't come to church back on April 9<sup>th</sup> just to show off a new pastel dress or our finest Easter bonnet; we came to remember (or be jarred into recognition of) Jesus present in our own lives. The church season of Easter is not one day, but fifty—concluding on Pentecost Sunday (this year on May 28).

Sometimes we take the Easter message for granted, and forget what an incredible sacrifice Christ made for us upon the cross. We hear the narrative of Jesus' last supper with his disciples, but gloss over the intensely personal offering of *"my body broken for you... my blood shed for you."* Amidst the busyness of our lives, bread seems like just a dietary staple; grape juice just a refreshing drink filled with healthy antioxidants. But when we receive Holy Communion together as we did on Easter morning, these same elements that we might take for granted in our own cupboard or refrigerator become a sacrament that unites us with fellow believers here in our own congregation, around the world, and—most importantly—with our risen Savior.

When we experience Jesus during special seasons like Christmas, Lent, or Easter, our senses become awakened to experience even our surroundings in a whole new way. Similar to Mary's experience outside the tomb, we are awakened to the physical, emotional, and communal experience of Jesus in our midst—through the taste of the communion elements, the familiar scent of spring flowers in the sanctuary, the stirring brass melodies accompanying a favorite hymn, the feel of the Bible on your lap, and the wooden pew at your back.

Our challenge now is not only to remember Jesus' resurrection, but to continue believing and applying its joy in our lives. I hope that you are always ready to boldly proclaim (as we have in the weeks since Easter morning), "He is risen...He is risen indeed!" Sitting in the pews on that bright, sunny Sunday morning it was easy to believe in and affirm the resurrection. But what about three or five weeks after Easter, when someone lets you down, or a friend or loved one suddenly dies, or the things that you gave up during Lent have already returned to your diet, even more tempting than before? Will Easter then be just a distant memory?

As we move through the fifty days of Eastertide and the month of May, our Sunday lectionary readings will include several selections from the Gospel of John, and you'll hear sermons from sections of early chapters in the Acts of the Apostles. While most of us are familiar with chapter two's story of the glorious Pentecost arrival of the Holy Spirit, we tend to wish we could skip accounts like chapter seven's stoning of Stephen. Stephen was one of seven deacons appointed by Jesus' original Apostles to distribute food and charitable aid to poorer members of the community in the early church, but ran afoul of some powerful synagogue leaders of the day for supposed blasphemy against Moses and God. When we consider the "struggles" of being a Christian in today's society (gathering food for Heaven's Table or our Little Free Pantry, delivering Meals on Wheels or serving a Free Community Meal, cleaning a section of highway ditch, or defending/debating our faith among an increasingly secular population), we have nothing to complain about!?!

As we march confidently into May, let us live and speak confidently of our risen Savior, offering peace and hope to those whom we encounter each day. Alleluia! He is risen indeed!

**Members Present:** Abigail Anderson, Catherine Johnson, Kay Campe, Sue Kruse, Larry Lasch, Robbin Celander, Erica Jorgensen, Amanda Forstrom, Amber Brummond, Cindy Huset and Christina Hainy. Ex-officio members present: Pastor Cory and Dara Bliesmer, Ass't Treasurer.

The Council met in Heritage Hall at 5:45 PM. The meeting was called to order by Moderator Abigail Anderson. Pastor Cory led in prayer. Motion to approve the minutes from the March 15th meeting was M/S/C (Catherine/Kay).

**Treasurer's Report:** Catherine Johnson reported that we are in good financial shape and that some money has already been donated towards new sanctuary carpet.

**Pastor's Report:** Pastor Cory reported that his time in Alabama was a good continuing education experience. He mentioned doing a graveside service on April 1<sup>st</sup> for a community member without a home church. He is one of the pastors on-call for that service. Coming up is a baptism, Emma's college graduation and an Air National Guard medical mission "deployment" to Idaho Native American reservations for two weeks in May.

#### **BOARD REPORTS:**

**Christian Education:** Amber Brummond noted that they were unable to meet this month. They will not be able to commit to helping at the front lawn carnival during IHD due to their schedules.

**Hospitality:** Erica Jorgensen said they are meeting on the April 25<sup>th</sup> and are serving the April free community meal.

**Facilities:** Larry Lasch brought in a carpet cleaning bid. A motion was M/S/C to hire Jill H. to clean the church's carpets for approximately \$354 (cost may vary slightly by amount of time spent cleaning). (Robbin/Erica)

Diaconate: Sue Kruse stated that they have been working on the Cares & Concerns list.

**Mission:** Amanda Forstrom said the March blessing box food drive for Heaven's Table brought in \$940 and 250 pounds of food was donated. Meals on Wheels will be delivered by our church May 1-15.

Worship: Cindy Huset reported that the Worship board will serve the May Free Community Meal.

**Rummage Sale Committee Report:** Kay Campe stated that the rummage sale is the first weekend in August. Dropoff dates are July 22-31. Clothing will NOT be accepted. The stage will be a storage location before the sale. Each board should try to clean out any of their items on the stage and in their areas. The committee will meet again in June.

**OLD BUSINESS:** Discussed IHD events. No committee right now for a front lawn carnival. Pork chop/pie social is 11-2. Quilt show is 10-3. Still looking at breakfast on the lawn for car show participants.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

- Abigail summarized the questions/answer session by Rev. Kelly Gallagher about OCWM and the MN Conference. Rev. Gallagher mentioned the website several times: uccmn.org.

- Looking for donations of coupons for the Martin County Cleanup Days to get rid of items that cannot be donated after the church rummage sale.

Moderator Abigail Anderson adjourned the meeting, and Pastor Cory closed with a prayer.

Hy-Vee & Fareway Report as of 23 April 2023

During the last five weeks, \$18,416.20 (12.28%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 17 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$72,304.66 (48.20%) toward the  $16^{th}$  \$150,000 goal. If we could get to the \$150,000 by the  $31^{st}$  of May, we could get the \$1,000, BUT we received a letter from Hy-Vee stating that people are doing too good of a job saving their slips and the expense for this program is exceeding their budget, therefore starting the  $1^{st}$  of June, it will take \$200,000 worth of slips to receive the \$1,000. We have been getting to the \$150,000 goal in about 44 weeks and the new \$200,000 will take almost 60 weeks.

During the same time, 10,078.34 (6.72%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 119 weeks, Fareway reached the goal for the 4<sup>th</sup> time and is at \$8,839.17 (5.89%) toward our 5<sup>th</sup> \$150,000 goal. The slips were turned into Fareway on the 9<sup>th</sup> of April.

This program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used. Slips from 2018 were received during this period of time. A couple of people did specials only at Hy-Vee and had a total bill of on 28 cents. They all help. Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Fast & Fresh (Gas), Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. Thanks to all who bring/mail the slips to the Church, or mailing them or dropping them off at my house. Even the very small amounts help.




What now? Have you noticed that as a theme in my sermons since Easter? As we continue through the fifty days of the church's Easter season, many of us may be wondering that same thing. The world is quick to focus on the next big celebration or season at hand, seemingly unaware that Jesus' resurrection was not just a miraculous event, but a jumpingoff point toward the future ministry of Christian disciples everywhere. As the introduction in *The Guidebook* version of the NRSV Bible translation says, "Acts is full of compromise, conflict, love, community, greed, generosity, powerful living, and violent death." If that sounds like the trailer to a new Netflix drama, think again!?! We will be continuing to interact with the book of Acts during worship services throughout May, so why not take a guided look at its background? Check out Louie Giglio's eight-session series, **The Acts of the Apostles:** 

In a world that is unsure of where to find truth or purpose, the book of Acts stands apart. It reveals God's plan for global redemption, his purpose for our lives, and the power he has given us to accomplish his mission.

Join pastor Louie Giglio in this eight-session series as he walks through the story of the early church. Acts may have been written two thousand years ago, but God is calling us to be a part of that story today.



For the children (and young-at-heart), there is sometimes a disconnect between "hoping" for a puppy or a new toy at the next birthday and the "hope" of eternal life that is such a part of our Christian faith and church conversations. I encourage you and your family to explore the hope expressed in 1 Peter (from which we'll also be reading during May worship services) through a unique and understandable animated series of 8-10 minute videos from a familiar creator:








These pickles are so good that you may want to plant cucumbers this month!! Thanks to Kay Campe and Elaine Zoeller for sharing this recipe. Thanks to Donna Grotte for sharing Bernice Dvorak's recipe (which was mostly the same). Huge jars of these pickles used to be found in our church refrigerator to be enjoyed at meals! They were made by various wonderful church ladies over the years!


## **Refrigerator Pickles**

12 C Cucumbers, thinly sliced
4 C Onion, thinly sliced
3 C Vinegar
3 C Sugar
1/3 C Salt
1 tsp Celery Seed
1 tsp Mustard Seed
1 tsp Turmeric

Pack jars with cucumbers & onions.
Boil rest of ingredients until sugar is dissolved.
Pour in jars. Cool. Cover tightly and refrigerate at least 24 hours.

Should make about 4 quarts.

Elaine's original recipe:



#### Bernice's notes:

Best to dissolve the sugar in the solution (sugar, turmeric, vinegar & pickling salt) first, and then cut up your cucumbers into the jar. Next, add the celery seed, mustard seed and the sliced onions (she notes peppers are always good added.) She uses a gallon jar. At first it looks like you won't have enough syrup but there is plenty. The cucumbers soften and you can push them down to add more cucumbers. Leave on the counter for about 24 hours. Then, refrigerate.
