

**SUFFRAGISTS.**

**Annual Meeting of the Political Equality League.**

**BRIGHT WOMEN OF KINGS COUNTY IN CONFERENCE—OFFICERS ELECTED FOR THE ENSUING YEAR—A DINNER TO BE GIVEN AT THE UNION LEAGUE CLUB ON MARCH 21.**

The annual meeting of the Political Equality League of Kings County was held this forenoon in the Wilson Rooms, 153 Pierrepont street. Only women were present, and they were a bright lot. Mrs. Cornelia K. Hood presided. It was a business meeting, and was conducted in a businesslike manner. The League is a delegate body, composed of the officers of auxiliary bodies, those included being the Brooklyn Woman's Suffrage Association, the Bedford League, the Brooklyn Heights League, the Eastern District League and the South Brooklyn League. The presidents of these bodies form the Executive Board of the County League, which is, in turn, auxiliary to the State League, and that in turn to the National League.

Reports were received from the several auxiliary bodies represented, and were generally of an encouraging nature. The election of officers was by ballot, each officer being voted for separately. Mrs. Cornelia H. Cary was elected president; Mrs. C. K. Hood, vice-president; Mrs. E. O'Connor, corresponding secretary, and Mrs. Emma Sicardi, recording secretary. Mrs. Perry was elected treasurer, but declined on the ground that Miss Jessie J. Cassidy had filled that office so acceptably that it would be a step downward to make such a change as the one involved in this election. There was a little good-natured discussion, and Mrs. Perry was urged to accept, but she peremptorily declined, and Miss Cassidy was unanimously re-elected without the formality of a vote.

Mrs. Cary took the chair and made a short address. She appointed as auditors for the ensuing year Mrs. Perry, Miss Craft and Miss Clarke.

The newly elected officers will be formally installed at a dinner to be given at the Union League Club on Thursday, the 21st inst. Men as well as women will be present, and addresses will be made by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, Miss Margaret Chanler, Henry Sanger Snow, Miss Elizabeth Curtis, and others. It is expected that each of the newly-elected officers will have something to say, and the occasion will be made a notable demonstration in the cause of woman's suffrage.
