PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by Walt Evens

Greetings! Thompson Center CEO Gregg Ritz has purchased the company from Smith and Wesson. They'll start making parts such as magazines and breech plugs for their cartridge guns and inline muzzleloaders. In the future, they plan on bringing back the Hawken, Renegade, and Seneca sidelocks to name a few. They have the original factory in Rochester, New Hampshire, and another company in Ohio which I believe is called Thompson Integrated Parts. I'm not sure how they are going to handle Lifetime Warranties from Smith and Wesson. Those sold while owned by them will be covered by that company.

A few of us went down to south Douglas County to look at a prospective location fur a future rendezvous near Azalea (Exit 88). It's on private property so we won't have to deal with the government and it's about 3 miles from the freeway. It has more positives than negatives. We'll need to figure some things out. The biggest would be do we have enough members to put on a rondy in 2025?

We did some maintenance on the club trailer. We patched some holes in the roof caused by the ice storm. We're going to replace a plastic piece on the top front that holds the lights. All were set at 25 yards. The first was a Buffalo Head with five shots. The points were 10 for the face, 20 for the top and 30 for the horns. The second had three orange dots with two shots each. It was kind of a progressive target. If you hit one on the first shot, then you had five more for the other two. You only scored 10 points when you hit it once. No extra for multiple strikes.

The third was five orange dots with two shots each. Dave said over the phone it was the same as the last target, but I

don't remember it that way. The score was 10 points a hit. The last one was eleven orange bullseye targets with one shot each. The scoring is standard bullseye, 10X, 10, 9, 8, 7, etc.

The weather was decent, everyone had a good time although I had a mechanical problem I had to fix right at the start. I want to thank everybody who showed up. Dave for sponsoring a fun and challenging match, Melody Morrell for scoring and Bob Morrell for taking the targets to her. -Walt
