FROM THE PASTOR

Congratulations! is definitely one of those things we should say to ourselves before we die. Yet, why wait? So here goes - I want to say to the Consistory of our church and to you too as a congregation, congratulations - for entrusting this excellent group of leaders with the process of a three-year strategic plan. In the end, the process produced more than I could have ever asked or thought.

Initially, the Consistory was responsible to take a hard and honest look at the church and then develop a mission statement, discern our core values and look at our current strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and trends and threats (S.W.OT.)

Here's how it fell out. This is what we knew to be true about ourselves. This is what we agreed would continue to guide us into the future.



Mission Statement:

As an inclusive community of love and support, St. James United Church of Christ is a spiritual home for all people to grow in faith and come together in service.

Next, they were to develop a **vision statement**. To do this, we decided not to concentrate on "what" we are going to do, before looking at who is underserved (which we could serve well because of our strengths) or not being served at all (where were the gaps). It was then we determined that we would:

• Utilize **pet therapy dogs** to: help kids with reading, reduce stress, decrease isolation and increase socialization of those in our community. Initially, we will be



offering this summer pet therapy on the first Wednesday of each month on June 7, July 5 and August 2 9:00-10:00 AM (for those in our <u>food pantry</u> facing stress due to illness, unemployment, disabilities, and living in poverty, and a <u>reading for children</u> of participants of the Essential Oils classes three times during the summer: June 27, July 25 and August 15 (7:30-8:30 PM).

- Support **those dealing with cancer.** Initially, we will provide resources for those going through chemotherapy beginning Fall 2017.
- Advocacy and support to the **LGBT** (lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender) **community.** Initially, we will have a workshop for LGBT couples, which will be held winter 2018.
- Help **families dealing with addiction**. Initially, we will have a workshop for those who are dealing with addiction in their family, which will be held spring 2018.

Last, but by no means least, the Consistory decided a better way to look at our three years of filling gaps and providing what is so needed in our community is to see them as new adventures, and not settle for the familiar yet dry, boring term: strategic plan.

In the fall, as part of our stewardship campaign, we will be presenting to the congregation ways they can actively support these new adventures.

And so, congratulations Consistory, and St. James! You have refused to say we are already doing enough. You have refused to say we have never done this before, and so can't do it now. Congratulations for having the heart of Jesus, a vision for God's reign on earth, and a mind that has keenly seen what is and what is not and then acted on God's prompts and nudges regarding these things. I could not be more pleased or proud as your pastor. Just add it to my list as another reason why I love being here, and serving with you. And so I say again, Congratulations!

Dorcas is a St. James Ministry. It's open to all church and community members who "wish to stitch" and welcomes your prayers and support.


THRESHOLDS

Rev. Bill Worley's recap of the Pennsylvania Southeast Conference UCC 2017 Spring Meeting

After last year's fruitful Annual Meeting, I challenged the Planning Team to create an even better event. Last weekend, they succeeded!! The weekend was not without its challenges (dorm room beds that were too high and pillows that were too thin) BUT we executed the business of the Conference in a transparent, effective manner (Thanks to moderator Rev. Barb Pence) and got to the spiritual revival and transformation that we (and this world) desperately need.

Our UCC Executive Minister for Justice and Witness, Rev. Traci Blackmon, preached a prophetic word after we installed our new Associate Conference Minister for Congregational Development, Rev. Cean James. Our workshop presenters led conversations and shared planning to transform ourselves and our congregations. Shane Claiborne shared a vision for a transformative community that leads in the direction of the New Reformation. On Sunday morning Evelyn Greenberg, the last Consistory President of Pilgrim Community UCC in Philadelphia presented the Conference with a \$200,000.check from the sale of their church building. The members of this church wanted their legacy to live on and have asked the donated funds go to Member In Discernment education and new church starts. During our closing worship, Sunday morning, Rev. Dr. Yvette Flunder challenged us to add chairs to the tables around which God gathers us for potluck and holy communion.

We quickly amended our Conference Constitution and Bylaws, and we overwhelmingly agreed to continue the merger conversation with the Pennsylvania Northeast Conference. Ten folks have applied to be part of the team to make that happen. If you'd like to be considered, fill out the application and send it to Sue in the office at <u>susan@psec.org</u> by July 1st. We nominated and installed the leaders of our Conference before which I issued a few challenges of my own in a State of the Conference Address.

THE CIRCUS




