
"NOT in the Bible" continues during Lent

2 Corinthians 1: 8-11: "8We do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, of the affliction we experienced in Asia; for we were so utterly, unbearably crushed that we despaired of life itself. ⁹Indeed, we felt that we had received the sentence of death so that we would rely not on ourselves but on God who raises the dead. ¹⁰He who rescued us from so deadly a peril will continue to rescue us; on him we have set our hope that he will rescue us again, ¹¹as you also join in helping us by your prayers, so that many will give thanks on our behalf for the blessing granted us through the prayers of many.



Bishop Daniel Beaudoin wrote this online today: "Yesterday, I was blessed to worship with the people of God at First Lutheran in Findlay. They gather every Sunday morning to worship in an inspiring sanctuary.

Beautiful furnishings in the chancel. Simple wooden pews. Ornate stained glass. Majestic organ. Silence. This is holy space. Space that helps us enter into sacred time and sacred place. I know that God is in all places, at all times, but somehow this space helps me become more mindful of God's presence."

What he didn't say was what he told me repeatedly: that he was most amazed by the people of First. He couldn't believe how friendly and welcoming and upbeat everyone was. "This is not typical," he told me. (He also agreed with what Bishop Lohrmann always said to me when he visited us, that the people of First listen to the Word of God in the lessons and message with extraordinary intensity. I always told Bishop Lohrmann, "That's because they never know what I'm going to say!")

Do you know how proud it makes me to serve you when I'm told this by visitors to our church? Council has begun to examine what we can do increase our attendance on Sunday mornings, but the most important work is already being done by you every week: you treat each other and those who visit us as beloved children of God, as people worthy of our attention and love. Keep up the good, meaning godly, work!

Interview with Julie Buck

- 1. What is your role on the Christian Education Committee? I co-chair with Sally Rice. I have served for one year but had been chair for several years while serving as the Christian Education Director.
- 2. What are the Committee's responsibilities? We choose the curriculum for Sunday School and ask for volunteers to teach. We also help fund catechism and provide items for confirmation. We also oversee getting volunteers and curriculum for Vacation Bible School.
- 3. How is the Sunday School going? As a member of the committee and teacher we are struggling with how to get more parents to volunteer and bring their children to Sunday school to learn about the Bible stories. We also would like to see more involvement with the adult classes that are available.

We have changed the set-up of individual grades meeting to a group setting in the preschool to 12th grade with a video for the Bible learning aspect and then having games, crafts and singing. We are using the junior high/high school youth to help with crafts and games.

- 4. What are some of the challenges in teaching children and youth, as well as adults? Some of the challenges I feel personally are that we are competing with so many outside activities that it is easy to just sleep in because everyone is tired.
- 5. How can the members of First Lutheran aid you in this vital ministry? We ask that all remember when they baptized their children and those who were confirmed that we made a commitment to church and Bible learning. What better way to honor this than attending and volunteering for Sunday school activities?

Mary wondered, how can this be, I'm not even married. The Holy Spirit comes upon Mary and she became pregnant. Joseph takes her in marriage even though she is pregnant.

"Who do you say I am?"

The shepherds are told that a Savior is born in Bethlehem, the promised Messiah who is to bring Peace. Peace, yes blessed peace and most of us are looking for this peace. But it is hard to grasp as we see in Luke 4.16f. Jesus visits His home town and the people are enthusiastic about having a celebrity in their midst until they ask Him to read in the synagogue. Jesus takes the scroll and reads Isaiah 61 or as Luke 4.18-19 writes:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, 19 to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

What gets in the way of this blessed peace that Jesus brings? What gets in our way of enjoying the peace Jesus wants to give us? Even the apostles struggled with this peace that seemed to be like a cloud, here but quickly gone.





"Five Lessons You Can Learn from Fictional Families"

- 1. Nurture all the great love in your life. In Jane Austen novels like Pride and Prejudice and Sense and Sensibility, readers tend to focus only on the romantic relationships. In reality, what really shapes the main characters are their relationships with their sisters. Female friends, brothers and sisters have major influences on women's lives. It is important to take care of these lifelong relationships.
- 2. Even role models make mistakes. Atticus Finch is held up as a great parent...yet he does indeed put his kids in danger in To Kill a Mockingbird. Sometimes Finch misses the boat as do all parents at one time or another. Yet they can still be role models.
- 3. Teasing can bring a family together. Look at the Weasleys in the Harry Potter series. The family members say "I love you" by showing up and by joking around. Once in a while they go too far, but for the most part, they show their closeness by NOT going far.
- 4. You can make your own fun. While they do bicker like sisters, Meg, Jo, Beth and Amy in Little Women spend their days putting on plays, creating a newspaper, forming a club, and volunteering in the community. They DO make their own fun.
- 5. Every relative has something to teach you. In One Crazy Summer by Rita Williams-Garcia, three sisters learn that understanding is about seeing things from someone else's perspective AND about opening up our own minds.

Whether that's eating unusual food, preparing a new dish in the kitchen, asking someone you just know from church for lunch (who knows, you may become good friends), attend the community dinner. Volunteer at the community dinner. Attend a lecture at the library. Paint a picture at Amazing Minds with a friend.

What I like most about these suggestions is this: every time I get out there and encounter someone new, I have a chance to spread the word of God. Okay, I don't mean preaching during the whole gathering...I mean suggesting grace before a lunch out. Or a quick prayer together if someone is having a difficult time.

One time in Florida, a friend of mine had to leave early because her mother was suddenly very sick. Another friend saw that Carole was in tears, rushed over to us, quickly heard the problem and said "Let's pray." And she said the most beautiful little prayer asking God not only for good health for the Mother but also comfort and safe travels for Carole as she rushed home to North Carolina. I watched Carole physically relax. She quietly said "Thank You", hugged us both, and walked back to her camper.

That is spreading the word of God. And...then sometimes it is merely reflecting God's love in the other person.
