

Thoughts From Hatton

Overview of Matthew - Romans

For the New Testament, one must begin with the gospel records, as recorded by separate men. Matthew is the first book of our English New Testaments. The title that could be placed on this book is "Jesus is King." Matthew could be broken down by the following points: the thirty years (1-4:11), the Galilean ministry (4:12-18:35), the Perean ministry (19-20), the passion week (21-27) and resurrection (28). The other gospels could fall under the same points, but with different chapter divisions. Marks divisions, following the same points with some put together, are: 1:1-13; 1:14-9:50; 10-14:9; 11:1-15:47; 16. Luke's divisions, again with the same points, different divisions: 1-4:13; 4:14-9:50; 9:51-19:28; 19:29-23:55; 23:56-24:53. John's are around the same: 1:1-4:42; 4:43-8:59; 9-12:11; 12:12-10:42; 20:1-21:25.

The title for Acts would be "conversions." It could be divided by the places where events took place. Jerusalem (1:1-12:23), Antioch (13:1-28:31). Now, the Pauline epistles will be brought into consideration, beginning with Romans. Romans may have the title "justification" ascribed to it. The book of Romans may be studied under the following outline: prologue (1:1-17), patriarchal system (1:18-32), Jewish system (2), Jews and Gentiles fell short of God's glory (3), Abraham's example (4), the consequence of sin (5), baptism's essentiality (6), how law works (7), the gospel is superior (8), Jews' wrong feelings (9-11), the Christian ethic (12), how government works (13), dealing with scruples (14), forbearance with those who are weak (15), personal greetings (16).



JOTTINGS FROM JACK



Psalm 51 - The Penitent's Prayer

"Have mercy upon me, O God, according to thy lovingkindness: according unto the multitude of thy tender mercies blot out my transgressions."

This psalm was written by David when Nathan had come to him after committing adultery with Bathsheba and murdering her husband, Uriah (**2 Sam. 11:1-12:15**). It is an outstanding example of a "penitential psalm" (cf. also **Ps 6:1-10; 38:1-22; 130:1-8**) in which David confesses his sin and prays for forgiveness. We do well to learn from it "the art of confessing our sins" (**1Jn 1:9**).

David begins with **his plea** for God to forgive him, appealing to His loving kindness and tender mercy. Note that he does not ask God to forgive him based upon any good he may have done in the past. He acknowledges his sin against God (in very figurative terms), and how it is contrary to God's desire for him. He prays not only for God to cleanse him, but also to renew and restore to him the joy of salvation (**1-12**).

David's plea is followed by **his promise** to teach other sinners, that they too might be converted to God. He promises also to sing aloud of God's righteousness, for he knows that God delights in such when it comes from a broken and contrite spirit (**13-17**).

The psalm ends with **his prayer** for God to do good for Zion and Jerusalem, that He might be pleased by the burnt offerings offered on the altar. Note that David has not forgotten to pray for *God's* interest, while praying for his own (**18-19**).

This penitential psalm should be studied along with **Psalm 32**, in which David describes the blessedness and joy of one who has received the forgiveness prayed for in this psalm.
