### **CLERGY COLUMN**

### Happy Lord's Day!

Here is your first reminder about November 1st, All Saints Day, being a Holy Day of Obligation for us as Catholic-Christians. I'm trying to arrange our Mass times to be different from other local parishes, so that you may have as many opportunities to fulfill your obligation as possible. I know these non-Sunday Masses can be a little tricky sometimes with our overly busy schedules. Each of our parishes is within 20 minutes or less of another parish (Grygla to Goodridge is 20 minutes, Goodridge to TRF is 20 minutes, Oklee to Brooks is 9 minutes), so I'm confident we all can make it work. I'll let you know about local Mass times at the bottom of this article.

I hope you've been enjoying the sermon/homily series about the Eucharist, our greatest treasure as Catholic-Christians. I have been enjoying preparing the homilies and being able to take some extra time to talk about the Eucharist. Normally, it would be in my mind to try to fit everything into one homily, but this has helped to spread things out a bit. It may be the case that some of you think they are *still too much, but that's ok. We can try our best to be clear about what we believe, in hopes that those who do not believe will have an opportunity to begin believing.* 

Last week I began talking about covenants, which is obviously important since it's a word we hear each and every time we attend Mass. During the Consecration of the Eucharist, we hear those words from Jesus, "This is the chalice of my blood, the blood of the new and eternal covenant, which will be poured out for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins." Hopefully we also know that, since this is a <u>new</u> covenant, there were other, older covenants in the Old Testament. These included covenants with Noah, Abraham, Moses, and David. Each of these involved their own separate ritual, although they were similar in that they included God saying something such as, "I establish a covenant with you," so it could be easy to see what was happening. This, of course, also happens with Jesus. He makes it abundantly clear that he is establishing a new covenant, but with one caveat: this covenant will be eternal. There will be no further covenants established between God and man. Whatever is happening at the Last Supper is meant to last all the way until the Second Coming of Jesus.

In each of these covenants, there is a mutual self-gift between God and man. Hopefully you can see the disproportion there - God certainly does not need to give himself to us, while we clearly need to make a generous and grateful return for the gift of life that has been given to us. Still, He chooses to promise himself to us, along with his care and favor. For us in the New Covenant, where does the mutual self-gift take place? At the moment of Holy Communion during Mass. Jesus says, "Take this and eat of it, for this is my Body, which will be given up for you. Take this and drink of it, for this is the chalice of my Blood, the Blood of the new and eternal covenant." ### Communion within the context of Covenant

During the month of October, priests around the Diocese of Crookston are tasked with preaching homilies about the Holy Eucharist, which we teach is the source and summit of our Catholic-Christian faith. While each priest may have his own approach to this preaching series, the goal set by Bishop Cozzens is that each and every Catholic in this diocese will grow in understanding of the Eucharist and, therefore, grow in love of the Eucharist.

The focus in our parishes this week is Communion within the context of Covenant. Before we can explain Communion, we have to give a brief explanation of Covenant.

The best way to talk about making a covenant with someone is to compare it with making a contract. If I make a contract with someone else, the two of us are agreeing to exchange goods and services. "If you mow my lawn, I'll pay you \$20." "If you give me a ride to the nearest gas station and back, I'll fill up your tank of gas." Things like this. With these contracts, there are conditions that must be met in order for the follow-through. If I am not prepared to pay you \$20 to mow my lawn, then you won't do it or you'll take legal action if you've already done it. There are conditions that must be met, and both parties are free to walk away from the contract without consequence (sometimes there are consequences if the legal contract has been signed with conditions attached, such as a "signing bonus").

A covenant is different from this. Instead of exchanging goods and services, two people who enter into a covenant exchange their entire person. "I give my entire self to you. I hold nothing back." What does this sound like? A marriage. Marriage is a covenant between two people - they give themselves to each other in a permanent way. They are bound to each other. What does the Bible say about people who get married? "The two become one flesh." By entering into a covenant, these two people share a oneness with each other, a communion. If one of them walks away from this covenant, there are very serious consequences, called curses.

Throughout the Bible, God establishes covenants with Noah, Abraham, Moses, and David (there is some debate about Adam). In each of these covenants, God gives himself to his people, who are also supposed to give themselves to him. "I am your God and you are my people." As we (hopefully) know, God's people don't always keep their end of the covenant, which brings curses upon themselves rather than blessings. Jesus comes and establishes the New Covenant at the Last Supper. Jesus, who is God, is able to establish the covenant as both God and man. As God, he gives himself to us in the Holy Eucharist. As a man, he offers himself to the Father in sacrifice. It's a perfect covenant, which will last into eternity.

What does that mean for us? When we are baptized, we are made members of the Body of Christ, which means we enter into the New Covenant. We make an agreement with God that we will give ourselves to him, holding nothing back. He, in turn, gives himself entirely to us in the Holy Eucharist and in the other Sacraments. We are bound to him (and to other baptized Christians) and he to us. We share a oneness with God, a communion with him. However, if we break the covenant through serious sin, there are grave consequences, called curses. That communion with God is broken until we repent of our sins in Confession, which restores the covenantal bond we have with God.


