I think in some ways we forget that, we must, because we treat each other as if our master never added this second part to the Jewish shema from Deuteronomy 6:4,5 the shema reads "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might" Jesus said this was the greatest commandment and added a second part to it that we find in Matthew 22:38,39 "This is the great and first commandment. 


MEMBER SPOTLIGHT LOIS BEVERAGE

Today we tend to be people who focus on now and what the future may bring. In November let's take a moment to look at where we started. In 1909 Lutherans in Baltimore, Maryland began efforts establish a Lutheran Mission in St Mary's County. Efforts were made to hold services in a few different locations in the northern part of the county, but it took a group of new residents from Kansas to get the mission going strong. In 1911 two families decided to answer a German newspaper article enticing farmers to come to St Mary's and purchase farms. The person who put the article in that newspaper was a banker in Prince Georges County. One of those who answered was his cousin Deitrick Badenhoop and his wife Alma. Along with Deitrick and Alma came Alma's sister Elfrieda and her husband Heinrich Mueller.

Both families bought farms on what is now New Market Road the Turner with Badenhoop's buying the farm where our church stands today. The Mueller's bought a farm just a short distance down the road. Once settled the families set about being able to worship with the Mueller's offering their living room in their house as a place to start.


By November 1911 the Badenhoop's had donated land carved out of their farm to establish and build a church to be God's house.

The date for delivery of the kneelers and pew cushions is pending due to a worker shortage at the company with which we have The company contracted. hopes to deliver them within the next month.

<u>Future projects:</u>

- Replace the exterior door and framing from the Pastor's office to the outside. Approximate cost \$1,000.
- Long-term project will be to repair and replace the deteriorating asphalt in the parking lot and entrance drives including repainting the striping for parking spaces. We have not received a quote for this work, but it will cost approximately \$15,000 to \$30,000.










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


CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

- The first Thanksgiving was celebrated in 1621 over a three day harvest festival. It included 50 Pilgrims, 90 Wampanoag Indians, and lasted three days.
- Turkey wasn't on the menu at the first Thanksgiving. Venison, duck, goose, oysters, lobster, eel, and fish were likely served, alongside pumpkins and cranberries (but not pumpkin pie or cranberry sauce!)
- Abraham Lincoln proclaimed Thanksgiving a national holiday on October 3, 1863. Sarah Josepha Hale, the woman who wrote "Mary Had A Little Lamb," convinced Lincoln to make Thanksgiving a national holiday after writing letters for 17 years.
- There are four towns in the United States named "Turkey." They can be found in Arizona, Texas, Louisiana, and North Carolina.
- The history of U.S. presidents pardoning turkeys is patchy. Harry Truman is often credited with being the first president to pardon a turkey, but that's not quite true. He was the first to receive a ceremonial turkey from the National Turkey Federation – and he had it for dinner. John F. Kennedy was the first to let a Thanksgiving turkey go, followed by Richard Nixon who sent his turkey to a petting zoo. George H.W. Bush is the president who formalized the turkey pardoning tradition in 1989.
- The average number of calories consumed on Thanksgiving is 4,500.
- The tradition of football on Thanksgiving began in 1876 with a game between Yale and Princeton. The first NFL games were played on Thanksgiving in 1920.
