Take a Hike!

National Geographic has named the Israel National Trail (INT) one of the World's Best Hikes and added it to its list of the top 20 "Epic Trail" hikes. The list's author describes the INT as one that "delves into the grand scale of biblical landscapes as well as the everyday lives of modern Israelis. But beyond the immense sense of history..., the trail powerfully connects to something that often gets lost in all the headlines - the sublime beauty of the wilderness of the Middle East." He recommends walking the trail between February and May, taking advantage of "trail angels," people who offer places to stay free of charge to thru-hikers. The Israel Trail was established by the Society for the Protection of Nature in Israel (SPNI) in 1995. It is 620 miles long and runs the length of the country from Kibbutz Dan in the north to the Eilat Field School in the south. (*lerusalem Post. 8-13-12*)

Hope They Don't Wear Them While Driving......

Ultra-Orthodox Jewish men in Jerusalem have managed to separate the sexes on buses and even sidewalks in their neighborhoods where signs strongly advise women to wear high-necked, long sleeve blouses and ankle-length skirts. Now there's something new to keep women out of clear sight completely. Men who don't want to look at women they consider immodestly dressed can now wear eyeglasses that blur their vision. The glasses have stickers on the lenses allowing wearers to see clearly up close but produce blurry vision farther out. The glasses sell for about \$6. (Associated Press, 8-8-12)

They Look Like the Average House Cat

In late July, four rare sand kittens were born at the Ramat Gan Safari, an open-air zoo near Tel Aviv. The sand cat (Felis margarita) is considered extinct in Israel because other mammals have pushed them away. In the rest of the world however, they are listed as a "threatened species" by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN). The mother cat came to Israel from Germany two years ago. The proud papa, who arrived two years earlier, is from Poland. The Safari park is part of a European breeding program for sand cats. They are the only species of feline to truly live in a desert environment. They are able to survive without drinking because they get all the water they need through their food. Sand cats live mostly in the deserts of Asia and Africa. (www. dailymail.co.uk, 8-16-12)

Breaking the Glass Ceiling, Jewish Style

At the end of August, Forbes Magazine released its list of the "2012 World's 100 Most Powerful Women." There are several Jewish women on the list and Jill Abramson, executive editor of the New York Times (and the first woman to lead the 161-year-old newspaper) is named number five. The list includes world leaders, executives, entertainers and entrepreneurs. Other Jewish women on the list are Sheryl Sanberg, Chief Operating Officer of Facebook; Irene Rosenfeld, CEO and Chairwoman of Kraft Foods; Susan Wojcicki, senior Vice President of Google; Mindy Grossman, CEO of the Home Shopping Network; fashion designer Diane Von Furstenburg; Anna Wintour, editor-in-chief of Vogue Magazine: Safra Catz. CFO and President of software giant Oracle and Mary Schapiro, chair of the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. (www.jta.org, 8-23-12)

Honoring Ludwig Guttmann

A major exhibition at the Jewish Museum in London honoring Sir Ludwig Guttmann, coincided with the opening of the 2012 London Paralympic Games. Guttmann is known as the "founding father" of the modern-day Paralympic Games. What began as a small gathering of disabled British World War II veterans in 1948 has grown to become one of the largest international sporting events. Mr. Guttmann, a lewish neurosurgeon who fled Nazi Germany and went to Britain, saw athletic competition as therapy for patients with spinal injuries in 1948, a time when such injuries were considered a death sentence. He is credited with transforming perceptions of people with disabilities and changing the course of thousands of lives. Guttmann took patients off sedation to intentionally make them uncomfortable and forced them to sit up and work muscles, trying to keep them motivated. He tirelessly argued that with proper treatment paraplegics could live full and rewarding lives. He believed that competition would encourage his patients to work harder and got them involved in wheelchair basketball. Guttmann recognized that these patients were still paralyzed but he was determined to make them taxpayers. Guttmann was honored with knighthood in 1966. Though he died in 1980, he lived long enough to see the Paralympic Games grow. Guttmann's daughter. Eve Loeffler. 79. was a torchbearer and this year's Mayor of the Paralympic Village welcoming the participants to the games. The competition brought some 4,200 athletes from 165 nations to the city. El Al Israel Airlines is going to honor all tickets that were purchased during a computer glitch this past summer which set off a three-hour buying frenzy. Thousands of round-trip tickets were sold for only \$330. Danny Saadon, El Al's vice president of North America released a statement in which he said El Al would honor the low fare. "The decision...was to save face with El Al... Hopefully we have provided an opportunity to many first timers to visit Israel..." NASA's *Curiosity* rover which landed on Mars on August 6th includes a refrigerator that was developed and manufactured in *Ein Harod*, the kibbutz located in northern Israel. *Ricor Cryogenic and Vacuum Systems* specializes in miniature refrigerators designed to reach very low temperatures (minus 173 degrees Celsius) for military, space and commercial applications. The refrigerator is being used for one of the experiments on board the Mars rover. (www.ynetnews.com, 8-19-12)

In Memoriam

-Gerhard "Gad" Beck, one of the last gay Jewish survivors of the Holocaust, has died. He was 88. Born in Berlin, he was the son of a lewish father (his mother was not born lewish). Beck's autobiography, An Underground Life: Memoirs of a Gay Jew in Nazi Berlin, was published in 1999. In it, he describes that he managed to stay alive because of forged papers, false identities, and the good will of many individuals. Beck claimed that his religion was a greater peril than his sexual orientation. Beck worked with a group of underground Zionist operatives and is credited with smuggling rations, cash and clothing to fellow Jews who were living in hiding. It is believed he helped some Jews flee to safety in Switzerland. Only three months before the Nazi surrender, Beck was betrayed, arrested and held by the Gestapo. After the war. Beck took part in efforts to bring lewish refugees to Palestine and he aided in Israel's War of Independence. In the 1970s, he went back to Berlin and taught German students about the lewish culture that had once flourished in their country. (www.washingtonpost.com, 6-26-12)

-Sami Rohr, a major philanthropist, died at age 86. Rohr reportedly gave some \$250 million to Jewish causes, especially Jewish education and culture, through his Rohr Family Foundation. A former Colombian Jewish real estate mogul, Rohr gave tens of millions to Chabad to establish outposts throughout the former Soviet Union, on college campuses and at remote spots around the world. In 2006, his children named a \$100,000 prize for Jewish literature after him in honor of his 80th birthday, the Sami Rohr Prize for Jewish literature. The award recognizes "the important role of emerging writers in examining the Jewish experience." (The 2012 prize went to Gal Beckerman's When They Come for us We'll Be Gone: The Epic Struggle to Save Soviet Jewry.) Rohr grew up in Berlin but his family left the country after Kristallnacht. He eventually moved to Bogota, Colombia where he made his fortune in real estate. In 1981, Rohr and his late wife moved to Florida. (www.jta.org, 8-7-12)

-Art Modell. former owner of the NFL's Baltimore Ravens and Cleveland Browns, died recently at the age of 87. He was a pioneer in the NFL's partnership with television networks and pushed for the creation of "Monday Night Football." He and his wife Patricia (she died a year ago) were known for their philanthropy. Modell grew up in an Orthodox neighborhood in Brooklyn the son of an electronics dealer who lost everything in the 1929 stock market crash. He dropped out of high school to assist the family working as an electrician's helper and earned 45 cents an hour. After serving in the Army Air Corps during World War II, Modell saw the potential of the growing television industry. In 1960, when he was 35 years-old, he worked at a Madison Avenue advertising agency and learned that the Cleveland Browns were for sale. Avid sports fan that he was, Modell paid \$3.93 million for the team. In 1996 he moved his team to Baltimore changing its name to the Ravens and in doing so, broke the hearts of Browns' fans (sort of like some of us who are still hurting from the Brooklyn Dodgers' move to Los Angeles). The city of Cleveland went to court to block the move and the case ended with a \$12 million settlement from Modell, with a promise that a new team be created in Cleveland with the Browns' name and record. In 1999, due to financial difficulties. Modell sold a minority interest in the

Ravens to Steve Biscotti, who eventually bought the controlling interests in 2004. *(www.jta.org, 9-6-12)*

-Marvin Hamlisch, prolific composer and arranger of dozens of Broadway musicals and movies, died recently. He was 68. Hamlisch earned three Academy Awards, four Emmys, four Grammys, three Golden Globes, a Tony and a Pulitzer Prize for the Broadway musical, *A Chorus Line*. He composed more than 40 film scores (*Ordinary People, Sophie's Choice, Take the Money and Run*, and most notably, *The Way We Were*, for Barbra Streisand). Hamlisch was born in New York to Viennese Jewish parents. He became the youngest student ever accepted to the Julliard School – he was seven years-old. (*www.jta.org, 8-7-12*)

Did You Know...

-Israel's Cabinet has approved plans to bring the last of Ethiopia's approximately 2,200 Jews to Israel over the next two years. More than 120,000 Ethiopian Jews now live in Israel after waves of immigration over the past thirty years. Known as Falash Mura, they are members of a community that converted to Christianity under duress more than a century ago but have come back to Judaism. Some have guestioned whether the Falash Mura are actually Jewish and as a result, the immigrants are routinely required to go through a religious conversion. Once in the country, many face problems assimilating because of cultural differences and at times, racism. (Associated Press, 7-8-12)

-Mayor Michael Bloomberg proclaimed August 28th that just passed "Richard Tucker Day" in New York City, honoring the late famous cantor who went on to be the celebrated lead tenor of the Metropolitan Opera. Tucker would have turned 99 this past August. There were tributes all day from New York's classical music radio station, the Metropolitan Opera, the New York Philharmonic, Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall. And for the hungry, the Stage Deli offered an offmenu special sandwich, "The Richard Tucker Reuben" (the singer was born Rubin Tucker in 1913). (*The Forward, 8-27-12*) ◊

The ceremonial turning of the year feels more intense than ever—more serious, immediate, and in our faces. It's odd to say this, but I am grateful--not of course for the suffering of our friends and families fighting illness or for the leave-taking of those whose struggle is over. What I am grateful for is their teachings.

Not all learning happens in school. And although we study the same lesson each year, I feel more porous this year. It's sinking in.

I am knocked out, split apart, and filled up by what I have seen, heard and felt among us: people defeating all odds of life expectancy through sheer will-power, love of life, and need to do for others; people in pain and under stress smiling and reassuring

those worried about them; people with illness in their own home making chicken soup and bringing it to comfort others with equal and greater difficulty. The grace of it all is unutterable. It is beyond mind and beyond words.

Maybe that is why we need ritual, music, poetry and prayer along with our Torah.

At the beginning of every service, we acknowledge we are the only synagogue in 126 miles and that we welcome all branches of Judaism. We also welcome Jewish nonbelievers. There are agnostics among us as well as Orthodox, Conservative, Reform, and Reconstructionists. It is good that we come together on High Holidays. It is tradition, over 5000 years worth, that unites us and makes us a tribe, not solely how we celebrate our Judaism. Sitting together, contemplating as a group our behaviors that have not "made the mark" or expressed our best, most compassionate selves, we resolve together to do better, be better, through prayer, turning to-



wards the principles of our tradition, and acting generously toward one another.

When the *shofar* blasts its final wake-up call, that long *tekiah g'dolah* on Yom Kippur, I want to take that vibration into this new year, stay awake, and honor the teachers all around us, past and present, both in body and in spark. How brilliant our ancestors were, to create core ceremonies, both for individual and group prayer, the Kaddish every time there is a service, and Yizkor, our ceremony of remembrance that takes place

four special times each year.

Most of us were together for the first Yizkor, the fixed one that takes place at Yom Kippur. May we all be together again for the second one, just weeks away, coming right after Sukkot on Shemini Atzeret

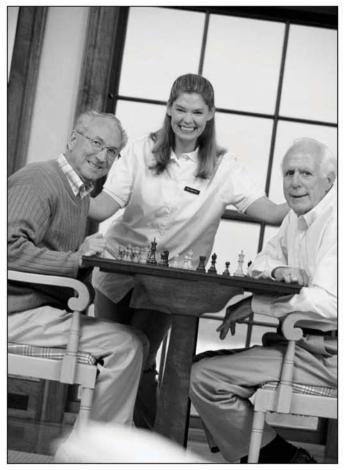
(we will observe it on Friday, October 12). A New Year has begun. We, and our Sunday School children, will roll back our Torahs to their start. Taking turns holding the Torahs in our arms, we'll dance around the synagogue seven times. Each week over the course of this year, we'll recount once more the unique stories that unite us, from the creation of the world to the creation of a people.

The child who blows a shofar, dances a Torah around our sanctuary, fills a blue box with coins, decorates a Sukkah, and sings blessings enthusiastically, whether by reading Hebrew or by heart, is a gift, a prayer for continuity, as are the new members, young and old, who continue to join us.

To be a member of a shul is to be part of a living organism. To dismember is to tear apart. To re-member is to put back together, to bring to life. Our loved ones stay alive and remain part of us as long as we remember them. What a fine tradition, and so helpful in times of sorrow. To life. To continuity. And to remembrance. \Diamond
