DORVAL WINS PEDESTRIAN AWARD

First place awards to four Canadian municipalities with the best pedestrian safety programmes were announced here today by R. J. Hastings, president of the Canadian Automobile Association, with Dorval, P. Q. winning first place in the 10,000 - 25,000 population group.

Award winning cities are: Population over 200,000 - first place Hamilton, Ont. Population 50,000 to 200,000 - first place Windsor, Ont. Population 25,000 to 50,000 - first place - Sault Ste Marie, Ont. Population 10,000 to 25,000 - first place - Dorval, Que.

Brockville, Ont., took second place in the 10,000 to 25,000 population class. Given honorable mention in their respective classes were Vancouver, B.C., Kitchener, Ont., Calgary, Alta., Trail, B.C., and Samia, Ont.

In announcing the awards, Mr. Hastings said the response to the pedestrian programme sponsored by the Royal Automobile Club of Canada, the Canadian Automobile Association and the American Automobile Association had "exceeded our highest expectations. Canadian municipalities are giving increased attention to saving the lives of pedestrians and we are encouraged

by the fact that 63 cities made submissions in our pedestrian safety evaluation and that thirteen of the cities participating are located on the island of Montreal."

"When a similar AAA programme was launched in the U.S. in 1937," Mr. Hastings said, "a total of 15,500 pedestrians were killed in traffic accidents. Last year 7,800 pedestrians were killed. In 20 years the U.S. has been able to cut its pedestrian traffic deaths in half."

Mr. Louis P. Beaubien, Chairman of the Royal Automobile Club's Pedestrian Accident Prevention Committee said that there is no reason why as good, if not better results should not soon be apparent in Canada. Mr. Beaubien praised the pedestrian safety efforts put forward by school officials, traffic engineers and police departments on the island of Montreal.

In judging the submissions from Canadian municipalities a comprehensive set of factors were taken into consideration including pedestrian casualty records for a number of years, safety records maintained by municipalities, efficiency of safety legislation and enforcement, engineering, school traffic safety and public education programmes.

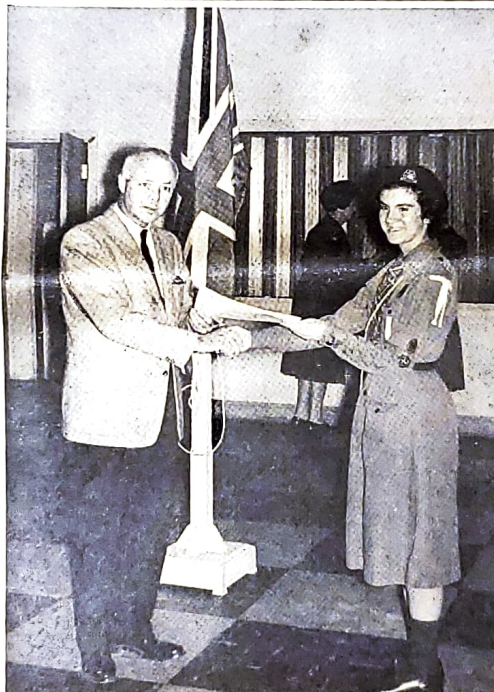

Following the parade through the City, Little Leaguers and the Cadet Band formed a square at St. Charles Park for a salute to the Queen and recitation of Little Leaguers Pledge, read in English by Mr. Jimmie Waugh, 1st Vice President of the Directors, in French by Mr. Gaby Filliatraut, Publicity. Mr. Ross Hill accepted, on behalf of the Little League Directors a \$600 cheque from Mr. John Pope of the Lions Club.

Alderman Mrs. Hazel Ballantyne expressed the appreciation of the City to the Lions Club, hardworking Directors and Managing Personnel and to Dorval Merchants, for their support of the Little League Project. Mrs. Ballantyne threw the first ball - Ross Hill batting - John Pope catching -- to officially open the season. Major Treat Ice cream, and 7UP were given out to the children before the Red Sox met the Tigers for the opening game, defeating them 8-7.

At the end of the third inning of this game all officers, members, managers and coaches of The Little League joined the players on the diamond and a minute of silence was observed in tribute to the late Jack Kollias, popular coach, and manager of last years All Stars, who died recently in the United States.

Mr. Hill has expressed a special vote of thanks to the Parade Committee, especially to Mr. Fred Hamer, Mr. Gaby Filliatraut, Mr. Fern McGeachan, and to Mr. Romeo Braugh who did so much work on the arrangement for floats pennants and refreshments.

FROM IRELAND

Our group of Commonwealth Parliamentarians has now moved to Belfast where we are studying the form of local government which evolved in Northern Ireland after the granting of Partial Independence in 1920 by Westminster.

The Parliament of Northern Ireland is somewhat similar to a provincial parliament in Canada, but with much more limited powers. The population is numerically about the same as that of the Island of Montreal, and there are overtones of federal, provincial, and municipal governments in this complex arrangement which finally resulted from Ireland's long struggle for freedom and the forces that opposed this struggle.

The present Parliament of Stormont is composed of 36 Unionists, 4 Labour, and 12 Anti-Partitionists, making 52 Members of Parliament. There is also a Senate of 26 Members.

Northern Ireland also sends 12 Members directly to Westminster. A Member of the House of Lords in the United Kingdom may also be a Member of either the Commons or the Senate in Northern Ireland.

The visitor soon finds that not only does his ship go backwards into Belfast Harbour, but that as he goes north into Donegal he finds himself in the South of Ireland.

The Irish are a friendly race who try to like everybody. It is very fortunate that they do, because God help you if an Irishman doesn't like you!

They also have a long memory. I once saw a sign chalked on a wall which read "Remember 1147".

Three Local Sea Rangers To Represent Canada At International Jubilee Camps

Special national and international camps, commemorative postage stamps, yellow tulips forming a river of gold from coast to coast across Canada and flaming beacons girding the British Isles, are all part of the celebration of the Golden Anniversary of the Girl Guide Movement. It was in the Summer of 1910 that the first Guide Company was started in England and later the same year the Guide movement had its beginning in Canada.

Dorval has a triple reason to take pride in these celebrations with the announcement by Mrs. T.C. Pawlett, Commissioner, that three Strathmore Division Sea Rangers, from S.R.S. Skeena, have been chosen to represent Canada and Quebec Province at three of the most exciting of the International Jubilee Camps.

Miss Monica Bulford, Skipper of the Skeena Crew, who hold their weekly meetings in Pine Beach Community Hall, will sail from Montreal on July 12th on the *Empress of Britain*, as guide-in-charge of a group of twenty-five girls aged seventeen to nineteen who will represent Canada at the British World Jubilee Camp. They will spend six weeks in camp and touring the British Isles, arriving back in Montreal September 2nd. Miss Bulford, a teacher for the past six years at Courland Park School, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Bulford of Sir George

Simpson St., Lachine.

Sea Ranger Barbara Beatty, younger daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Beatty of Sherbrooke St., Lachine, has been chosen as one of the two English-speaking guides from Quebec to attend one of the Canadian Jubilee Camps. Each Province is playing host to girls from all over Canada and Great Britain this summer, and Barbara will leave July 16th for Lake Hardwood, N.S. During her month in the Maritimes she will spend some days in Halifax and Sydney and two weeks in camp. There will be twenty-two girls there, two from each province and two others from England. Barbara is in her graduating year at Lachine High School, and has had a full life of Guiding from Brownies, when she was with the St. Augustines Pack, then Guides with the 5th Lachine Company and finally Sea Rangers.

The third happy member of the S.R.S. Skeena to be chosen to represent Quebec and Canada at a Jubilee Camp is Jacqueline Shipton, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C.B. Shipton, Strathmore Blvd., who will be one of six Rangers

going from Canada to Mexico in September. These girls will stay at "Our Cabana" one of the show places of World Guiding. Situated in Cuernavaca, fifty miles from Mexico City, "Our Cabana" which was built by the World Friendship Fund maintains a year round staff and like "Our Chalet" in Switzerland welcomes Guides from all over the world. While the Canadian girls are there they will spend a week working with UNICEF in a nearby poor village, a project the Guides at "Our Cabana" help with all year. The Jubilee year will see Rangers from all over the World meeting in Mexico and the Canadian girls will have a wonderful opportunity to discuss ranging and hear about how it is carried on in other parts of the world. And the ideas they take home with them will be of great interest and value to their own Rangers Crews.

Federation Of Catholic Charities Announce 1960 Objective

The Ritz Carlton Hotel was the setting for a recent luncheon given by Mr. C.C. Dunn, Chairman, Federation of Catholic Charities, 1960 Campaign, for the pastors of the English-speaking Catholic parishes on the island of Montreal. All the parishes were represented, from St. Aloysius in the East to Corpus Christi in the West. Guest of honor were His Excellency, Bishop L.P. Whelan, Auxiliary Bishop of Montreal, and Mr. W.H. Wilson, President of the Federation of Catholic Charities.

The luncheon was held to introduce the pastors to some of the campaign committee, and to announce the objective of the 1960 campaign. In announcing the objective of \$664,000, Mr. Dunn pointed out that every effort had been made to control rising costs and that this year's objective was \$30,000 more than last year's, in order to cover the deficits incurred in carrying on the Federation's services during 1959.

Bishop Whelan, in a short address, assured Mr. Dunn that the campaign committee would have the full co-operation of all the pastors.

Mr. Wilson praised the tireless efforts of the volunteer campaign workers who are responsible for the raising of such large sums of money. Mr. J.F. Cullen, chair-

man, Parish Division, announced his appointment of five division managers. They are Messrs. L. Storey, M. Burke, W. Jenkevic, J. Byrne and J. Fastenwein. Mr. Cullen also commented that 20 of the parishes had already named their parish chairmen for this campaign.

The meeting also approved the adoption of a new campaign theme for 1960: "Your Help is Their Hope."

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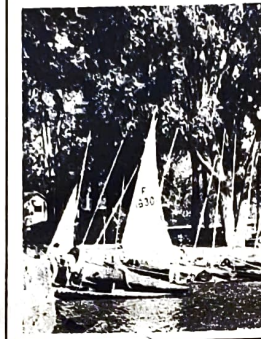
YMCA Teenagers Turn Fashion Models

Strict Observance Of Safety Rules At Camp Stressed By Scoutmaster

What happens to our boys when they attend scout or cub camps - are they well looked after - do they eat proper meals - do they get enough rest - above all are they safe!

These and many other questions were answered to the entire satisfaction of his audience when Scoutmaster Bob Steadman addressed the annual meeting of the Dorval Scout Group Ladies' Auxiliary at St. Marks' Church on Thursday night. All the mothers present were impressed with the precautions taken at the four scout camps adjacent to Montreal and felt that their sons attending camp were in good hands and under careful supervision at all times.

Mr. Steadman showed slides of cubs enjoying their week at beautiful Camp Jackson Dodds. The slides of the swimming areas showed alert lifeguards on towers, lifeguards on wharfs and floating docks, and lifeguards in and out of the water - in fact a leader for every

six boys according to the Boy Scout regulations. Also according to regulations the cubs sleep on cots with mattresses, in tents which are raised off the ground. Their food is provided by an outside source - they light no fires - carry no matches - no knives.

The life of the accredited Boy Scout at camp has more pioneering flavor. They pitch their tents and, unless the weather is above average inclement, sleep in sleeping bags on the ground. They cook their meals (with food which is provided) over an open fire. They do not decide on the menus as their ideas of a well balanced diet might be vague.

Amateur Show—Bizsters Have Fling At Annual Meetings.

This is the season of the annual dinner, as if you didn't know, when for three days last week you came home to an unopened can of spaghetti and three unwashed kids, and all you saw of your better half was an aura of perfume and a flutter of mink as she stole past you out the front door to "meet the girls."

"I'll just bet you wondered bitterly just what does go on at those Annual Dinners, and Dessert Parties which are strictly for females; and between you and me, brother, it usually isn't worth worrying about, until this year, that is. This year the Montreal-Lakeshore University Women's Club decided to provide its own entertainment, and to edify its members at the same time. Lachine General Expansion Fund-Raising Campaign

Human sympathy is deeply etched into the minds of some people, according to an experience which came to light at Lachine General Hospital this week.

Ten weeks ago, following an extensive survey by hospital consultants, the Board of Management started to organize their first fund-raising campaign in ten years to finance an urgently needed expansion programme.

The hospital is critically short of bed space. Some days the number of patients awaiting admission for bed space ranges from 40 to 60. Every day emergency cases and out-patients fill the small rooms available for treatment. Highway accidents and workers injured in local plants add to the heavy load on the doctors and staff at the hospital.

To improve this situation in the interests of the residents of the 18 Lakeshore communities the Board of Management decided the building must be enlarged, more beds must be made available and interior changes made to bring the hospital to a point where it can cope with the ever-increasing load.

The cost of the programme is \$1,800,000 of which \$1,250,000 is the objective for the approaching campaign. Corporations in and around Lachine and residents of the Lakeshore will be asked to donate to the campaign within the next few weeks.

While the organization of the campaign was in progress the hospital received a personal cheque

for a substantial amount from an 82-year old lady who lives in the area. With the unsolicited cheque was a short letter expressing appreciation of what the hospital does for all who need its services, for the excellent care this lady had received when she was a patient in the hospital and suggestion that everyone should give serious thought to what will happen if the present expansion programme is not carried out.

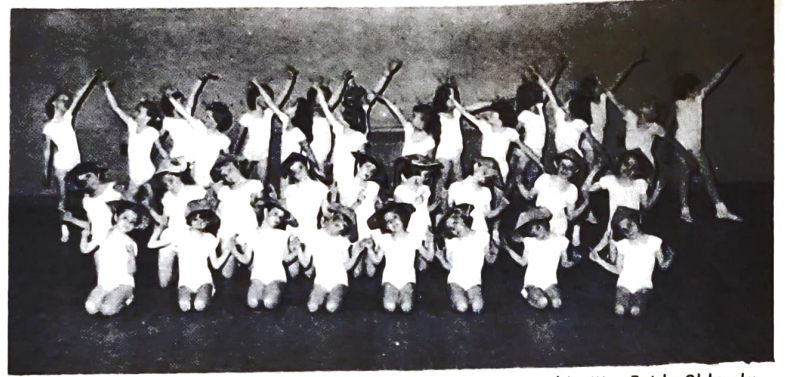
Commenting on this, campaigning officials said they hoped this gift will be an inspiration to thousands of others as "no one knows when illness may strike and when the services of this hospital may represent the difference between life and death."

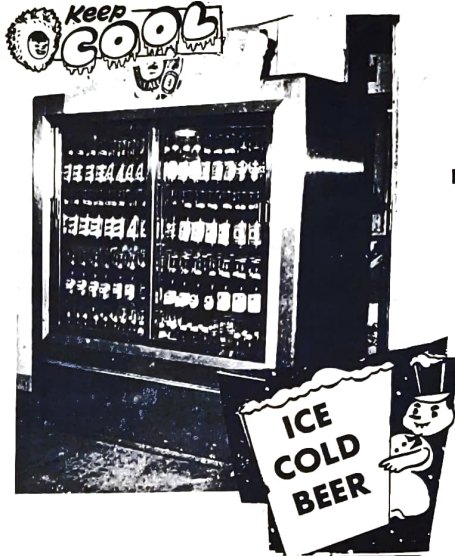
