BY LAWS OF THE Apostolic Faith Bible College, Inc. Article VII Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another. adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

- * Triune God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit
- * Creation and Formation
- * Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation
- Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life
- Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul, and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ
- * Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.
- Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit
- * Sacrament of the Lord's Supper
- * Washing of feet
- * Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers
- * Do not condone divorce and remarriage
- * Destruction of the wicked
- * Conditional Immortality
- * Rapture of the Man Child Class
- Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly
- * A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not inconsistent with the above listed basic doctrines.





Wayne Huff's 90th Birthday

April 11, 2011 was my father's 90th birthday and I want to share a wonderful thing that happened that day.

Dad has been in the Clinton Veteran's Home alzheimer's unit for five years. He is no longer able to walk or feed himself and can hardly talk at all. The last two times I had visited before his birthday he stared off into space, as though he could not see, and said nothing that I could understand.

I went because it was his birthday, but my expectations were low. Boy, was I surprised! Dad saw me across the dining room. His face lit up and he started laughing and crying when I about thirty feet away. His eyes seemed to be sharply focused on me, and he seemed to understand every word.

We went down to his room, where it is easier for me to hear his faint voice. I read his birthday card and we prayed together. He kept trying to speak. To encourage him, I began singing "Amazing Grace", which is the song he always played after tuning a piano. He laughed and cried as I sang. I said, "Dad, thank you for taking me to Sunday School and teaching me to serve the Lord. I still love Jesus." Dad smiled, then slowly but clearly said, "Well, I'm glad" and began laughing.

I cannot convey how thrilled I was to hear my dad speak those words. I went to see him for his birth-day, but I'm the one who received the gift! On the way home I could not keep from singing "Oh Say But I'm Glad", and another of Dad's favorites, "A Name I Highly Treasure". I am so thankful for my father and his relationship with Jesus. The past five years have been difficult, and I'm sure there will be more difficult days ahead, but April 11, 2011 was a wonderful blessing that I had to share with my friends and family.

Sunday, May 22,2011 started for me and my family, church family, neighbors and friends much like any other Sunday. My husband, Dennie and I had our morning coffee and I left to pick up my mother, Wanda Allgood for church and sunday school. He joined us at church, and as usual we all prepared for what we thought was another Graduation Sunday. You know-honor the graduates- have a church dinner for them-head to area high school graduations- back to church that evening. We've done that for years. We did have our worship services, dinners and went to graduations - the whole city. Little did we know that it would never be the same again for Joplin, MO and the surrounding areas. Before 5:30 that evening our city was hit with an EF5 tornado which left such devastation as I have never seen before. I do remember as a child the images of the bombed out buildings in Berlin, Germany where I lived - but that was there and then-this was now- in my hometown. We soon learned that many did not make it through, including some of our brothers and sisters in the Lord and friends and many we know lost family members to the deadly thing that attacked us. Many in our own congregation and the other congregations that we fellowship with lost so much- some everything. The deadly storm that snaked through our city left 158 dead,18,000 vehicles destroyed, 8,000 homes gone and damaged, 450 businesses wiped out leaving 5,000 without jobs, 30 churches gone, 80 Drs. offices leveled, a 9 story hospital moved on it's foundation, the high school demolished along with grade schools hit, the technical school gone and so much more than I can name. But the worst thing that storm left behind was the spirit of death and destruction that you feel as you drive through the damaged areas. It seems to try to suck out of you life and hope. You feel the oppression of the same enemy that tried to sabotage our Lord and the disciples when they were in the ship on the Sea of Galilee. You see that storm raged and tried to kill ,but all it took was the Master's voice saying Peace Be Still.And that is what has happened here in my hometown - some have heard His still small voice.- some haven't. I've heard the Master speak in my troubled soul PEACE when I walk through the rubble of my Mother's home of 55 years, I heard PEACE at a funeral of a friend that I attended recently, I've heard PEACE when my heart has ached for those that lost so much - I heard PEACE when the old familiar landmarks were gone and I wasn't sure of where I was at - I heard PEACE when others have told me their stories of riding out the storm - I've heard PEACE as I have watched the CHURCH of the LIVING GOD step up to the plate and soothe the broken lives - I've heard PEACE while watching truck after truck of debris being moved and I hear PEACE as I sit here in the Report office typing this letter.

The storm that hit Joplin was a terrible thing but the Lord has reminded me that it is nothing in comparison with the storm that is on the horizon. He also reminded me that the destruction that I have seen is nothing compared to the destruction of the enemy in lives that are without Him, lives that are filled with the rubble of this world and it is up to the Church (that's us) to work while it is day to redeem those lives far from Him. We need to not grow weary in well doing -keep sifting through the rubble for life- we need to keep on keeping on - and we need not to remove the old landmarks or we won't know where we are at - we have to keep our eyes upon Him for He is coming soon.

I also want to say "Thank You" to all of you that have prayed, come, written, sent, encouraged, listened and have done anything to help. It has not gone unnoticed. Your actions have been life giving and has strengthened those who have been weak, you have brought hope and healing.

Above all I give all honor and praise to the One that has brought PEACE in the time of trouble.

And He arose, and rebuked the wind, and he said unto the sea, PEACE, BE STILL. And the wind ceased and there was great calm. And he said unto them, Why are ye so fearful? how is it that ye have no faith? And they feared exceedingly, and said one to another, What manner of man is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?

Pastor Needed

River of Life Christian Fellowship, Trapper Creek, Alaska is looking for the right person to pastor. Trapper Creek is a small community located 115 miles north of Anchorage on the Parks Highway, which is the main highway between Anchorage and Fairbanks. There are about 20 people that are part of the church, with average Sunday morning attendance of 12-14.

The current pastors are Jay and Virginia Smith. They plan to retire to Oregon after a suitable new leadership is found. The church is incorporated with the State of Alaska and is governed by a board of directors. It is not affiliated with any denomination. it holds a full gospel or charismatic dorctrinal position. Jay and Virginia attended the Apostolic Faith Bible School in 1966.

The building is two-story, with a sanctuary that seats approximately 50. The upostairs houses the sanctuary, the nursery, the office, and a restroom. Downstairs is the fellowship hall, two classrooms and a rest room. The building was reroofed in the summer of 2010. It sits on a five acre corner lot on a paved road. The parsonage is a three bedroom mobile, with a small fourth bedroom ad-on. The church is debt-free.


The pastor will need to be self supporting, the church can provide the parsonage and help with the utilities. Work in the community is limited. Local employers are the school and the state highway division. Jobs with these are few and hard to get, but substituting with the school system and school bus driving is a possibility, there is seasonal work with two lodges, each about 20-30 miles away. There is a medical clinic about 20 miles away that is probably the largest year round employer in the area. There is medium size grocery store, a gas station and a Subway about 15 miles away and two cafe/gas station businesses here in Trapper Creek that hire. Independent handyman work provides income for some people.


