Additional nominations may be made at the regular meeting next prior to the Annual Meeting (i.e. October 17) by any member in attendance, provided that the person so nominated accepts when his/her name is proposed, and provided further that if the proposed candidate is not in attendance at this meeting, his or her proposer shall present to the Recording Secretary, a written statement from the proposed candidate signifying his or her willingness to be a candidate. No person may be a candidate for more than one position. Anyone who has accepted a nomination made by the Nomination Committee cannot accept a nomination at the regular meeting next prior the Annual Meeting.

Absentee balloting privileges for the Annual Meeting will be extended to all members in good standing who:

- a) have been members for the entire preceding fiscal year and have attended at least four of the regular meetings during that fiscal year, or

History of the ASPCA

The first Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals was founded in Britain in 1824. In 1840 Queen Victoria (a noted dog-lover) granted permission for the society to be renamed the Royal Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. Henry Bergh, an American traveling and living in Europe was aware of and interested in the activities of the RSPCA, particularly in efforts to prevent the mistreatment of carriage horses.

On returning to the U.S., Bergh began working to establish an equivalent American Society and in 1866 the ASPCA was established. In 1871 a Parisian living in New York left \$150,000 to the Society, enabling them to establish a large headquarters there. By 1886 due to Bergh's efforts, 39 states had adopted legislation relating to the protection of animals, where previously no such laws existed.

In 1874 a social worker approached Bergh to gain custody and protection of a child suffering from inhumane treatment. With several others, in 1875 Bergh formed the New York Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children.

Congressional Cemetery K-9s

Congressional Cemetery on Capitol Hill is a noted historic and active burial landmark. Many famous members of Congress are interred there and the grounds are open to the public.

Surprisingly, there is an organized members-only dog-walking group. There is a wait list and the \$225 membership fee is a tax-deductible donation (the group is heavily funded by donations.) There is also a \$50 per-dog fee (not considered a donation, 3-dog limit.) The members also take on cemetery up-keep items such as spring cleanups and tree removals. Each member is expected to contribute at least 8 hours of volunteer work. *One-Day Passes for you and your dog are available at the office for \$10.*

PVSSC Brags



On the same day Savannah (2nd picture below) earned her RLX3 (Level 3 Championship) Title. In her title run she scored a 203, placing second.






The Pawprints of History: Dogs and the Course of Human Events by Dr. Stanley Coren



This book is divided into chapters that delve into many little-known facts and events that have changed history. Why did Napoleon hate dogs, though he owed his life to a Newfoundland dog? How did the Pekingese lion-dogs evolve in the forbidden city of the Chinese Emperors, and escape extinction when the city fell?

My favorite chapter was the story of Sir Walter Scott, who secretly authored so many of the novels we love today. At the time, the writing of such novels was not considered a worthy, aristocratic and dignified occupation. But he needed the money to support his family (and many dogs) and to keep his large beloved estate solvent. So he turned to writing novels using a pseudonym. His mistake lay in including many dogs in his novel plots, and naming the fictional dogs by the same names as his own dogs! Eventually his contemporaries became suspicious and he was unmasked. The Dandie Dinmont breed is named after a character in the novel "Guy Mannering" by Walter Scott.

Halloween Reminders

- Have your evening walk early
- Use battery lights instead of candle flames in decorations
- Human treats must be kept out of pets' reach.
 Remember the artificial sweetener Xylitol is extremely toxic to dogs.
- Confine your Sheltie in a separate area away from the front door. A radio, TV or white noise machine can mask the noise of doorbell and visitors. Closed curtains or blinds will reduce outside distractions.
- Make sure that your Sheltie is wearing ID in case of escapes. If you have any reflective dog wear, now is the time to use it!
- Watch out for discarded treats on the ground November 1.

Bring your dog(s), your lawn chair and join us. Watch dogs herd cattle, sheep and ducks.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Please note: If your dog(s) is entered, there is plenty of time to help and run in your trial. Herding trials are not as hectic as obedience, rally or agility trials.

Food and Beverages: Fran has volunteered to handle the food, beverages and snacks. We provide food and beverages to judges and volunteers.

Scribes: The scribes work with the judges and make notes on the score sheets annotates the points deducted. This is a great way to learn about herding. We need a minimum of two for the day. More scribes would be nice to help provide some relief. No prior experience required.

Time Keepers: It is nice to have a minimum of two time keepers each day. This involves starting the timer when the dog begins its outrun and stopping the timer when the livestock is penned. No prior experience necessary.

Runners and general assistance: One person is needed for each day to assist with set/clean up and make the circuit to collect score sheet. A good way to get your 10,000 steps of exercise for the day.
