Before you begin

- Entries must be original and cannot have been previously published.
- Entries may be a poem, narrative, or essay.
- Winners will receive an award, their writing will be published in an anthology, and they will be honored at a virtual reception in the spring.

The Write Challenge is an annual writing contest for students who reside in the Lakota Local School District. It is hosted by Lakota LEADS. All students in K-12 are encouraged to create a poem, a narrative, or an essay. Students may submit only one entry in each division. Winners in each *Challenge Division* will receive a prize commemorating their achievement. In addition, the winners will have their writing published in an anthology, and they will be guests at an evening *Celebration of Writing Reception.* (Date & format TBD.) Teachers may submit 1-3 of the best from a classroom writing assignment, but not writings from all students. Entries submitted must be original and cannot have been published previously. All entries shall be typed and submitted electronically in Microsoft Word format, with the exception of the cover page if necessary, for grades 3-12. **Entries should be no longer than 500 words.**

March 21, 2021: Entry deadline

Mid-April: Winners will be announced Entries will not be returned, and final pieces may be edited for grammar, punctuation and spelling.

All entries are to reflect the theme.

Guide to Poetry Writing

- shows keen development of this year's theme
- shows imagination and insight
- shows control of formal elements: rhythm, rhyme, meter shows effective use of figurative language

Guide to Narrative Writing

- has a logical sequence of events
- establishes setting effectively
- develops effective characters for the narrative mode displays good mechanical and grammatical control

Guide to Personal Essay

- adheres to this year's theme
- clearly states the writer's main idea has a good flow of ideas and details
- diction and tone are appropriate to audience
- syntax and organization are clear, logical, and appropriate
- displays good mechanical and grammatical control
