Dear Ms. Searato:

On behalf of the State Superintendent of Schools, Lillian M. Lowery, I am responding to your letter of March 15, 2015. You asked a series of questions and presented some hypotheticals about the effect of WiFi exposure on students in Maryland schools. You have requested that at least one elementary, middle and secondary school in each school system be WiFi free.

Many of your questions and hypotheticals would involve legal advice. Neither the Maryland State Department of Education nor the Office of the Attorney General can provide you with legal advice because we are not your attorneys. We recommend that you consult with your attorney.

I understand your desire to keep your child safe and that you have a very specific definition of safety when it comes to WiFi. In letters and e-mails to you, the Department has explained its view of the WiFi safety issues. You may wish to weigh all that information in deciding whether other educational options are appropriate for your child.
