## Peru – our district mission

n his book First Christmas, Rev. Dr. Paul L. Maier said this about the Wise Men:

"The safest conclusion is that the Magi of Christmas were Persian. ... Whatever their origin, the visit of the eastern sages was of great significance

for later Christianity: the wise men were pagans, not Hebrews, and the fact that gentile magi performed the same adoration as Jewish shepherds symbolized the universal outreach for future Christianity. 'And gentiles shall come to your light,' the prophet Isaiah had written, 'and kings to the brightness of your rising' (Is. 60:3)."

For this reason, the church gives special attention to missions during Epiphany. Jesus came to save *all* people from their sins.

For the past few years, from the mission dollars given by district congregations, the North Wisconsin District has been supporting the LCMS mission work in Lima, Peru.

Leaders from districts and congregations that support the work met in Lima in November for a semi-annual FORO (English translation is "forum"), in which the mission workers share what has taken place and their future plans. Bill Jordan and I represented our district. We heard the reports as well as visited mission sites.

#### La Victoria District

Rev. Osmel Soliz, a Lutheran alliance missionary from Bolivia, shared this report:

- ► Eight adults and four teenagers were cofirmed.
- ► One person was baptized and two are pending.
- ▶ In April, the children of Castillo Fuerte, a mercy house run by LCMS missionaries, produced a play about Holy Week at San German Park, with 150 people attending. The cast included 40 children and three moms. Food and fellowship were shared, and new contacts were made. They were also planning a Christmas play.
- ▶ In May, a Mother's Day event was held with 18 women attending. Activities included an art workshop and a talk by a volunteer psychologist. The event ended with Divine Service and most participated.
- ► In June, 13 parents attended a Father's Day event.
- ► In July, a short-term mission team helped with music lessons for children. More than 70 people attended.
- ► An average of 21 children attend Sunday school and worship.

#### **Los Olivos District**

the mission efforts in Peru and was installed while we were there. Among his projects are to find a bigger place for worship and additional rooms to conduct classes for children and fellowship activities. Future plans include activities that reach out into the community.

There are also plans to create a Facebook page and use radio to spread the word of their ministry, with hopes of increasing participation in short-term mission teams in the Los Olivos neighborhood.

Vicar Elvis Carrera is a native of Lima and is helping with ministry in both districts. He will complete his studies at Concordia Reformer Lutheran Seminary in the Dominican Republic this spring and will be ordained on June 28. This is great news for the Peru mission — to have a Peruvian serving as pastor.

## Wall builder(s)

His background was obscure. We find him as an exile in a foreign land. He is the recipient of bad news regarding his home city. Nehemiah learned that the walls of Jerusalem were "broken down" (Neh. 1:3b). There

is great shame over the condition of this once-great city.

Nehemiah takes action. He begins with prayer to God (1:4-11a). He now finds the courage to speak to the foreign king, whom he serves under as a cupbearer (1:11b). He gains approval and support to return and do this work (Neh. 2:1-8).

Nehemiah's first task back in Jerusalem

is to survey the condition of the walls (2:11-16). Then he assembled the Jewish leaders in the city and called them to action:

"Come, let us build the wall of Jerusalem, that we may no longer suffer derision." - Neh. 2:17b

This was the necessary rallying cry that spurred the Jews to action. The work began in earnest. An opposition force was challenged, and the rebuilding continued.

This story is one of glorious victory. Under God's provision and protection, and the persistent work of the joined people, the wall was rebuilt in 52 days (Neh. 6:15)! The navsavers were silenced and the sound of celebration was heard!

Now we consider this context. Ministry can be filled with challenges. The "walls" can seem daunting. The work can seem overwhelming.

What is needed is a rallying cry that inspires shared effort. What is needed is one to "stand in the gap" and be the courageous, persistent leader who helps maintain momentum and challenge any opponents.

What stands behind it all is faith in what God desires to accomplish through human means. This is "faith (in) the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" (Heb. 11:1). This is trust in our God, who excels in the midst of challenge!

We are sustained in the midst of it all by the words of Paul, who endured a multitude of human challenges in his work for Christ (2 Cor. 11:23-31). We can be inspired by his encouragement:

"And let us not grow weary in doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up." — Gal. 6:9

supported schools in Nicaragua. The schools are in communities that have no electricity, running water, indoor plumbing and roads. Francisco Oporta grew up in one of these communities before attending Northcentral Technical College in Wausau. A former teacher in Nicaragua, today Francisco works with non-profit organizations overseeing these schools that have no books and supplies.

For two years, Trinity students gave their chapel offerings to support Francisco's endeavors. Both students and congregation members donated new and used school supplies and sporting equipment. Francisco was able to purchase textbooks, religious books, library books and other resources. The Nicaraguan schools receive little support from the gov-

ernment, but daily instruction can include devotions, Bible time and prayers.

Over the last three years, the Trinity children decided to have a "Penny War." During this time, students were challenged to raise money for textbooks, library books, Bibles, dictionaries and white boards. Other projects included a new roof for a

school, five new latrines and chair repairs.

In the last five years, Trinity has touched the lives of 1,600 students in 37 schools. They have gotten to know Francisco and his wife, Katherine. They have lifted them up in prayer as Nicaragua is going through political and economic unrest. Trinity has been a blessing to these schools in Nicaragua.
