

ecently, lay worker Ismael Morales went to the town of San Se-La bastián to begin a short evangelistic campaign. He first went to a large house where the men of the village were having a "town hall" meeting. The men received him politely and gave him permission to speak. Ismael explained that he had come to serve them and shared his plan with them. Of the 20 men in attendance, only two were opposed, so

he received permission to conduct the meetings that week. However, after the meeting dismissed, one of the two men who were opposed approached Ismael and threatened, "If you stay here, I will burn you up, along with all of your equipment." Confident that he was on the Lord's business, Ismael tactfully invited the man to the evening meeting and went on his way.

That night, just two families came to the meeting. After sharing the Gospel with them, Brother Morales mentioned to one of the gentlemen about the man who had threatened to kill him. Brother Morales asked for the man's name, so he could try to visit him in his home. The gentleman warned him to be very careful, because the angry man was a serial killer and there was no doubt he would try to murder this worker for God the very next day.

In the morning, Brother Morales took longer than usual in his morning devotions, studying his Bible and praying for the man he was planning to go visit. He asked for special protection from the heavenly angels, and for added wisdom to be able to reach the angry man.

Feeling reassured that God would be with him, Brother Mora-

les set out to find the man's home. He says, "I found him, greeted him, and talked to him about the Word of God. Then I invited him to the meeting that evening, and left. That night, the very man who was once my enemy was the first one to arrive. He brought a friend with him, and they both came every night. They also accepted personal Bible studies with me."


As in the case of Paul, sometimes those who most strongly oppose God's work become leaders in His cause.

Worthy Student Aid



Dear MPI,

I am from the city of Oaxaca in the state of Oaxaca. I am the second of five children. I am here at Linda Vista because I want to continue studying to be able to serve the Lord and my fellow men better through my training. My major is Education with a Social Science emphasis. The past semester I maintained a 91% average.

I am working hard to continue stay in school. I work in the dormitory to be able to have a place to sleep and bathe. For my food, I work in the house of a teacher. But now my problem is I don't have money to register second semester — I am short \$2,000 pesos [\$200 dollars], and I'll need another \$2,000 pesos to complete the semester.

My father is a professor. He is only able to help my brothers and sisters and me with a few personal expenses since we are all in school and the money doesn't go around. My sister studies Nursing and my two brothers study Theology and Medicine. My dad only sends us \$200 or \$250 pesos when he can, because my mother is sick.

She had an operation six years ago because she was diagnosed with a tumor in the cerebrum. They did two surgeries. In the first operation, she lost the ability to speak. She recovered the ability to speak in the second operation but lost her sight and has not been able to see since then. The second operation left half her body paralyzed. She is able to walk with assistance to go to the bathroom or to move from place to place. Because my father must pay for the medical care that my mother needs, very little is left to help us financially.

I bid you farewell. Thank you for your kindness, and may the Lord bless you abundantly. With Love.

Editor's note: The Lacandóns are the only remaining pure blooded Mayas alive today. Numbering about 400 in total, they still live in very remote Chiapas jungles. Many Lacandón men and women still follow ancient traditions of wearing long hair and long white tunics. MPI provides support for a Lacandón native working among his people. Recently we received three letters from our Lacandón Indian brethren located in the remote jungle flatlands of Chiapas, Mexico. I have condensed their flowery language to share the basics of each message.

Dear Fred Adams and MPI,

We send our warm greetings, hoping you are enjoying physical, mental and spiritual health in Christ Jesus.

We would like to request financial assistance to purchase woodcarving and wood burning tools to use in making wood handicrafts to sell so we can feed and clothe our families. We make bows and arrows, carved key chains, carved armadillos & tigers, Maya heads, etc.

With nothing else to request, each of the 20 youth await a positive response to our supplication. Respectfully,




The motive for this letter is to request a satellite dish with all the necessary accessories so we can receive Spanish religious programming inside our
