Recently I was reading <u>The Heart of Leadership</u> by Mark Miller. In the book was a picture of an iceberg. The 10% above the water was marked **leadership skills**. The part below or about 90% – **leadership character**. The author stated: "If you want to predict people's ultimate success as leaders, evaluate not their skills but their leadership character" (p1).

Worker Wellness

Did you know that the LCMS in Convention was called to study worker wellness? The summary of their study included these facts from those responding:

- 26 percent have experienced serious marital difficulties while in ministry.
- 24 percent have been told by a professional that they suffer from anxiety or depression.
- 75 percent have a Body Mass Index (BMI) considered overweight or obese.
- 55 percent say they have experienced stress from financial concerns.
- 40 percent question whether their work has any real impact.
- 32 percent admit that the busyness of life gets in the way of their relationship with God.


How does District Resources Help Schools?

The NWD-LCMS district office (District Resources) has the mission to encourage, network and equip Lutheran congregations of the NWD-LCMS to vigorously make known the love of Christ. For decades our Lutheran schools have been a critical tool for our congregations to achieve the Great Commission of making disciples by baptizing and teaching. District Resources employs an education executive who serves to encourage, network and equip the called and lay workers serving in NWD schools. While efforts in state/national education change over time (vouchers, teacher licensing) there have been district-wide strategic initiatives implemented or reorganized over the last 5 years to strengthen our NWD Lutheran schools. Some of those include...

- Strengthening the Lutheran ethos of our schools as we prepare for a teacher shortage (Colloquy and Lutheran teacher programs at CU-Nebraska)
- New principal recruitment and development (SLED and FLAME)
- Strengthening curriculum through mapping (Curriculum Trak)
- Technology integration in the classroom (Tec21)
- Ongoing school improvement through accreditation (NLSA)
- Communicating and filtering critical state/national trends (WCRIS)
- Early Childhood Director leadership development (consultant, regional meetings)

Our newest initiative, in the final stages of planning, is securing the organizational and content resources necessary to help our schools train staff and volunteers to prevent student sexual abuse (Ministry Safe). Watch for the pilot in our schools in 2019, with possible rollout to our preschools and churches in 2020.

Your continued support of District Resources provides the resources our schools need to work together on the above priorities. Support in the call process, board training and professional conferences are other supports provided through your gifts. Please pray for the ministry of our schools and the work of the teachers, support staff, principals and pastors that make ministry happen each day.



Counselor Corner

"A GREATER FORCE"

The church stands alone. It is the last and primary institution for God to fulfill His plans on earth. Its endurance over the centuries is a testimony to its remarkable strength.

The fulfillment of this work is tied to strong leadership. Here we let Paul, a note-worthy New Testament leader speak to remind us of the source of our power in our corrupted culture (as was relevant in his time). The "boldness" Paul spoke of was not tied to "walking according to the flesh" (2 Corinthians 10:2). He went on to clarify—

"For though we walk in the flesh, we are not waging war according to the flesh. For the weapons of our warfare are not of the flesh but have divine power to destroy strongholds. We destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ, being ready to punish every disobedience, when your obedience is complete." (vss.3-6)

The church is not a human institution...but a holy one. God is on our side. The Holy Spirit is not dead!

Yes, this same Spirit that empowered the first disciples to be Christ's "witnesses" to the world (Acts 1:8) offers the same power today. In the midst of the erosion we see all around us—within, and surrounding the church, can come a spiritual explosion to revive the church, and the culture.

What is called for is a partnership between the Holy Spirit and baptized believers. Called leaders are to never lose sight of the reality that they are chosen to lead the charge forward through the Spirit.

The Word holds power, as Paul also reminds us. It is the God-inspired Word full of purpose—

"All Scripture is breathed out by god and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for the training in righteousness, that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work." (2 Timothy 3:16-17)

Equipped with the Spirit and the Word, we have what is needed to move the church forward. For this we have been called "for such a time as this."

Cows, hogs, trucks, dirt, tractors, $\operatorname{mud} - \operatorname{all}$ things we would expect to find on the farm. But what about high-tech computers, global positioning devices and industrial cheese making equipment? Participants of the LCMS Rural & Small Town Mission's (RSTM) latest Rural

Seminarian Immersion experienced all this and more, including conversation with a lot of faithful folks and great food. On the heels of our 2018 national conference, LCMS RSTM was privileged to host our third immersion event in partnership with Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Ind. We find that holding these events is especially important for the benefit of those who will be serving in rural and small-town congregations.

As you might know, more than 50 percent of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod is made up of rural and small-town congregations. Each year at the Call Day services at both our seminaries, an average of 50 percent of the new calls are issued to men to serve in these congregations. Most of those called to serve do not have a background in rural and small towns; they are typically from more urban and suburban areas. To be sure, they are trained well by our seminaries to proclaim God's Word, administer His Sacraments, teach, care and serve. Yet, we have found that because of the "culture shock," these men often struggle to make the transition to RSTM or they simply don't last that long in these congregations.

Additionally, many of these congregations come to see themselves as just a "first call" or less important than other, bigger congregations with "more to offer." This simply isn't and shouldn't be the case. We at RSTM are endeavoring to break that cycle through these immersions as well as other training events. We want congregations to know and understand that they have a vital role to play in the Kingdom of God. Likewise, we want these men serving them to think of their new rural and small-town call much like C.F.W. Walther describes it when he said:

"When a place has been assigned to a Lutheran candidate of theology where he is to discharge the office of a Lutheran minister, that place ought to be to him the dearest, most beautiful, and most precious spot on earth. He should be unwilling to exchange it for a kingdom. Whether it is in a metropolis or in a small town, on a bleak prairie or in a clearing in the forest, in a flourishing settlement or in a desert, to him it should be a miniature paradise. Do not the blessed angels descend from heaven with great joy whenever the Father in heaven sends them to minister to those who are to be heirs of salvation? Why, then, should we poor sinners be unwilling to hurry after them with great joy to any place where we can lead other men, our fellowsinners, to salvation?" (Twentieth Evening Lecture)

Imagine if pastor and parish together considered this ministry a great joy and were more than willing to "hurry after them with great joy." This is why we spend time doing things like our seminarian immersion. It is through events such as this that we are able to focus on those subjects, which can help future pastors (and even current ones) decrease the learning curve and hit the ground running. While we won't make them agriculture experts, we hope to expose them to those that are so that they may gain an understanding of how things work in a rural and small-town areas and how that affects the congregation's life together. Through visits to working farms and dairies, we learn how agriculture has transformed over the years and what it takes to make it in that world. We see for ourselves the high-tech equipment and how it has changed the face of farming.


In order to better understand leadership in town and country, we visited with agriculture industry leaders, local volunteer firemen, bank presidents and business owners. We learned about parish life from pastors of larger and smaller congregations and from those who shepherd in congregational partnerships. We talked to school leadership about what that dynamic means for the congregations. We worshipped, we ate, we prayed and we learned, all in an effort to better serve the rural and small-town congregations of the LCMS.
