or gender, or sexual orientation. Maybe we hear ourselves or others think whatever we have is too big and that is too small, isn't the right color – too dark or too light, or the right width, or we are too curvy, not curvy enough, too heavy, too skinny, and the list can go on and on. It is a crazy hamster wheel we are on, if we define our worth based on any given moment, group or fixed period in time.

Right now you might be saying, but I'm the exception. Yet, God did not say we were perfect! That was not the criteria for God saying any of us are good. But rather, God said we were good, because God created us in God's image and God is nothing but good. So, therefore, being created as such, then God could do nothing else but say we are good.

Next time you stand in front of the mirror, or compare your looks to someone else, ignore the cultural mandates and focus on and even say aloud, "Dam_, I look good." A MISFORTUNE OR A BLESSING

One morning he found the horse was gone from the stable. The whole village gathered and said, "You foolish old man! We



knew someday the horse would be stolen. You should have sold it. What a misfortune!"

The old man replied, "That's not necessarily true. The horse is simply not in the stable. This is the fact. Everything else is a judgment. Who knows if it is a misfortune or a blessing?"

People laughed at the old man. They knew he was a little crazy. But after fifteen days, the horse suddenly returned. He had not been stolen, but had gone visiting. Not only that, a dozen wild horses returned with him.

Again the people gathered and said, "Old man, you were right. The disappearance of your horse is not a misfortune. It has indeed proved to be a blessing." The old man said, "Again you are going too far. Just say the horse came back. Who knows whether its return is a blessing or not? When you read a single word, how can you judge the whole book?"

The people did not say much, but they knew he was wrong. After all, twelve beautiful horses had come. The old man's only son started to train the wild horses. But a week later he fell from a horse and broke his legs. The people gathered and again they judged. "You're right! Getting twelve horses was a misfortune. Your son, who is your only support, has lost the use of his legs. Now you are poorer than ever."

The old man said, "You are obsessed with judgment. Only say my son has broken his legs. Nobody knows whether this is a misfortune or a blessing. Life comes in fragments and more is never revealed."

After a few weeks the country went to war. All the young men in town were forced into the military. Only the old man's son was left, because he was crippled. The whole town cried because they knew most of the young men would never return. They said to the old man, "You were right. This is a blessing. Your son may be crippled, but he is still with you. Our sons are gone forever."

The old man said again, "Nobody knows! Say only this: Your sons have entered the army and my son has not. We can't know whether it is a blessing or a misfortune. Stop judging or you will always be obsessed with fragments and live in faulty conclusions."



In a Just World, UCC churches become Creation Justice Congregations

God said, "This is the sign of the covenant which I am making between Me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all successive generations; It shall come about, when I bring a cloud over the earth, that the bow will be seen in the cloud, and I will remember My covenant, which is between Me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and never again shall the water become a flood to destroy all flesh. - Genesis 9:12, 14-15, NASB

In a 2015 letter address to all bishops of the church, Pope Francis excelled in connecting climate change to economic inequality while also criticizing a modern anthropocentrism that views "nature" as an object to be exploited for human ends. The Pope's views reflect a historic and evolving current among faith traditions. This trend regards environmental consciousness and social justice as intimately intertwined. As part of this prophetic current, the language of "creation justice" has emerged. The word "creation" inherently evokes meanings that transcend artificial divides between the "human" and "nature." "Creation" signals the truth of our interconnected reality. Moreover, it evokes the sacred story of origin that not only speaks to our common connection to each other but to our common connection to God. As Genesis 9:15 reminds us, God's covenant is not only with humans but with "every living creature."

Within the covenantal understanding of the web of life, the emphasis on justice arises as a central guiding impulse. *If the word "creation" signals the totality of relationships with God, then creation justice signals the movement toward right relationships among all of God's creation.* Building on the concept of eco-justice, creation justice entails an integrated, holistic ecology. It entails an understanding of the world which includes the built environment, culture, economic and political activity, and all of humanity as part of God's creation.

The UCC's Creation Justice Church program assists congregations in making the ministry of environmental justice an integral strand in the DNA of their faith community. A congregation can be designated as a Creation Justice Church by taking six simple steps.
