Give justice to the weak and the orphan; maintain the right of the lowly and the destitute. (Psalm 82:3)


Learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow. (Isaiah 1:17)





The Blind Side

This is a movie that is loosely based on the story of Michael Oher who was homeless until a rich white family, the Tuohys, took him in. Oher has no idea who is father is and his mother is a drug addict. These are the facts of the story, the movie moves on from there. Leigh Anne Tuohy is depicted as a "takes charge" kind of person and decides to take Michael in. She also takes charge of his education and his athletic pursuits. In a baffling scene she seems to understand more about football then the coaches and certainly Oher. Oher tells a different story—one that does not contradict the core of the relationship, but reminds people that he was a top athlete long before the Tuohys took him in. Oher was a first round draft pick of the Baltimore Ravens in 2009 and has a had a very good NFL career.

The movie does help us think about several important justice issues: systemic poverty and the toll it takes on a community and racial prejudice. We will be looking at both these issues during this Lenten season asking the question, "How does our place of privilege blind us to the needs of others?"

Blindspot: Hidden Biases of Good People by Mahzarin R. Banaji, Anthony G. Greenwald. "I know my own mind. I am able to assess others in a fair and accurate way." These self-perceptions are challenged by lead psychologists Banaji and Greenwald as they explore the hidden biases we all carry from a lifetime of exposure to cultural attitudes about age, gender, race, ethnicity, religion, social class, sexuality, disability status, and nationality.

BLINDSPOT is the author's metaphor for the portion of the mind that houses hidden biases. They question the extent to which our perceptions of social groups—without our awareness or conscious control—shape our likes and dislikes and our judgements about people's character, abilities, and potential.
