Dear Hyatt Folks,

I wrote the letter eight years ago on the occasion of the dedication of a newly erected tombstone on Hannah's grave placed there by a delegation led by our former Hyatt Reunion President, Lawrence Hyatt. If you want to visit the site it's located at Maple Grove Methodist Church, 79 Maple Grove Church Road, Waynesville, NC 28786. It's a beautiful cemetery having the advantage of being maintained by a million dollar endowment from a wealthy benefactor.
