The Middle Amana Park: Where We Go to Relax

Since the baseball games of the 1920's and the 4th of July picnics of the 1930's, the Middle Amana Park has had a special place in the hearts of Amana Colony residents.

There Bill Zuber pitched his first fast ball, there one Amana High ball team after another did battle with their arch rivals from Norway High School. There Oktoberfest grew to become the largest ethnic festival in Iowa.

Now the site of spring and fall soccer, summer soccer camps, pick-up ball games and the Fourth of July picnic revived by volunteers and the Amana Family Practice Clinic, the "ball park" is still a big part of our community life.

This year, Mike Amos of the Iowa Renaissance Festival is expanding his Memorial Day historical fantasy fest to two weekends: May 27 - 29 and June 3 - 4. "2016 was so successful, we thought now is the time! This is something we've wanted to do for some time, expand it to two weekends. . . Memorial Day is such a busy weekend with graduations and everything, we felt we really had enough interest to go to two weekends. So far our advance ticket sales are pretty strong for both weekends," he told The Bulletin.

This year the festival will offer free parking at the Amana Colonies RV Park and offer a shuttle to bring visitors to the Middle Park. Last year the festival was so popular (weather was exceptional and marketing took off) that there was literally not enough parking in Middle Amana. This year Amos hopes to avoid that and has lined up parking at the Amana RV Park and will shuttle guests to his fes-

Amos has booked more entertainment too. Some acts will perform both weekends and some will be featured just one weekend, so going both weekends and seeing different entertainers each weekend will be an attraction, he hopes.

The Iowa Renaissance Festival is the park's largest event, but the annual community 4th of July picnic is no less important to the Colonies: as is the annual Amana Arts Guild Summer Festival of the Arts, an event that has been held at the park for over three decades.

For all its popularity as a community recreation area, few residents understand that the 21-acre park is the property of the Amana Society, Inc. The Amana Society, Inc. leased the land to a group of private individuals in the 1960's for the Oktoberfest celebration. They received the property back in the 1980's and have since incorporated it into their Amana Colonies RV Park operations allowing people to walk dogs, picnic, play ball and soccer, simply use the park as a park.

Those who visit the park may assume that they are visiting a tax-supported city park, but that's just not the case. No tax dollars are used to maintain the park.

The Amana Society, Inc. and its shareholders pay about \$564 annually to Iowa County in property taxes on the Middle Park. They pay for insurance, mowing, gravel for the drives, trash removal, electricity for park lights and buildings, supplies for the restrooms, cleaning of the restrooms, upkeep of the buildings and pavilions, repairs and replacement of tables, chairs and other equipment in the park.

Anyone can visit the park for free to walk or picnic. Community groups like the Boy Scouts, the Arts Guild and the Amana Church may use the park for free too. These groups simply contact the RV Park staff to make a reservation.

The Amana Society charges large events like the Allis Chalmers tractor club and for-profit businesses like Mike Amos and his partners to use the park for events like the Renaissance Festival, often renting them the Morton Building, tables, chairs and other items. Overnight RV and tent campers pay a fee to stay. Families may rent the park, the Morton Building or the pavilions for wedding receptions and family reunions.

Fees and rentals help pay for maintenance at the park. "But it really doesn't cover all the expenses," Laura Sue Woods, Amana Colonies RV park director explained.



"We are very happy to do that, to offer a community service to the residents of the Amana Colonies," she said, adding that she and her staff and ASI staff in general know the park is important to people and they too value it as a community gathering place.

She just wishes more people wouldn't take it for granted and would keep it tidv.

"I don't think people understand how much the Amana Society is doing and paying to keep it up. . . the mowing, for example, is a big expense," she added.

Volunteers who might want to help clean up the park, make improvements or undertake some proiect. like a picking up fallen limbs or raking up winter debris and cigarette butts would be very welcome. "Boy, that would be awesome!" said Woods. "We would be happy to work with anyone who wanted to help."

In the past ten years the Amana Boy Scouts and their fathers have donated time and labor to paint the restrooms, build new benches at the larger, open pavilion and to put a new roof on the smaller pavilion. Other groups have planted oak trees. The Amana Youth Soccer League volunteers rebuilt the concession stand about 15 years ago. Soccer volunteers maintain the concession stand and the soccer goals. They have hosted "clean up the ballpark" evenings.

But there is always more to do or that could be done at the park. And winter takes it's toll. "This year we have noticed that there has been littering going on in the park, the cigarette butts. Yes, it's an issue," Woods noted.

"Having help would be wonderful. Everything that's been done by volunteers, that has been so appreciated! Really if anyone would like to help, they can just give me a call," Woods added

Would you believe that the hose could spray over the grain tank at the Homestead Feed Mill? Would you also believe that I even drove that fire truck through town one day? (I don't think I got any further than third gear, but at least I drove it.)

Recently we had a bad house fire in Homestead. The one fire truck is parked right next to our house, but I never even heard the siren. Everything was over and done with until the next morning when someone called me to ask about the fire.

I am always pleased to hear when I hear that no one was hurt. It is amazing how fast a fire can spread and the damage it does.

The first responders get called out for all sorts of emergencies especially just stabilizing a person until the ambulance gets there.

Personally we had to call the first responders twice in one day. It was the day that I came home after my arm operation.

You sort of loose your balance when your arm is in a sling and you are trying to walk only to find that you have no feeling what-so-ever in your legs.

Those first responders came right away and got me "planted" in my chair. I thought I was doing fine until I tried to get up again only to find that my legs were still not functioning.

Charlemagne called for help again and dispatcher said, "is that you again, Charlie?" (I think she suspected I was less than perfect!)

Those men got me on a stretcher and into an ambulance easily although I am sure that a crane might have been some help to those poor men's backs.

I have taken CPR classes and even how to use the machine that shocks one's heart back, but I am here to tell you that I have such respect for these men and women who literally give of themselves just to help us.

Personally I have great respect for these people who quite literally have our lives in their hands.

I even get choked up when I meet with some of these people because I KNOW only too well how things would not have worked if they did not exist.

I still remember "the old days" when the undertaker would come with his hearse which also served as an ambulance and had to find people to help load the person who had fallen or was ill into the back.

Thank goodness those days are over with.

Today, on the news, there was a report about how eastern lowa really needs more of these men and women. I know that I cannot lift or climb on a roof so I won't even volunteer, but I do know that sometimes it might not be a bad idea to make a donation to these people's organizations.

I also think a simple, "thank you" wouldn't hurt either.

A LETTER FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT OF MANUFACTURING, WHIRLPOOL

I am writing in response to the Amana Society Bulletin published on March 16 not only as Vice President of Manufacturing and leader of Whirlpool Corporation's Amana Operations, but also as a concerned citizen.

It is true - no one, including employees, suppliers, visitors and guests, is permitted to use tobacco products on any of our U.S. campuses as part of our corporate-wide commitment to employee health and wellness. There are some employees who do leave the campus during lunch breaks to use tobacco products. The littering by our employees in the community is obvious and we apologize. Please know that we have spoken with our employees to reinforce the importance of respecting our neighbors and creating a positive environment for our community visitors.

Whirlpool has committed to provide staffing to cleanup the Middle Amana Church, Post Office, City Park and Lily Pond areas by the end of March, as weather permits. We will also monitor these areas monthly and provide cleaning as necessary. We have increased our Whirlpool security to patrol Middle Amana by foot to provide another set of eyes to monitor neighborhoods and areas of concern. Additionally, we will continue our support of employees, offering smoking cessation classes and counseling by our health coach.

We have a long history of manufacturing in Amana in support of George Foerstner's vision for refrigeration. We continue to manufacture here by choice and operate with a fundamental belief that we not only produce products that improve the lives of our customers, but have a social responsibility to improve the communities in which we operate. For example, donations from employees to United Way of East Central lowa were a record high in 2016 with more than \$182,000 given. The Whirlpool Foundation's dollar-for-dollar match means more than \$360,000 are invested into our community to support United Way funded programs this year.

In addition, employees volunteer countless hours planning and conducting our annual golf outing which has raised thousands of dollars for charity, including those that benefit us locally.

Last year, our 7th Annual Whirlpool Quality/Supplier Golf Outing raised \$65,700. Donations of \$32,850 were made to each the University of Iowa Children's Hospital Iowa KidSight program and the Ronald McDonald House of Eastern Iowa & Western Illinois. To date, more than \$300,000 has been raised and donated to these two organizations who care for our children, our families and our community.

Additionally, our plant provides wastewater treatment services to the community at a minimal charge, as well as the recycling services to the community free of charge on our Whirlpool campus.

We are proud to partner with the Amana Society in many ways, including those we've outlined above, and we appreciate their generous offer to provide a small parcel near the plant designated for tobacco use. This proactive gesture underscores the teamwork between the society and plant that has always characterized our relationship.

I recently hosted local business owners, residents, local law enforcement and Amana Society leaders to the campus to demonstrate my concern over the situation and my desire to work with the community to find a solution. I encouraged the group to meet again in six months to re-evaluate this situation and ensure the resolution is moving in a satisfactory way for all involved.
