Over the summer your Bargaining Committee reviewed the membership survey results and constructed a full set of comprehensive bargaining proposals. On Wednesday September 17, 2014 the Bargaining Committee met with the membership to seek and receive endorsement of the proposals.

On September 18, 2014 the Union sent notice to the University to commence bargaining.

Our Union's primary work is in bargaining and collectively representing our members. It is through bargaining that we achieve our greatest gains to our Collective Agreement. As political challenges mount, we face increasingly difficult bargaining. Our bargaining power is driven by our membership.

Being respected and holding dignity are very important to our members. The issues that the membership highlighted through the survey as priorities are:

- Job security
- Improve wages
- Protect and improve benefits
- Improve morale and working conditions
- Safe and healthy environment

Your Bargaining Committee is committed to reconciling differences and improving labour relations. We are dedicated in our efforts to achieve fair and equitable improvements to our Collective Agreement and improve working conditions for our membership.

Your Bargaining Committee is scheduled for Oct 2 and 3, 2014 to commence bargaining with the University. We will provide regular updates to the membership as we proceed through bargaining.

Safety Report

Are We Really #1?

We're actually not Number 1 when it comes to being the best at anything but we do have a #1 associated with us here at UBC.

Sadly, last month we lost our good Brother, Richard Davidson (Labourer, Waste Management) to Mesothelioma, a form of cancer caused from exposure to asbestos. The significance of the #1 is that over the 40+ years Richard worked here, WorkSafeBC accepted his claim and believed it to be work related. So when they publish the statistics of people who have been killed on the job through injury or disease, UBC's stats will now show that we have one work related death, but what is truly sad is that a single stroke in a column tells nothing of the life it represents.

Who can say what the actual number really is; we have had trades people and labourers exposed to asbestos over many years through the 70's and 80's, and many of them have moved on or retired since. Richard having been here for over 40 years made it probably easier to identify the exposure source.

So what do we need to be asking ourselves, if we believe at some point we were exposed to asbestos while working here on campus? First and foremost, have this discussion with your doctor. You may have had the same doctor for many years, but the discussion of what you actually do at work or the environments you are exposed to has never been brought up.

Let your doctor know if you are concerned with exposure so the next time you go in with a dry cough, it most likely will be just a bug going around, but at least he/she will have the knowledge to think outside the box.

Find out what the symptoms are, and if you have concerns, get tested right away. They are making advances in drugs for this horrible disease but your best chance for success, as with all other cancers, is to treat it as early as possible.

Did you know that each year approximately 1,000 Canadian workers are killed on the job. Hundreds of thousands are injured. Countless thousands become permanently disabled or die from work related diseases. April 28 is a day to pause, reflect and gather our resolve. It has become a day to rededicate ourselves to the fight for improved Health and Safety.

We will dearly miss our Brother and will honor him at our Memorial Site on the Day of Mourning, April 28th, 2015.


Did You Know!

Subject: We are grateful for your support

Thank you very much for your donation to the BC Teachers' Federation hardship fund.

As you will be aware, teachers voted by 86% to accept the collective agreement negotiated by the BCTF and the government and classes are in session.

Teachers made a tremendous commitment in being on strike for more than five weeks and without any pay, including strike pay, during that time. This was a hardship on many and we are very pleased to be able to support those most in need through the hardship fund.

The gains made in the strike were less than what is deserved and needed, but the most that it was possible to achieve in this round of bargaining. We were able, as well, to reject all the concessions demanded by the government.

The picket lines, the media work and the extensive use of social media by our members helped to develop a deeper understanding of the degree to which twelve years of austerity has undermined the conditions in our schools. The complexity of the teaching situation--characterized by "class composition"- is much better understood by all those prepared to listen to the stories of what actually happens in our classrooms.

Again, we very much appreciate your support in the form of a donation to the strike hardship fund.

I wanted to take this opportunity to thank you for your kind contribution to my education by way of the University of BC Employees Society No. 1', 6, Prize. The scholarship went toward my tuition, which of course had an impact on liquidity in my household. Those extra funds went towards my four-year-old daughter's full-time daycare fees,

My direct social work practice began in 2010 while working with at-risk youth with serious behavioral challenges, From 2010 - 2012, 1 was a member of the Youth Sex Offender Treatment Program/Youth High Risk Treatment Program (YHPTP) Yukon Youth Justice Department research team. The overarching task of the team was to develop and implement a post-evaluation plan for both sexually violent youth and high-risk youth who fell outside of the category of sexual offender. Since then, my direct practice includes: (1) assisting with focus groups directed at discerning the process of re-closeting and silencing of LGBT* elders in long-term care facilities in BC, and (2) assisting the Musqueam First Nation develop a community anti-violence safety plan,

I am currently enrolled in the Master of Social Work program at UBC. Based on my interest in forced migrations, and my research at the Ending Violence Association of BC (EVA BC) in 2014, 1 am developing a social benefit-cost analysis of

domestic violence, sexual assault and physical child abuse in communities impacted by resource extraction projects in BC. The hope is that these analyses will result in increased regulation and taxation of resource extraction firms. Based on that success, I have been invited to partake in a research project funded by an Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) Insight Grant application (2015 - 2020) that aims to highlight changes in community vitality in several communities impacted by resource extraction across Canada as a doctoral student in 2015. 1 also currently sit on the EVA BC Sexual Assault policy advisory working group.

Without scholarships to aide in decreasing the cost of my education, it would be that much more difficult for my family to afford daycare services for my daughter, The only way to offset these costs is to decrease my attendance at school and extend my education period. Needless to say, an extended education period would adversely impact my labor-force attachment thereby negatively impacting my daughter and family over the long-term.

So, it is with sincere thanks that I send this letter of appreciation. I hope my future efforts make you proud of your contribution to my education,
