"HOLINESS"

... By Mechele Doty

In this paper I will be expressing the thought on Holiness. There are many different ways of expressing the

way Holiness is used. The meaning of Holiness is state or character of being Holy. The word used in Hebrew of the Old Testament for "holiness" is Kadhesh, while "holy" is expressed by Kadhesh, both connected with the denominative verb Kadhesh. The efforts to trace the origin of the idea from the etymology have not been satisfactory. The term Kadhesh in its application to God, however, implies throughout both etymologically and historically, a negative sense. If things and persons are not in themselves holy, but are so because they belong to God, holiness as applied to him must involve what is essential to his attributes as deity and what is worthy of him. But just what this involves is not stated in the Old Testament in any simple formula which is good for all steps in the development which the idea certainly went through.

Christ is the pattern, the sample, the exemplary cause, of our Sanctification. Holiness in us is the copy or transcript of the holiness that is in the Lord Jesus. As the wax hath line for line from the seal, the child limb for limb, feature for feature, from the father: so is holiness in us from Christ.

The seen but silent beauty of holiness speaks more eloquently of God and duty than the tongues of men and angels. The beauty of holiness beaming through the life of a loved relative or friend is more effectual to strengthen such as do stand in virtue's ways, and raise up those that are bowed down, than precept, command, entreaty, or warning. Christianity itself, I believe owe by far the greater part of its moral power, not to the precepts or parables of Christ, but to its own character. There is a moral omnipotence in holiness. Argument may be resisted; persuasion and entreaty may be scorned; but the thrilling appeals and motions of the pulpit, set forth with all vigor and logic, and all the glow of eloquence may be evaded or disregarded: but the exiliration of exalted piety has a might which nothing can withstand; it is truth embodied; it is the Gospel burning in the hearts, beaming from the eyes, breathing from the lips and preaching in the lives of its votaries. No sophistry can elude it, no conscience can ward it off. No bosom wears a mail that can brave the energy of its attack. It speaks in all languages, in all times and to all phases of nature, It is universal, invincible and clad in immortal panoply goes from victory to victory.

Christian holiness is no fabrication of man and differs as much from ritual and conventional sanctity as the temple filled with God differed from the same temple just as it was left by the builders hand. To be holy is not to be wrapped in entranced and unearthly contemplation as was simon stylites and the so-called pillar saint. It is not to retire into solitude, to leave

the active duties of life and the trying anxieties of the church unto others with a view to gain that grace in seclusion which Christ has chiefly promised to impart to his people in fellowship {Eph 2; 5& 6} as did basil.

Holiness is the only means by which holiness can be diffused. It is like salt; its usefulness to others must begin with itself. The man who fails to persuade himself to be holy is sure to be unsuccessful with others. It is the wise man that can impart wisdom to others; it is the good man that can diffuse goodness; and it is only the holy man that can diffuse holiness. Every man can bring forth to others only out of the treasures deposited first in his own heart. He who undertakes to restore mankind to clear sightedness must be of clear and accurate vision himself; for he who has a beam his own eye is not likely to remove either beam or mote from the eye of the world. The person who is to remove health to others must not himself be fretting.

Holiness excludes selfishness. Its possessor loses himself in his mission; so that ease and honor and position and riches, and everything of the earth is as small dust of the balance.

The philosophy of holiness teaches us that all the primary colors in nature coalesce to make pure white; so does religion teach us that all christian graces combined to make that "holiness without which no man shall see the Lord". Objects that are purely white perfectly reflect all the prismatic colors of the rainbow; so does a holy heart. All those prim christian graces which conspire to make perfect christian character.

Without holiness there can be no such heaven as the New Testament reveals. There can be scenery of surpassing grandeur, Mts, woods waters, and skies most charming; but they do not make heaven. Although holiness of God has several references an immanent predicate of his nature, a transitive attribute of activity which moreover sustains a particular relation to love the doctrine of the atonement. As an immanent predicate of the divine Being, it designates the inmost and fundamental essence of God in which all other properties are embraced and from which all activities originates.

As you can see, I tried to express some of the ways holiness is used and defined as this paper has a lot of meaning, and is a very important step in our lives today.

Dear Friends in Christ,

As 1993 is beginning we have every reason to be thankful to the Almighty for blessings received. Many victories have been won for the Lord.

Our out-going students from HBC are 56 in number and we had our Graduation Service on 14th January 1993. Some of them will be sent to unevangelised areas the different States of India and we are specially seeking God's guidance in this matter.

The new Bible School started on 15th August last year in Ludhiana, Punjab has students who are converts from Sikh religion. They are facing a lot of opposition as they came out of non-christian background. India Gospel Outreach has been financing this new Bible School with 12 students and we Praise God for all that has been done. The graduation in Ludhiana was on 8th Jan. 1993. Pastor R. S. Abraham was able to visit a few churches in Rajasthan and Bombay during October and see personally how our evangelists are labouring.

The construction of our HBC building is progressing and we are thankful to all who have contributed for this through IGO.

After we returned from U. S. A. in September we were able to help the construction of Churches and parsonages in five places and contributing for purchasing plots in four new areas where worship takes place in small rented rooms. We are receiving appeals from several evangelists that they need money for buying plots and building churches. To maintain an evangelists single person in a new station it takes \$45.00 a month and for a family an average income of \$65.00 a month. Buying sewing machines and bicycles add to our needs and we know some of our friends are going to take up this projects in 1993. A bicycle costs \$100.00 and a sewing machine can be purchased with \$125.0.

For all the encouragement prayers and financial support we thank you dear ones in Jesus' name.



Claude Oscar Pruitt

December 7,1904 — November 4, 1992

Claude Oscar Pruitt, son of Henry and Emma Pruitt, was born on December 7, 1904 in Comanche, Texas and died quietly in his sleep in Brookshire Health Care Center in Brookshire, Texas on November 4, 1992.

Claude, known to many as "Bill", grew up in the Sandy Creek community near Rockdale, Texas where he was converted in 1923 in a revival

conducted by the Rev. Hermann Coulter.

Claude and Anna Iona Eiland were married on April 19, 1926 in Rockdale, Texas and began their 66 years of Christian ministry together.

Claude is remembered by his family and friends as a man of many talents and gifts. He was a farmer, a Pastor, an Evangelist, a paper hanger, a painter, a singer, and a musician. He preached on the street in brush-arbors, in tents, in rented build-


ings and in the open air.

Claude received no formal training for the ministry, but became an avid student of the Bible and received great "on-the-job" training by working with many of the greatest Full Gospel ministers of the 20th Century. Because of their hospitality, the Pruitts entertained many of the pioneer Full Gospel ministers in their home, and many hours were spent discussing the scriptures with them.

Claude was a man of prayer and was regular and faithful in maintaining his devotional life. He believed in miracles, and took seriously the promise in the scripture that supernatural signs would follow believers. God honored his ministry by allowing him to see many souls gloriously saved, many sick bodies healed, blind eyes opened, deaf ears unstopped, demon cast out, and even the dead raised to life again. Claude was a man of faith and trusted God to supply his needs without resorting to hype or any kind of fund-raising gimmicks. He followed the example of the Apostle Paul and trusted God to supply his needs through God's people, but when God's people were unable to supply those needs, he was willing to work with his hands to provide for his family. He also learned to endure hardship, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. When the only offering received from the families he ministered to was surplus hominy grits, provided by the W. P.A., the Pruitts ate hominy grits - three time a day! When there was no money to put gas in the car, Claude would leave the family at home and take his guitar and a suit case and walk out to the highway and hitch hike to his next meeting. When traveling from town to town in ministry, the Pruitts would stay in any home that was opened to

them, and when no homes were opened, they would sleep in the car, or on the church floor, and even a few times on the ground!

Claude pioneered the first Full Gospel Church in Rockdale, Texas where he pastored for a number of years. He later pastored in Alief, Eagle Lake, Houston, and Ralls, Texas and Bokchito, Oklahoma.



A few years ago Claude felt a strong urge to move to Katy, so he could spend his final years among many of his long-time friends. Since he had lost most of his eyesight and could no longer drive, he wanted to be close enough that he could walk to church, if necessary. He purchased the present home in Katy and became an active member of the Katy Apostolic Church.

Claude will be remembered by many people for his love for his Lord, Jesus Christ, and for his


devotion to the truth of God's Word.

The son of Laura and J. P. Morris, he was born February 6, 1908, at the family homestead in the Grand Valley community. After living all his early years in the community east of Hardesty, his family moved to Texhoma where the children could attend school.

Jacob C. Regier was born in Saskatchewan, Canada, and passed away Tuesday, January 12, 1993 in Amarillo, Texas at the age of 79. He moved to Perryton, Texas in 1921 from Enid, Oklahoma. He married Rosalie Chitwood in 1938 at Adrain, Missouri.

Bro. Regier was an Apostolic Faith evangelist, Bible teacher, and pastor for 58 years. . . in areas ranging from Texas to Wyoming and from Kentucky to California. Revivals and tent meetings took him to Oklahoma, Kentucky, Kansas, Texas, Missouri, Nebraska, Arkansas, Mississippi,

Wyoming and California.

Bro. Regier's first pastorate was at Curtis, Oklahoma in 1938. Other pastorates included Seneca Street Church in Wichita, Kansas, Palm Springs, California, and Hardesty, Oklahoma. Texas pastorates included Vealmore (Big Springs), Center Point, Hempstead, Snyder, Edna (Wayside Chapel), Perryton, Dumas and Spearman. He also served as a Boy Scout Leader.

Since retiring from full-time pastoring, he and Rosalie faithfully attended the Perryton, Texas Full Gospel Church except when ministering elsewhere. He also shared in ministry to the Perryton Full Gospel Church congregation many times when his assistance was needed during his retirement years.

Jacob Regier was a master carpenter who built a number of churches and houses. He took great pride in designing and executing specialty

items for his family and friends.

He was attracted to windmills as a young boy while growing up on the Texas Panhandle prairie. His keen interest in windmills developed into a hobby through which he accumulated a large vari-

ety of windmill memorabilia.

He was preceded in death by a son, Dale C. Regier. Let us therefore come unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need." Also in Hebrews 2:18, "for in that he himself hath suffered being tempted, he is able to succour them that are tempted." Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

Triune God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Man is basically sinful and in need of Salvation. Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal

Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life. Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus

Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the

Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son,

and of the Holy Spirit.
Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Washing of Feet.

Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers.

Do not condone divorce and remarriage, Matt. 19:8-9.

Destruction of the Wicked.

Conditional Immortality.

Rapture of the Man Child Class.

Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly.

A ministry supported by tithes and offerings.
