New beginnings, cast aside, can little the pathways of the mind. Or plunging in with resolve, can lead down a road to making life more meaningful. Like a trip well planned, an itinerary, guide books, and road maps are essential.

In planning anther year of life, the safety of our homes is always paramount. Our SAAF officer, Vincent Cano, gave some advice. "Most of the bad guys want to steal out of the garage. In general, they are not entering the home, though we do have some invasions in Monticello Park." He advise making it cumbersome for the intruders to get into homes. "Lights, a barking dog, and signs deter. If it looks difficult, they simply will move on to another home." He said, "Create doubt as to whether you are home or not. A radio left on near a door or lighting on timers is often enough." He also said that security systems and cameras are okay, but stressed that taking away the opportunity for a would-be invader is the best security.

Lieutenant Brian Palmer of the Fire Department also gave advice for residents. "One of the main issues we run into is with seniors holding onto physical things. We have trouble getting into homes because of all the clutter." He stressed having working smoke detectors in every room where people are sleeping. He also recommended having at least two working fire extinguishers in the house. One should be place in the kitchen and one upstairs if that applies or in another area of the house.

"Fire extinguishers should be checked yearly as well as all smoke detectors. Of course, each family or individual should have an escape plan for exiting the house should a fire occur. These plans should be practiced at regular intervals. He said that it is important that there is a designated meeting place outside. "If there are fireplaces in the home, they should be inspected and cleaned each year." 
Finally, please join us at our next General Assembly meeting on January 29th. The best way to build a better community is to join together and help us achieve our goals. Hope to see you there!

Please provide a description of the scope of the project. If you need more lines, feel free to answer this on another sheet of paper and attach it to the application. Please write or print legibly.


All Applications MUST include the following documentation:

- 1. Certificate of Appropriateness from the City of San Antonio's Office of Historic Preservation.
- 2. Itemized list of all expenditures associated with project for award consideration.
- 3. Copies of receipts that show proof of payment with detail of the scope of project and materials.
- 4. Photos of "before" and "after" the project.

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is much shorter. The old standard was around fifteen to seventeen minutes for exiting the house. The time has been shortened to about three minutes because of the gases that synthetic materials create. "You die from hydrogen cyanide released from burning synthetic materials. You cannot escape the deadly gases by crawling on the floor. They are everywhere."

So clutter, cherished objects, and saved pieces of paper seem to be culprits in the organization of our lives. Gail Collins, an avid reader, offered some helpful books for organization of personal things. In the book, *The Gentle Art of Swedish Death Cleaning*, the author, Margareta Magnusson states, "Sometimes




I think it must have been much easier to live and die in the time of our ancestors, the Vikings. When they buried their relatives, they also buried many objects together with the body. This was to be sure that the dead would not miss anything in their new environment. With all the *skrap* (Swedish for *junk*), people have now, they would have to be buried in Olympic-sized swimming pools so that their stuff could go with them! As for hobbies such as gardening, she recommends that when you move to a smaller space such as an apartment, you share in a community gardening project. Tools can be given to those who take over your old home and a sunny window sill can become your own little garden. Monticello Park certainly has a community garden in urgent need of volunteer gardeners. There are many other suggestions as to how to give away collections---museums with special interest in those collections

was one idea.

Another book recommended is the The Life-Changing Magic of Tidying Up, the Japanese art of

decluttering and organizing, by Marie Kondo. This book has been reviewed on television as well in newspapers and magazines. The key idea as stated in the book cover is determining which items in your house "spark joy" and which don't. This will help you clear your clutter and enjoy the unique magic of a tidy home---and the calm, motivated mindset it can inspire.

This is an amazing little book that verges on spiritual in its approach to tidying up. Kondo has a dramatic approach to tidying up. With clothing, she instructs the reader to make a pile on the floor of all the clothing in one's closets and all the other places where clothing is stored. Sorting out what to keep or what to let go occurs after all clothing is in plain view. So her instruction is to sort by category and not by location of the item. Once all clothing items are piled, hold each item and ask, "Does this bring joy if I keep it as a part of my life?" In bold she writes, "Make sure you gather every piece of clothing in the house and be sure to handle each one." If the piece of clothing gives you joy, then you keep it. If not, you put it into the discard pile, being sure



to express your appreciation for the service that piece of clothing has given. She gives tips on folding so that the items can all be seen rather than in stacks where only the top piece of clothing is visible. In short, there is a wealth of information in this book from someone who has been obsessed with organization from the age of five.

The final book recommended is *Downsizing the Family Home,* written by Mami Jameson and endorsed by AARP. The book deals with topics such as "Facing the Full-Loaded House; Getting the Right Mind-Set; Endowment—Why we get so attached to things; Plan E for the Estate Sale; Beyond the Estate Sale; The Really Tough Stuff—Photos and Memorabilia; Archival Storage---How to keep stuff for almost ever; Handle with Care---Shipping the Heirloom China and other Breakables; Fixing to Sell---Old House New Look.

Ferne Burney, our newsletter editor, offered a few thoughts on being organized. "I live and breathe by my calendar." It is digitized and available on all her devices. "I even write



down the dates I pay my credit card bills. If I write it down, it will get done." And she does a lot of things from The Woman's Club of San Antonio, TriDelta Alumnae, Tour Guide Association, and Panhellenic Association of San Antonio, and cooking each week for her church choir. She and her pastor, Patrick Gahan, Rector of Christ Episcopal Church, put together a guide based on a *Forbes* article, "25 Documents You Should Have Before Dying." The document is titled "Book of Knowledge" and is about thirty pages. The guidebook helps organize your information concerning your life so that those dealing with your incapacitation or death can locate all of the information they need to be effective. Ferne's own completed book contains passwords and where the water main and breaker boxes are located. A few of the topics covered include the will, marriage and divorce certificates, birth certificates, summaries of investment accounts, real estate holdings, automobile titles and loans, and a Living Will. There are many other topics addressed as well. Imagine how decluttered your own life would be if you have all of your information in one place for your heirs to see!

Ferne has conducted several seminars in San Antonio entitled "Are You Ready to Go?" since the information in the guidebook ensures that you will indeed be ready to depart the earth with all of your necessary documents in place. This is just the tip of the iceberg on getting organized. But it is a start, and just think of the freedom you will have when all your ducks are in a row!



PUBLIC MEETING NOTICE ---- JANUARY 29, 6:00 PM

District 7 Councilwoman Ana E. Sandoval and District 2 Councilman William "Cruz" Shaw recently submitted a Council Consideration Request to initiate the process to consider additional San Antonio landmarks for viewshed protection and to enable the establish of potential Viewshed Protection Districts. The CCR also directs the Office of Historic Preservation staff to study additional views and vistas of historic places, landmarks, and cultural resources for consideration for viewshed protection.

The City of San Antonio has five Viewshed Protection Districts that are currently in place:

- The Alamo Viewshed
- Mission Protection Overlay Districts

The creation of a new Viewshed Protection District is a two-step process requiring both UDC Amendments and the implementation of a new zoning overlay district. As potential new districts are proposed, affected property owners will be notified and engaged in the adoption process.
