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A Message from our Pastor

The month of February will begin our Lenten preparation for Easter. This year we will be spending our Lenten journey through the Penitential Psalms and the Psalms of Lament. From Ash Wednesday through Good Friday, we will walk through Psalms 51, 6, 38, 32, 130, 143, 102, and 22. Some of them might be familiar, some may not be quite as familiar.

These Psalms are important for the life of the Church. We do not always live in happy days, where we can bump the jukebox and simply change the music. We are encouraged to rejoice by Paul, and often find ourselves unable to do so. This creates a great disconnect and often causes Christians great pain. To adapt a line from St. Paul, "The rejoicing that I want to do, I don't do. The rejoicing that I don't want to do, that is what I keep on doing."

While emotions are highly pushed in our current cultural climate as being the authority for all things at all times, what does the church do? Have we been trained to deal appropriately with emotions by the Scriptures? I often joke of the low emotionality of certain groups, like German's and Norwegians (my background), and we know it is simply a joke. Emotions are part of the human experience. God created us with feelings and emotions, which too are corrupted by sin.

One of the most misquoted verses is 1 Corinthians 10:13, "No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it." The word for temptation in this verse is one that speaks especially of feelings and emotions. It is speaking to a condition where emotions seize or come upon someone. There is no set of emotions that is unhuman, and this can be any kind of emotion: anger, gladness, fear, or sadness. When these attempt to seize or suddenly rush upon us, what are we to do? Do we react or respond? Are we to give ourselves over to our emotions, following our passions and our desires to whatever end they may lead? Or is there a better way?

We are called to respond, not to react. This takes discipline. It takes teaching and practicing to help curb the sinful flesh. This is one of the main points of Lent. It is a time to take stock of current life practices and refocus our time and energies. It is a time of forming new habits.

The Penitential Psalms and the Psalms of Lament help us in this habit. It gives us new words, God's words to speak and shape our cries in times of high emotions. As we will see, they are hard Psalms to pray. They do not shy away from pain and fear. They attack it head-on and cry words that we too have cried. This is only half of their beauty. Where they lead us to is not ourselves, but back to God. They discipline emotions to respond in faith towards God and love towards one another. As we pray them and they become part of our vocabulary of faith, we will find our faith strengthened and able to better respond when times of temptation overcome us.

When we are seized by emotions and are tempted to react, may we be disciplined to respond and thus able to endure.

To this end, one more important note concerning our Lenten sermons. They will be different from years past. They will be expository sermons, in which we will go through the Palms (mostly verse by verse) like we do in Bible Study. I promise we will get through a Psalm each week, because we will not be covering the Psalms in as great a detail as we do in Bible Study.

I encourage you to pray the Psalm for the week for the whole week. The schedule for our Psalms will be as follows: Ash Wednesday: February 14 – Psalm 51 Mid-Week 1: February 21 – Psalm 6 Mid-Week 2: February 28 – Psalm 38 Mid-Week 3: March 6 – Psalm 32 Mid-Week 4: March 13 – Psalm 130 Mid-Week 5: March 20 – Psalm 143 Holy Thursday: March 28 – Psalm 102 Good Friday: March 29 – Psalm 22

As you pray through the Psalms, I also encourage you begin by singing:

President's Piece for Peace

Just prior to typing out this article I was putting information together so my accountant can figure out and file my 2023 taxes. After he files he then estimates quarterly payments for 2024. The task of gathering receipts, forms, and information to fill out the tax preparers packet is a headache in itself. While doing this it cannot be missed just how much of the year is dedicated to paying for taxes. It seems as though there is a tax on every-thing, I wonder when a tax will be levied on the air we breath.

I know, I know. Everyone is saddled with this responsibility so quit your complaining. You are right. I have no room to complain, nor should I complain. In some senses, when I do that, it demonstrates a lack of appreciation for what God has ordained. Taxes are not foreign to the Holy Scripture. It is not as though the Devil is be-

hind taxes and that they are an evil intrusion into the lives of God's Children. Romans 13 lets us know that God has established the government for good purpose. God ordained order and to retain order He has set in place public authorities to keep society safe and allow for beneficial acts one to another.

I also hear the voices reading this crying out, "But what of the misspent dollars on foolish and unnecessary things? What about expenditures that support unbiblical behaviors?" True enough. We are a nation of debate and discussion so that we can openly defend the Gospel and proclaim Christ in whatever vocation we have.

Such things are irritating, unethical, and make us angry. I get it. I can't defend any of that. It is good and ample reason for us to lift all our elected public servants to the Throne of Grace in prayer for God's wisdom and guidance as they carry out duties of their elected offices. Prayer and the ballot box are our most effective means to make the kind of changes we believe are needed for the kind of society Romans 13 intends. There is also strong support for Christians to hold public office for the betterment of all mankind.

So we pay our taxes, maybe begrudgingly, but nonetheless we pay them. We pay them with the gratitude we live in a nation that allows us to worship where we choose, where we are for the most part protected from invasion of enemies. We have freedoms many nations around the world do not enjoy. Imperfect as our system is, and as much as we may disagree with decisions and policies of certain officials, we are still blessed beyond what we deserve. We are still a nation of plenty for the sake of assisting those who have so little. We are a nation of debate and discussion so that we can openly defend the Gospel and proclaim Christ in whatever vocation we have.

I have visited the LCMS senators and representatives in the Iowa State House many times. I have found them to be very dedicated, caring, smart, hard-working and biblically ethical in their dealings with the entire congress. They greatly appreciate our prayers on their behalf and encouraging words of support. Send them notes of thanks and pray for them. Continue to preach and teach and catechize what they also believe is Truth from Eternity to Eternity. The Triune God is their Lord as well as ours. He loves them dearly and gives them biblical validation for their public vocation. So rather than complaining about taxes (which also pay the salaries of those who serve the public), appreciate what God has ordained for our good, for our safety, for our free ability to worship our Lord in Peace and harmony. ble! Additional financial aid is available for those needing assistance, but be sure to have the camp scholarship application in by May 1, 2024.



Proposed Corpus Project




Proposal

Caring for My Neighbor

If any of the Ten Commandments might tempt us to think that keeping the Law is easy, it would be the Fifth Commandment. After all, how hard is it to get through life without murdering somebody? The vast majority of people can handle that!

But Jesus famously blows up this notion by pointing out that the command, "you shall not murder," goes much deeper — down to the heart.

You have heard that it was said to those of old, "You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment." But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, "You fool!" will be liable to the hell of fire. (Matt. 5:21–22) Hatred and disdain come from the same sort of crookedness of heart as murder. With both murder and hatred, you look down on another person and think them of little worth.

In the Small Catechism, Luther also points out that every "do not" in the commandments also includes a "do this:" "We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body but *help and support him in every physical need*" (SC, Fifth Commandment, emphasis added).

We are not called merely to avoid evil; we must also do positive good.

So when Jesus drew near to us and became our neighbor by taking up our humanity, He came not only to avoid harming us, but He came to positively help us, bless us and serve us.

We are now called to show the love to our neighbors that Christ showed to us. Your neighbor is yet another gift that God has given you that requires your stewardship. We are called to show mercy, to be kind, to love and serve our neighbor. One aspect of this stewardship is financial: our neighbors need us to support the church's work so that they can hear the Gospel and come to faith. Our neighbors need the church's alms and mercy work. Our neighbors need our faithful service in all we do in the name of Christ.







Most excitingly, we can now begin to establish ourselves in Prague with things like opening a local bank account and also finally visiting Latvia to see Riga and Luther Academy. We very much look forward to meeting our fellow missionaries in Latvia and also those who have worked so hard on the English Stream of Luther Academy.

The spring semester has started at Luther Academy! I (Cody) have been actively assisting with the technology needs of the seminary since before we arrived back in Prague. From updating content on their website (lut. edu.lv), creating posters for conferences to raise awareness of the seminary, researching and implementing new technologies to aid in the training of pastors and church workers in an online environment, to training and assisting theological educators and students with these technologies. There is much to be done that can ultimately help our theological educators teach and the students learn how to proclaim Christ and Him crucified for the sins of the world. All the work comes down to this mission—Christ's mission.

It goes without saying that the church is a blessing, and that certainly has been true for us as a family. We are thankful for all those who support us back home, and we are thankful for the congregation that has taken us in here in Prague.
