"Military Women in Command"

Hello, my name is Paul Dyer. To start my Military Women Across the Nation scholarship essay, I will be discussing the history of the organization. Then I will talk about my mother, Retired Navy Senior Chief Eva Dyer, discussing being raised by a former military woman in command. Finishing with an interview with retired Lieutenant Denise Duke, a friend and former shipmate of my mother (and one of her favorite former bosses).

To start, in 1978 the Navy Women National Association (NWNA) was created. Its founding members were women who had served in the Navy during World War II who wanted to continue the camaraderie and support they had experienced while serving. The initial goal was to provide a network for former Navy women to connect and support each other. Over time, the objective expanded to include advocacy for women's issues within the military, such as equality, healthcare, and recognition of women's contributions to military service. According to the Military Women Across the Nation web page, "... in August 2014, members voted to expand the membership to include women who have honorably served or are serving in all facets of the United States Military. The name was also changed to reflect the new demographic: MILITARY WOMEN ACROSS THE NATION." The organization has supported and lobbied for legislation that benefits women veterans. Such as bills addressing sexual harassment and assault in the military, equal opportunities for women in combat roles, and better veterans' benefits. Along with that, the organization holds national conventions and regional meetings. Providing opportunities for camaraderie and sharing experiences with fellow female veterans. Most importantly the organization provides resources and support for women transitioning from military to civilian life like career counseling and networking opportunities. Likewise, the organization provides mutual support and community through peer support programs where



members can connect with other women who have faced similar challenges. Overall, Military Women Across the Nation has made significant contributions to improving the lives of women who have served in the military. By advocating for their rights and providing communal support and opportunities, Military Women Across the Nation has continued to be a successful organization.

Furthermore, my mother, Eva Dyer, was a military woman in command. She enlisted in the Navy at 18 years old and retired 20 years later as a Senior Chief (1986-2006). With the Navy being such a big part of her life, many disciplines were carried over into her daily life as a single mother. My mother is a small lady standing at 5 foot 3 but that doesn't stop her from being a fierce, vocal, and disciplined leader.

REDWOOD EMPIRE MILITARY WOMEN

Unit #77 (CA) – We elected and installed our 2024-2026 officers on July 13th. They are President Maura Mooney, First Vice President Rose Nowak, and Secretary Kate O'Hare Palmer. Due to consistent low meeting turnout, no other positions were deemed necessary. Along with a pot-

Leslie Fuller, Maura Mooney and Rose Nowak attended the

"Hello Girls" ceremony in Sonoma on August 23rd honoring Juliette Louise *Courtial* Smith (*Pictured at right*). Juliette was born in New Orleans, Louisiana on December 18, 1887, to French immigrant parents. Upon America's entry into WWI, General John "Blackjack" Pershing needed skilled women telephone operators to travel with him in order to maintain contact with troops via the signal



corps. The Army needed them because they were faster than the men, and they needed the operators to be bilingual.

Juliette met the qualifications and departed on June 28, 1918 with 60 other Signal Corps Telephone Operators, Unit Number Four. They arrived in France and operated telephones for the American Expeditionary Forces in Paris, Chaumont and several other French locations. After the Great War, the "Hello Girls" were denied veteran status for 60 years until 1977 when only a handful were still alive.

After the war, Juliette returned to California, married William Frederick Smith and lived in San Francisco until 1940 when they moved to Sonoma. William died in 1956 and Juliette passed in 1958 at the age of 70. She was buried with her mother and William at Sonoma's Saint Francis Solano Catholic Cemetery in Sonoma, but never had a headstone. Juliette's newly installed headstone was adorned with wreaths during the ceremony, clearly honoring a remarkable woman.

Four members of our unit are looking forward to the convention in Providence and getting reacquainted with everyone.



I know to stay out of trouble because if I don't, I know what's waiting for me at home. Along with that she has pushed me to become a better person. Always supporting me through the toughest of times. I love my mother more than words can express, she has always been the best example of discipline, work ethic, and perseverance. According to her, she had two favorite tours in the Navy. The first one was when she was selected for special programs and served for a year in Antarctica as part of Operation Deep Freez, supporting the National Science Foundation from 1994-95. Her second favorite tour was when she served as Chief in Charge of Communications onboard the Navy Destroyer USS Hayler. She deployed on the USS Hayler one month after 9/11/2001 as a part of Operation Enduring Freedom, and supervised a crew of 10 Radiomen / Information System Technicians.

Lastly, an interview with retired Lieutenant (03E) Denise Duke (*Pictured below in uniform*). I chose LT Duke to interview after my mother described her as one of her favorite

leaders. My mother looked up to her because LT Duke had worked her way up from being enlisted to being an officer, was excellent at her job but the best part of all was, she was excellent with people. My mother said she always treated everyone with respect, kept a great sense of humor, and made people feel good about being in the Navy. After a phone call with LT Duke, I sent some questions to her pertaining to her



career and military women in command. The following is a paraphrased version of her responses.

What were the biggest challenges of your career? I joined the Navy in 1978. Women were just being assigned to ships. The first ships to get women were support ships, not fighting ships. Many of the senior leadership were not happy about women being assigned to ships. I found myself having to be hard and rough to compete with my fellow sailors. I begged to go to a ship but ended up on shore duty in Hawaii. It was a good assignment. Luckily, I got to work with some awesome officers (prior enlisted) who "trained" me in the way of life in the Navy. I learned to know my job. Know it better than anyone else. Work hard. Play hard. Never give up. Never back down. Pick your battles. At every assignment I made it my mission to prove, man or woman, I was the best and most knowledgeable communicator at the command.

What are some of the most rewarding parts of your career? Working with some of the best people on earth. As a senior enlisted, I began to do more administrative tasks. I made the rank of Chief Petty Officer in 10 years. At that point I had to think about my future for the next 10 years of my naval career. I decided to apply for the Limited Duty Officer (LDO) program. I didn't need any college education to apply so it was the program for me. To my surprise, I was selected. At my 12-year mark I was commissioned as a Naval Officer, Surface Communications. It was rewarding helping the individuals assigned to my command or department succeed. Seeing young sailors achieve their goals was the best reward.

What was it like being stationed with my mom at Naval Communications and Area Master Station (NCTAMS) Med in Naples, Italy? Your mom worked on a watch crew with me providing communications throughout the Mediterranean Sea. l worked in the Fleet Telecommunications Operations Center and your mom worked in Technical Control. Our department oversaw the overall communications coordination between the shore stations, ships, submarines, and aircraft. Technical Control linked all the communications systems that provided that ability to conduct operations. I was a watch officer and Eva was a petty officer. I looked to her to make sure all our shore-based systems were functioning properly. That's the business of our jobs. I respected your mom and the knowledge she had regarding Navy communications. Eva was always so easy-going. She never got ruffled or upset when things went crazy. She was just chill. Sometimes I would stomp into Tech Control only to face that smiling face who proceeded to tell me she had everything fixed. That's the work part of our relationship. The other part of our relationship was that of friendship. The command had lots of fun activities. Most of them were to encourage teamwork and comradery. It was more like a family.

In your opinion, what should people know about military women in command? Being in command can be a lonely place. Man or woman, you must set the example. I don't think a woman should be treated any differently than any other individual in command. When you are selected for command, it is a detailed process. You have prerequisites that must be met. Many times, there are interviews or discussions before the final selection of command is determined. Male or female, if you are qualified, it should be accepted that you are the best qualified for the job. If you look at the bios for some of the senior leadership in the Navy, it's obvious these women have worked hard during their careers to be promoted and be assigned to challenging positions.

To wrap up my Military Women Across the Nation scholarship essay, we explored the history of the organization, discussed what its like being raised by a former military woman in command, and finished with an interview with Retired Lieutenant (03E) Denise Duke. Mrs. Duke shared her experiences as a woman in command including her biggest challenges, most rewarding times, being stationed with my mother, and what people should know about military women in command.


