adjust programs and how to connect to our membership in this challenging time. Therefore, we need to determine our membership's ability to connect via computer and Zoom membership meetings. With all the additional challenges for planning meetings and when we eventually "re-open", we need additional assis-



tance from our membership. The current board is "swamped" and all good volunteer organizations look for new and/or interested members who might like to get more involved, but you may not have been "asked" and are just waiting for the opportunity.

Good news! **The WWII RT Needs You!** You may have attended one or more of our monthly dinners and thought: "How can I help?" "How can I get involved with the WWII Round Table?" Or, "How can I get to know or help some of our veterans?

Assisting the board is a way to do this—and the commitment is one monthly meeting (the first Monday of the month) 5:30-6:30 at the Northside Social Club [or virtually for the time being]. Our organization needs assistance in a variety of ways and you may have just the talent that will be useful. Some assistance can be

done "virtually" from home or when we resume actual meetings—at the NSSC. When we do resume meeting at the North Side Social (formerly Knights of Columbus), we always need help with table set-up, collecting money for dinner tickets, greeting new members at the sign-in table, introducing new guests, serving vets from the buffet, etc. Our website needs some more content. If you have skills in this area and content to add, we would be most grateful! Do you have talent with finances? Lucy Parker, treasurer, could use as-sistance with our membership database, etc. Ideally, we would benefit from a potential board member who could chair the "**Membership Committee**" so that no one person is too burdened with a volunteer task. Thank you to Charlie Russell for two important job descriptions!

The WWII RT Membership Committee is to be staffed by members who realize the importance of enhancing membership participation. The committee is not limited in number. It is recommended that at least three current WWIIRT members be assigned to this function. Their tasks are as follows:

Maintain a current list of World War II Round Table members. This list should include email, phone, address, service member or not, branch, time served with dates, spouse or husband's name, general interests and mobility needs.

Perform hosting duties as necessary. Greet members as they arrive, ask if anything is needed, seat preference, hearing issues and anything else needed. The goal is to make members welcomed. Some may be first time attendees. We need to embrace members with a kind word and acts of kindness.

Make efforts to attract new members. Such efforts may be to contact local education institutions such as colleges and high schools specifically history department for example to let them know the existence of the WWII Round Table. WWII RT newsletters can be sent via emails to these institutions easily.

The Membership Committee can develop and implement additional efforts to increased WWII RT memberships. As long as they are enjoying what they do.

For years, our members have enjoyed monthly programs—covering innumerable topics related to WWII and occasionally limited wars (Korea, Vietnam and Afghanistan, etc.) There is a wealth of individuals who have stories to tell, experiences to share, and memories of important times in our history. Our programs appeal to a broad group—veterans and non-veterans, students, educators, spouses, etc. The WWII RT's mission is to promote this service to the community—whether in person or virtually!

Program Coordinator: The WWIIRT Program Coordinator is the principal point of contact for inviting, scheduling and supporting speakers at the WWIIRT meetings.

While all members of the RoundTable are encouraged to solicit possible speakers the Program Coordinator is the final decision maker. The PC has an expectation that referred speakers have relevant topics, are vetted at a reasonable level and are prepared to present. But anyone can discuss their possible speaker with the PC.

The PC will inform potential speakers about possible dates, meeting expectations and audio/visual equipment prior to scheduling a presentation date. Once an agreed date is set the PC is the only person who can change the scheduled speaker.

On the date of the WWIIRT meeting the individual who referred the speaker will arrive at the meeting ahead of the speaker in order to greet them when they arrive. Once they arrive the referring individual will escort them to the reserved table for the speaker and any guests. The referring individual will introduce the speaker to the PC and the Audio/Visual staff to address any issues the speaker may have. It is important to any speaker to realize that the group has their presentation's needs managed so that they can enjoy their meal and evening.

The Program Coordinator will have several WWIIRT members supporting them in direct and indirect ways in order to enhance the meeting's impact on our attendees. It is everyone's job to make the PC shine and have speakers who what to come back.

Would you rather volunteer for something smaller? Then join the **Program Committee** . . . especially if you are willing to share ideas for interesting topics. Do you know individuals in the community who might be willing to speak to our group? Or, consider recording our speakers via iPhone during their presentation. We have recorded many of the programs over the years and some of been included on our website.

The Man Who Won't Let the World Forget the Firebombing of Tokyo

Richard Gross, 95 Mercer Island, Wash. First Lieutenant, 874th Bomb Squadron, 498th Bomb Group "On Saipan, I was in Quonset hut barracks with another crew. And that crew was chosen as the lead crew on the first firebomb mission. The crew members were brought in and asked if they objected to firebombing the cities of Japan. A number of people raised their hands. But the order came down: "Well, that's your opinion, but the orders are you're going to go on the mission." I guess they could have declined, but I don't know if any did. This was the first information people had that we were going to be bombing the cities.
