Enjoy an evening of drawing or painting (your choice) with artist Philip Salamone. This is an unstructured class but critique and guidance available upon request. Students will have the opportunity to draw or paint two of Hoo's Woods education raptors; Oakley a Spectacled Owl and Catelyn a Peregrine Falcon. Philip was born and raised in Wisconsin, and attended the University of Wisconsin - Madison and graduated with a degree in Fine Arts. Seeking a greater understanding of technique and craft than is available at the UW, he moved to New York City to study at the Grand Central Atelier and the Art Students League, two of the world's foremost institutions devoted to teaching a classical methodology. After completing a three year program at the GCA, he returned to Madison. In an effort to build a community, to learn from and to teach other artists, and to routinely practice painting the figure, he founded the Atwood Atelier. He now paints and teaches at both the University of Wisconsin - Madison and also at the Atwood Atelier.



The evening will also include a program presented by Dianne Moller, director of Hoo's Woods. Participants will learn about their natural history, breeding, habitat and behaviors.

- Students develop their artistic skills with 2 live raptors as subjects including a spectacled owl and peregrine falcon
- Materials: Bring your own drawing or painting supplies. Drawing boards, easels, and horses are provided. Odorless mineral spirits only.
