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GRACE MEMORIAL CHAPEL  
AN EARLY EXAMPLE OF PRE-CUT  
CONSTRUCTION

The founders of Grace Memorial Chapel were fortunate in having at their disposal the volunteered services of William B. Tuthill, one of the outstanding architects of the day. Mr. Tuthill, in the course of his career was destined to design Carnegie Hall, Doctors Hospital in New York, The Carnegie Library in Pittsburgh and other notable buildings. His plans for Grace Memorial Chapel were exhibited at the New York Architectural League. His connection with the Lake George community is not known. He is not mentioned as a property owner and thus may have been a vacationer. His name does appear in

the minutes as secretary of the meeting held on Sept. 15, 1884. After 1885 his name no longer is found in the transactions of the church.

During the organizing meeting Captain Sam Westurn who ran a hotel on the Point donated the land for the church. Following the meeting the group, according to the minutes, "retired to the site upon which the chapel was to be built, drove stakes designating the site." The minutes further state that "the trustees then went to the hill back of Watch Island (now Delaware Island) to examine the stone which Mr. Westurn had also agreed to donate.

In September the Building Committee and the architect met with Mr. C. G. Remington of Ticonderoga to discuss carpentry work. The bid submitted was thought to be too high but Mr. Remington was contracted to do the work. The decision was made to have all timber for the roof, the floor, brackets, moldings and mill-work pre-cut in New York and shipped by rail to Lake George. The final agreement with Mr. Remington was not reached until February. The cutting was done and shipped by rail to Baldwin early in March and hauled by teams over the ice about the middle of March. Rough timber was brought from "TI" by boat.

The stained glass windows, pulpit chairs and other furniture were sent from New York in a second carload. The stained glass windows were made in the studios of F & J.S. Wolf "at half the price of any other firms of well known reputation" according to the minutes. The slate for the roof, 15 tons of it came from the Chapman Slate Co. of Chapmans Quarries, Pa. It was shipped under special contract with the D & H and D L & W in a through car to Baldwin and from there by boat. The total cost of freighting was \$74.68.

The Building Committee reported that "only one mistake was made in ordering and that involved the loss of \$7.50. Total cost for constructing the church was \$6,023.42.

Construction of the church was complete 13 weeks after ground breaking.

TOWN BOARD - 10/11/83

After Dick Bolton read several letters, one complimentary, about our town, others critical of the noisy motorcycle weekend, we went on to the reports of the various committees.

The school auction was even more successful financially than expected. Records of the sale can be seen in Supervisor Bolton's office. The building itself was not included in the auction, but Kay Martucci indicated she may be interested in it next year.

End of the year reports were made by the chairmen of the various committees. Certainly the most innovative were the recommendations made by Dorothy Henry to solve the problems we are having with the boat launch.

Dick Bolton has written J. W. Kelly, regional traffic engineer, of the problem with tractor-trailer accidents on Route 8, that fortunately, up to now, have had no fatalities. Since it is a busy school bus route there is cause for concern.

A resolution was passed stating that any elected town official taking office after December 31, 1983 will not be covered by town funded health insurance.

The discussion about the budgeting for a summer policeman evoked some strong feelings. Those who spoke seemed concerned with the cost. Dick Bolton is still investigating all available possibilities.

The Board has been working hard on the budget. There will be a workshop at 4:30 PM on Oct. 20, a preliminary budget meeting on Thursday, Nov. 10 at 6:30 PM and a Town Board meeting on Tuesday, November 15 at 6:30 PM to adopt the budget. All meetings are open to the public.

Supervisor Bolton was pleased to report the County budget was good.

Mr. & Mrs. James Ward requested a permit to erect a building on foundation started in 1979. There is need for additional information on setback from lake and road.

Frank De Santis, attorney for Mr. Pucek, made his presentation for the subdivision on the property next to the overlook on 9N (Sabbath Day Pt.). Conditional approval was given to lift the stop order so that work can begin on getting a soil sample for the septic system necessary for further approval.

Howard Noordsy, representing the Sabbath Day Point Beach Association would like the modification of certain land at the Point. It is simply a matter of changing lot lines. The area remains the same. There was conditional approval for a mini-subdivision.

A variance was requested by Ron Graser to put up a building behind the Laundromat that will be 20 ft. closer to his neighbor than he is entitled. Neighbor does not object. Will go to the Zoning Board on Oct. 27th meeting. Planning Board has no objections.

Variance requested by Bruce Robinson of Pine Cove Road to extend a corner of a garage on the town road right-of-way. Denied.

The Lighthouse development has been issued four building permits.

The D. Chesky request to divide a parcel of land into 2 pieces (50' on lake and 50' on the west side of 9N) was disapproved.

David DeFranco tendered his resignation as a board member. It was accepted with regrets, by Chairman LaPann.

PLANNING FOR LAKE GEORGE BASIN

The editor of The Hague Chronicle recently received the following letter from David Soliday, Waterbury, CT and Silver Bay.

"Do Small Boats Belong on L.G.?" (quoted from last month's Chronicle) I have written several letters to L.G.A. on the subject of "Noise and Speed Pollution" on L.G. - the most recent is attached. Your readers that agree with the content or thrust of my 9/13 letter should send on their own views to L.G.A. It will take but a few minutes and can be very meaningful for Lake George lovers. Readers who are disturbed, endangered or annoyed by high speed boats or noisy boats should call 911 and report it. The Lake George Patrol usually responds promptly, but have trouble enforcing non-existing laws. Nevertheless a "log" is kept and will be useful."

The letter of September 13 to which Mr. Soliday refers is quoted in part: "...Specifically, there seems to be no enforceable laws (if they exist) designed to restrict or control the speed and noise at which motor boats may operate. If this aspect of lake surface usage remains unregulated it is almost a certainty that 5-10=15 years from now the "noise and speed pollution" will be the ruination of the lake as we know it today.

"...In my judgment this speed and noise pollution has increased dramatically during the past 3-5 years and it does not take much imagination to see what the lake will be like five years from now. Lake George has not only been a clean and beautiful lake but in recent years I believe much of the lake and its surroundings fall within the jurisdiction of the APA and its corresponding goals. This makes Lake George somewhat unique and should give LGA considerable political clout if sensible plans are presented to our politicians. Perhaps a "state lake association" would also be helpful."

Ed. Note: We join Mr. Soliday in encouraging you to write to L.G.A. on this matter.

WEATHER AND GARDENING

The summer of '83 will be long remembered as one of extreme weather conditions. A very wet May and early June gave way to extremely dry July and early August. Those of us who were able to plant early had to do much of it over because seeds didn't germinate. Those who planted later wound up with stunted and dried up, poor yielding vegetables. Sweet corn and potatoes in particular were affected by the drought. We can look for higher prices in the market on cereal, corn, potatoes, and feed grain.

It is about time to watch for our first killing frost killing peppers, tomatoes and cucumbers if they are not protected.

After harvesting our garden it is time to "put it to rest for the winter." The unused stalks, plants and leaves may be removed and put into a compost pile with equal amounts of soil and water with a small amount of bone meal to add protein. Leftover plants can also be left in the garden and plowed under in the fall where they will put back nutrients they used in growing this year.

Berries should be pruned and mulched in October for winter protection. Lime can be added in the fall and plowed under to prevent acid conditions, at a rate of 50 lbs. for 250 s. ft. of garden space.

ON MAKING AN APPEAL

Bill Foster, Zoning Administrator, recommends for those approaching the Zoning Board of Appeals:

1. Application for appeal should be in writing.
2. Must have a public hearing and notification.
