According to the information on governor.pa.gov, being in the green phase means easing most of the previous restrictions by lifting stay at home and business closure orders. Businesses that were closed in the yellow phase can reopen. However, some basic restrictions remain in place, such as limits on building capacity and large gatherings. This phase has been described as "the new normal."

Some of the details are gatherings of more than 250 people remain prohibited. This would include most festivals, conferences, sporting events or concerts. Religious worship is exempt from restrictions, but social distancing and other mitigation methods are strongly encouraged.

All businesses operating at 50% occupancy in yellow phase may increase to 75%, but working remotely is still strongly encouraged. Businesses with in-person operations must follow updated safety requirements. Personal care services, such as hair salons and barbershops, open at 50% occupancy and by appointment only. Construction activity may return to full capacity.

Restaurants and bars open for dine-in service, but with occupancy limits and other guidelines.

Indoor recreation, including gyms, spas and health and wellness facilities, open at 50% occupancy with appointments strongly encouraged. All entertainment, including casinos,

theaters and shopping malls, open at 50% occupancy.

Many people are very excited about the transition to green but some are still hesitant of going out full force. Each person needs to make their own decisions based on their comfort level but no matter what you choose, all should abide by requests of the Governor regarding masks, social distancing as best as possible and being aware of others. There are many activities that can be done this month while still being safe.

The Pittsburgh Zoo will be opening Friday, June 5, with modifications to keep everyone safe. They will also continue to offer Zoofari, a drive through experience where you don't have to leave your car for people who aren't quite ready to walk through. Go to pittsburghzoo.org for details.

Venture Outdoors is offering many different outside activities during June. There are tremendous benefits of exercising and meditating, especially their stress reducing effects. Yoga is the perfect way to wind down after an invigorating hike. On June 20, they are offering a relaxed-paced 2-3 mile hike in Frick Park followed by an introduction to yoga and meditation sequence. Carnegie Museum of Art hasn't announced plans to open as of yet but they are still offering different virtual activities for every day of the week along with viewing exhibits and all of the museum collections. Visit cmoa.org to enjoy these virtual events

now and to follow their plans for opening this summer.

The Carnegie Museum of Natural History is also offering, Museum at Home until they can open safely. Go to carnegiemnh.org for updates and at home activities.

Go to www.warhol.org/warholat-home/ to visit "Warhol at Home" during this time for a very interesting exploration of the museum.

The Three Rivers Arts Festival is providing an experience that will go down in history! "THE FESTI-VAL IS VIRTUAL. THE ART IS REAL." The event will open to the public June 5 – 14. Each evening, the Festival will present livestreamed events, on the Dollar Bank Digital Main Stage enabling a realtime communal experience. The Pittsburgh Cultural Trust has reimagined every aspect of the Dollar Bank #TRAF20 – performing art, visual art, creative activities, even food – for ten days of free art and music unlike any other in its history. The goal is to shine a light on the 500 artists and community partners taking part in the event and to deliver a memorable Festival for everyone. Together, we will celebrate this iconic 61-year Pittsburgh tradition. Their virtual festival grounds are located at TrustArts.org/TRAF.

As of printing, the Farmer's Markets around the area are postponing opening but have plans to open in the next few weeks. Check with each neighborhood or borough periodically for updates.

Market Square Farmer's Market and is open but is moving locations. The new name is 11th Street Farmers Market and will be held on Sundays, 9 a.m. – 1 p.m. The Farmers Market – now in its 16th season – will be temporarily moving to a new location near the Convention Center at 11th Street and Waterfront Place, downtown, to facilitate increased social distancing and pedestrian access while providing access to locally-grown produce and goods.

The rain-or-shine market will continue to offer regionally-grown produce, organic products, and small-batch foods from a variety of vendors each week. Admission to the market is free, with limited free parking also being made available thanks to the support of The Buncher Company and Alco Parking.

Visit the website at downtownpittsburgh.com/farmersmarket/to find out about vendor pre-ordering, social distancing, and other rules for this season.

Bloomfield Saturday market is open from 9 am – 1 p.m. Everyone wear a mask and practice social distancing. They are located at 5050 Liberty Avenue, between S. Winebiddle and Gross Street. Visit bloomfieldnow.org/bloomfieldsaturday-market/ for details.

Even though Allegheny County is in the Green Zone and we are able to go to the movies, it seems as if the theaters aren't quite ready to open. Cinemark is looking for a mid-summer open date and Big Phoenix isn't sure of a date yet. That means that we still need to be creative for our summer movie fun!

The entire world needs to go fishing right now, today. I know it would help, but sadly most can't or, won't go. In lieu of that, YOU should go fishing. It will help you to better deal with the entire world. Park somewhere that requires you to take a solitary walk early in the morning, and use that walk to begin to seek the inner peace we all so desperately need right now, the water will do the rest.

I got the chance to fish for both bass and trout this past month with a great deal of success. Early one Saturday, I walked a mile to an old favorite spot of mine in Washington County and the walk did me wonders, so did the largemouth bass. On my way home, I got curious about a stream along the way and stopped to have a look. Four beautiful brown trout later (one of them is pictured in this month's Fishing Hole) I went home a new man. Re-energized and refreshed. Fishing can do the same for you, I truly believe that.

There are still plenty of trout in the streams. I was cranky and irritable about the weather for all of April and most of May. Truthfully though, the coldest April ever and a very cool start to May along with plenty of rain has made the end of May and I think the month of June a great time to go trout fishing. The crowds are gone, but the fish are not.

time. Both smallmouth and largemouth bass are in full feeding mode as we enter meteorological summer. Try your crank baits and rubber worms just from the bank in the morning and evening hours. You will be delighted and, maybe refreshed like I was!

The trout I found are not spooked at all and I think that might be the case largely around our area, so it's a great time to take your kids out and chuck a night crawler or red worm at them. They are hungry and aggressive. I have found a lot more brown trout this year than in years past. So much so that I was certain there had been some change in the stocking practices of the state. It must just be how or where I was fishing because according to the Fish Commission, Pennsylvania stocked 3.2 million trout in 2020 with over 2 million of them being rainbows, and just 660,000 or so brownies. Yes I was wrong. Hey, it's happened before, I think. No more space for that story

You could head to a drive-in movie. The closest theater to our area is Dependable Drive In. They have three screens and are open but with changes to accommodate COVID-19 safety precautions. Go to dependabledrivein.com for shows, times and details.

Most stand alone retail stores are open in some capacity and the Mall at Robinson is opening June 5. Check the website for individual



stores at the mall and for more details. No date set vet for South Hills Village.

Summer means swimming at pools and lakes but so far it seems as if the pools may remain closed in most neighborhoods. Be sure to check with your local borough offices

to see if things have changed. All State Park beaches will open for swimming on June 6. There are a few lakes around the area that have beaches and offer swimming. Moraine State Park is about 45 minutes north of Pittsburgh and has two beaches for swimming, a big lake for boating, fishing and more.

Ohiopyle State Park is open and has a lot to offer in terms of water activities and hiking. Sit in the creek bed and ride the water through two natural waterslides in Meadow Run. Caution must be used at all times as natural hazards exist.

Raccoon Creek State Park has a sandy beach with swimming along with a lake for fishing. It is about 35 minutes from Pittsburgh.

If you can take a 1-1/2 hour drive to Ryerson Station State Park, you can enjoy an open swimming pool. They have camping, hiking and a lake for fishing.

Check with dcnr.pa.gov for more parks throughout PA and to find out what they have to offer.

This might the summer to take a step back in time and introduce your kids to running through the sprinkler or even just the hose as you properly spray them with freezing water. Remember those days?

Water balloon battles are always a great way to get exercise and cool off simultaneously! How about squirt guns? Make the best of these hot summer days while staying safe and helping keep COVID-19 at bay!




