# **CHRIST, BE OUR LIFE!**

Micah 5:1-4; Psalm 80:2-3, 15-16, 18-19; Heb. 10:5-10; Luke1: 39-45

Can you imagine that in two days it will be Christmas! Christ, our "Mass," is almost here! Today is the fourth and last Sunday of Advent! The long wait is almost over and this Tuesday Christ our Savior will be born for us.

The tragedy of Friday, December 14<sup>th</sup>, when a lone gunman gained access into an Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut and killed twenty innocent children and six adults, reminded me of the tragedy that followed the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. After that first "Christmas," King Herod, filled with fury and contempt, sought to kill Jesus, and commanded his soldiers to slaughter innocent children "who were two years old or under" (Matthew 2:16). His intent was to eliminate the Prince of Peace. He wanted to kill the Joy of Jerusalem and that of the whole world! He was determined to destroy our CHRISTMAS. The young gunman who snuffed out the lives of those innocent children in a school building should not be allowed to destroy the joy and peace that Christmas brings to the parents, loved ones and the nation.

Ironically, last Sunday's scripture readings exhorted us to "Shout for joy ... be glad and exult with all your heart." The loved ones of the dead and the entire nation were urged to "have no further misfortune to fear," but rather to "rejoice in the Lord always." Christ is near! He is near to give us comfort! He is near to give us peace and joy! "Have no anxiety at all." We should rejoice and be glad because our salvation is imminent! Our God has humbled Himself and has taken on human form for our sakes. We must lean on Him, and not allow the Evil One to dampen the will of our faith and the spirit of our resolve to welcome Him Who comes so that we might have life.

Prophet Micah is one of the Minor Prophets who were concerned about social justice. As I mentioned last week, Assyria had conquered the Northern Kingdom of Israel in 721 B.C., and was threatening to invade the Southern Kingdom of Judah. Fear and anxiety had gripped the entire nation, thus, they yearned for the promised Messiah who would come and deliver them from their bondage. Prophet Micah's role was to console them and assure them, "You, Bethlehem-Ephrathah...from you shall come forth for Me One Who is to be ruler in Israel." You, whom other nations had oppressed and considered little and unimportant, shall give birth to a King Who shall rule His people with justice. The One Who is to rule Israel "shall stand firm and shepherd His flock ... " He shall bring peace and joy to His people!

The tragedy in Newtown, Connecticut has once again portrayed us as a nation that has little or no respect for the sacredness of human life. Millions of lives are lost every year through abortion and other violent means. But, on the contrary, today's gospel shows us how life is treasured right from the moment of conception. When Mary, who had just conceived Jesus, visited and greeted Elizabeth, "the infant in her womb leaped for joy." One life leaps for joy for another life. Our hearts should leap for joy to encounter Christ in the very vulnerable in society, including the unborn - our hearts should leap for joy when we receive Christ in the Holy Eucharist. Our hearts should leap for joy even as we mourn the victims of the Newtown massacre. Jesus, the Messiah is here to give us hope!

# YEAR OF FAITH



As we reflected two weeks ago, it is important that we reflect on the reality that sin is created not only by deed but also by neglect. The fourth through the tenth commandments refer to our love for neighbor. The first degree of love of course is justice: to give to our brothers and sisters with whom we share the earth that which they deserve. For

instance: the fourth commandment tells us we are to honor our parents, and by extension, all lawful authority. This word is not time conditioned. Though we might now be far away from our youth we still bear responsibility for those who cared for us, even as they might become difficult. "Thou shalt not murder" calls upon all of us to respect life. Eat carefully. Do not enter into useless prolonged conflicts. Realize we are our brother's keeper. It is most unfortunate that in our society adultery is almost always treated with a wink. The prioritization of marriage vows is of the greatest importance since in them the relationship of Christ with His Church is mirrored. Further, one must realize that the commandment mandates us to respect the dignity of each human being particularly in view of their divine creation. Parents especially have the joy and responsibility of aiding their children in the forming of healthy relationships.

The seventh commandment tells us that part of respecting another is to recognize what they rightfully own. This pertains not only to material things but ideas as well. Students should give proper credit for an idea or statement to its true source. Plagiarism is stealing as is booting up illegally computer programs. Sometimes we justify our wrongdoing in this area because "everyone does it" or "the government will just waste my taxes." Perhaps, but that is not our call. There are other ways of getting redress. Perhaps the most serious element of taking what does not belong to us is covered by the eighth commandment. The stealing of one's reputation causes hurt beyond calculation. Gossip is wrong even if it is true because we never know one another's true circumstances. When we judge we should consider what Christ would write down as He bent to touch the sands of our lives.

The final two commandments utilize the word: "covet." Perhaps because they are last we fail to give them great thought. But in truth, they should receive more attention than the others. The desires we nourish for the lives of others fail to appreciate God's gift to us. They make us reflect on only a part of other's lives. The man we envy for his wealth might have a troubled child or debilitating illness. Sad to say the disobedience of these two commandments might lead us to the breaking of others. Just one example: the fraud committed against our retired people by brokers who never have enough money to sate their appetites. This brief examination of conscience certainly is not exhaustive, but it is a start. Think about your observance of the spiritual and corporal works of mercy

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
